NEGRO SPEAKER CAUSE OF RIOT

NEW YORK, Sept. 13. (AP).—A negro speaker at an open air communist meeting in the Brownsville section of Brooklyn precipitated a riot early today, in which 2,000 persons participated. Police reserves quelled the disorder after a strenuous tussle with the crowd. Twelve youths were arrested.

The trouble started, according to the police, when Harold Williams, a negro and uninvited speaker, mounted a soap box and outlined his views on the Palestine situation. Thousands of Jewish families reside in the section.

Williams had not talked long before some one cried out: "He's an Arab." Two men leaped forward and dragged him from the soap box. Policemen rescued him and hurried him to a cigar

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store for protection from the shouting crowd. Meanwhile, the crowd tried to break down the door and a call for reserves was put in. Fire apparatus also was summoned. The crowd charged policemen and firemen alike until the bluecoats got the situation under control.
