

BENNETT AND CLEGHORN READY TO GO

BOTH BOYS IN FINE CONDITION FOR FAST BOUT

Records of Fighters Show Both are Scrappers.

Everything is in readiness for the American Legion smoker at the Legion pavilion tonight. With the boxers all matched up and every man in the pink of condition, there is promise of one of the best exhibitions in the history of the local boxing commission.

Unusual interest is apparent in the main card. From comparative records of the two men, this should be a knockout, both literally and figuratively. Seldom does a town the size of Klamath Falls get a bout with two such hard-hitting, boring-in type of fighters as Bennett and Clegghorn. Local fans have seen Clegghorn in action and know what he can do. Many of them have also seen Bennett work out since his arrival here and there is little doubt in the minds of any as to his ring ability.

Eakimo's Record Good
Clegghorn has fought some of the best men in his class on the coast. Due to his stature, it has always been difficult to match him near his weight. He usually has to give from eight to 15 pounds advantages, but this has not proved to be a disadvantage to him. It is just that much harder for an opponent to put him off his feet—something that has never been done. One of the hardest scraps he ever had was with Willard Dix at Tacoma, May 16. In the second round Dix almost knocked the Eakimo off his feet with a terrific left hook. In the same round Clegghorn nearly stopped Dix with a hard right to the body. In the third round both exchanged rights. Both landed to the chin, but Clegghorn's punch had better Dix's wallop. Clegghorn faltered, almost dropped. Dix went down like a shot and was counted out. It was one of the most unusual and thrilling knockouts ever seen in a Tacoma ring.

Here is a short list of the fighters Clegghorn has met, the names being of those considered the most worthy opponents: George Dixon (three fights), Eddie Roberts, Walcott Langford, Mike Hector, Roy Moore, Al Webster, K. O. White and Wesley Ketchel. These are all tough boys in the ring.

Bennett's record is as impressive. He has risen from the ranks in a short period, but is not just a flash. He has met and defeated some of the best men of his class in the west and his trainer, Tim McGrath, is willing to back him against all comers in his weight. If physical appearances count for anything, Bennett is able to take care of himself in the ring.

SEALS TAKING SPITE OUT ON SLIDING DUCKS

Portland Crew Shy On Pitchers For Finals.

Wade Killefer's Mission Reds were but half a game behind the league leading Hollywood Stars today in the Pacific coast pennant race, the main reason being the slick work of "Fuzzy" Huff who enabled the Reds to beat their way to victory yesterday over the Sacramento Senators in Stockton. Another reason was the fact that Hollywood was beaten by the Oakland Oaks.

Huff broke up a tight mound duel when he tripped into right field with two men on base and two out in the eighth inning, after the Sacramento boys had gained a 1 to 0 lead in the preceding inning. The Reds thus won by a score of 3 to 1. Fuzzy later scored on an error at short. The victory was the third straight over Buddy Ryan's crew.

For five innings the Seals and Portland Ducks had a tight tussle at Recreation park, but the Seals scored 11 runs in the sixth inning and turned the affair into a complete rout. The Seals emerged with a score of 15 to 4, making it two in a row over the northerners who only ten days ago claimed seven consecutive victories over the Seals themselves, and thus were able to take the coast league lead by storm.

Oakland won from the Stars at Emeryville 6 to 4. Roy Carls' homer helped the Oaks in the eighth inning with two men on base. The long wallop spotted a chance the Stars held of making it three straight over

PIRATES BREAK JINX LONG HELD BY RED HURLER

Lucas Falls Before Herd of Pittsburgh Sluggers.

In a season that has seen their championship hopes blown to the four winds by a series of injuries, the Pittsburgh Pirates at least can look with pride upon the fact that they finally have shaken the "Lucas jinx."

Ever since June, 1927, Pirate teams have rolled over and played dead whenever Red Lucas, star pitcher of the Cincinnati Reds, was in the box against them. Last Sunday, however, they managed to beat the big red-head in a 13-inning thriller, 9 to 7. Yesterday they demonstrated that the red ace no longer can boast of his spell over them for they trounced him, 10 to 5, in the only National league game of the day.

The Reds hammered Ervin Brame, Pirate right hander, for four hits and three runs in the first inning and apparently had the game won with Lucas in the

box. The Corsairs submitted tamely enough in the first two innings but slugged out a home run, a double, three triples, two singles and with the aid of a wild throw scored seven runs. Lucas survived this storm but went to the showers early in the following inning when Lloyd Waner tripped with one on. Jackie May held the Corsairs fairly well in check the rest of the way, although Pittsburgh scored single runs in the seventh and eighth innings.

Brame, after his shaky start, settled down and pitched brilliantly until the ninth when an error and Pinch Hitter Walker's triple were the high spots of a two-run rally by the Reds.

The victory placed Pittsburgh 12 1/2 games behind the league leading Chicago Cubs.

In the only American league game of the day, Cleveland strengthened its hold on third place by bouncing Detroit for a 4-0 loss, in a game halted by rain after five innings of play. The Indians pounded Phil Page for three runs in the first inning, one more in the fifth and then scored three in the sixth only to see them washed out of the score book when rain caused postponement of the game and the score reverted to the fifth inning. Ken Holloway belted Detroit to two hits. The victory enabled Cleveland to increase its margin over fourth place St. Louis to 2 1/2 games.
