LONDON, Sept. 13. (AP) — The New York barber of WILLIAM F. KENNY, wealthy contractor after being detained by immigration authorities at Southampton when he arrived aboard the Leviathan today has been given permission to land in England. It was stated in London this afternoon.

Louis Arico, for whose services Mr. Kenny telephoned when he decided European barbers were not equal to the task of clipping his rather scanty locks, was so delighted with the chance of going to Europe that he sailed without his passport.

The permit to land has been given on the understanding that Louis will return to New York when the Leviathan sails next Tuesday, as he had originally intended.
