ELSIF CREW IS REPORTED SAFE ABOARD CUTTER

WASHINGTON, Aug. 31. (AP)—Coast guard headquarters was notified today by the coast guard cutter Northland that she had picked up the entire crew of the Norwegian ship Elsf, wrecked off Cape Billings, Siberia, August 10.

The crew of 15 men was found on Dionised island off Alaska, which the shipwrecked men had reached after rowing 400 miles in open boats.

The Northland radioed that she was proceeding to Nome with the crew. No further details were given in the message, which was relayed here by the commandant of the Seattle coast guard, but headquarters here said they believed the Northland had found the shipwrecked men by accident.

DEATHS DURING JULY REACH 27

SALEM, Aug. 31. (AP)—A total of 27 persons lost their lives by motor vehicle accidents in Oregon during the month of July, says a report to the Governor from T. A. Rafferty, chief

state traffic inspector. The number of persons injured was 455 and the total number of accidents was 2737.

Eleven persons were killed and 367 hurt in 2,352 accidents involving the collision of one car with another. The remainder of the casualties were due to a miscellany of causes. Carelessness was said to have caused 1,257 of the accidents.
