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witnesses uniformly had testified they believed Mrs. Pantages to have been intoxicated at the time of the crash.

Mrs. Bertha Jacobs, called for the defense, told the jury that to the best of her knowledge the hunter man's wife was sober 15 minutes before the crash. She had spent the week-end of June 15 at the Pantages home in Venice, a beach suburb, had ridden into Los Angeles with Mrs. Pantages, and left the car 15 minutes before the accident.

John Conterno, operator of a service station at Serrano avenue and Sunset boulevard, the scene of the crash, departed wholly from previously given testimony, and related that Mrs. Pantages' automobile was forced to the left side of the street by a big touring car. State testimony consistently had been that no cars except those of Mrs. Pantages and Rokumoto were near the scene of the accident. Conterno testified that Mrs. Pantages was "just out cold" after the accident, and that he saw no signs of intoxication.

Mrs. Edna Taylor, a nurse in Hollywood hospital to which Mrs. Pantages was taken and where she was confined by injuries for several weeks, and Dr. A. MacDonald, who treated her, testified they had found no evidence of intoxication. The physician said she had suffered a slight concussion of the brain. He said that he believed it impossible to determine definitely between intoxication and concussion in the case of a head injury such as that received by Mrs. Pantages.

Chiloquin Hunters Give Zeke a Line of Bedtime Stories

Floyd Stump Is Entitled to the Gold Handled Teacup for His Narrative of the Terrible Dingmaw That Inhabited These Parts When the Basin Country Was First Settled.

CHILOQUIN, Ore., Sept. 12. (Special)—With the hunting season approaching and the cold nights coming along arm-in-arm, local nimrods are toasting their shins in front of hot stoves and trying to scare each other with their annual fall bear and deer killing tales.

INCLUDED in the Chiloquin hunting group are such notorious Joshuays as Ted and Fritz Markwardt, Elmer Gray, Carroll Cornell, Henry Wolff, Harold Nichols, Floyd Stump, Pat Rice, Benny Blackmore and Roy Glenger.

IN THE above bunch, one of the outstanding figures is Pat Rice. Scarcely a season passes without seeing Pat bag his share of decoy ducks, while a pelican oftentimes has to stop and argue to beat the band, to convince Pat that it wasn't a wild goose.

BUT TO Floyd Stump has been passed the silver-handled teacup for being the best all-round indoor story teller on Chocktoot street. Floyd has been accused of using a carpet stretcher on some of his yarns, but a good man in almost any line is often grossly maligned and abused.

FLOYD says he can remember when this part of Oregon was so darn wild that a pine tree would jump and run unless one sneaked up on it from behind.

"WILD ANIMALS were thicker than service stations are now; the Indians were quarrelsome and one had to pack his life around in a satchel if he expected to be a regular customer at Sunday schools," states the Chiloquin nimrod.

"ROAMING the Crater Lake country in those days was a ferocious animal called the dingmaw," Floyd tells.

"LONG as a rail and with an enormous head, and a mouth that was big enough for a yearling steer to roost in, it was a disagreeable varmint to surprise in your chicken pens when darkness came in after supper.

"THE DINGMAW has a long rope-like tail, at the end of which it wore a ball about the size of a pumpkin. The animal would perch in trees along trails. When a man or deer went by, the beast would hurl this ball with unerring aim, killing the victim at the first crack.

"AFTER which the dingmaw would pounce down and devour the carcass with horrible screeches and loud raucous laughter which often turned the early settlers' blood into ice cream or froze water in the ranchers' wash basins.

"One time I was out hunting over near Mt. Pitt when I came face to face with one of these ugly creatures. I had just killed a deer and my gun was leaning against a tree some distance away and I was at the mercy of the beast.

"FOR ONLY a jiffy it stood glaring at me. With eyes the size of two hotcakes and vicious fangs protruding from snarling lips, I felt both bashful and embarrassed in its presence," Floyd confessed.

"BUT I had not long to wait. With a lightning-like move the animal grabbed its pumpkin-like tassel in its fore paws.

"THEN with the strength of a giant it lammed the ball full at my head. I was too quick for it and ducked, and the beast missed me slick and clean.

"BLINDED with rage, the dingmaw rushed forward. Seeing the big tassel which the animal mistook for me, the monster pitched upon the fleshy growth and devoured itself right before my eyes." And so

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FIRE SITUATION GETTING WORSE

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to determine the dimensions of the inferno, which is known to cover an area of more than 1,000 acres and probably much more.

Six hundred acres of timber were destroyed by a fire in the Horton district near Eugene. In the Skagitou forest 2,000 acres have been burned over.

A new outbreak south of Eugene, in the Cottage Grove sector, was said to be threatening great stands of government timber. Calls for additional men to fight this fire were made by fire wardens.

Roaring over 3,000 acres of fir and cedar, the Rock creek fire in the Coos bay district was raging uncontrolled today. Aside from this fire the general situation in that area was improved.

In the Portland district flames swept over 800 acres in the Mount Hood National forest yesterday and today was not yet under control, although 200 men were fighting it.

The situation in Washington was said to be "quiet but dangerous," with three new fires reported.
