BRUIN VICTORY CAME EASY SO LACKS PUNCH

At That, Hornsby Is Responsible For All Cub Runs.

By defeating the Robins at Wrigley Field last Sunday, the Cubs reached a point where one more victory would give them the National League pennant beyond the last mathematical doubt. The energetic Bruins are still snooping here and there in search of the victory, but they nevertheless have become champions, almost without knowing it. The coronet was clamped upon the brow of Joseph V. McCarthy just before game-time in Chicago yesterday when the Braves tossed the Pirates by 5 to 4 at Forbes Field in the first half of a double header.

The new champions of the elder major circuit were allowed to enter their game against the Giants without the knowledge that the Braves had ended the struggle for them. Otherwise they might have done better against the Giants, who opened the series with a 7 to 3 triumph behind Carl Hubbell's fine pitching.

Taken For Granted
Presuming that the Cubs' twelfth pennant long had been taken for granted—as Chicago fans took it—the most interesting development at Wrigley Field yesterday was Rogers Hornsby's feat in scoring all three of the Bruin runs and so lifting his total to 146, two beyond the modern National league record set by Kiki Cuyler in Pittsburgh in 1925.

After Kremer and Sweetonic had dropped the pennant-deciding first game to the Braves at Pittsburgh, the Pirates came back behind Henry Mele to take the nightcap by 5 to 2.

Jim Frey, Nashville recruit, gave the Phillies 13 hits in his Cincinnati debut, but won his game by 9 to 5. The contest was notable for the fielding performance of Horace Ford, Cincinnati shortstop, who cut in with eleven put-outs and three assists. He fell short of the Major league mark of nineteen chances accepted by a shortstop.

Yanks Wham Indians
Under the pounding of Yankee home run bats, the Indians just escaped from New York with their lives yesterday, all visions of second money vanished from their minds. Led appropriately enough by the home run twins, Ruth and Gehrig, who got two apiece, the Yanks bombarded the Indians out of two games by 9 to 7 and 13 to 2. Tony "izzari" added a circuit blow for good measure, and the Sewell brothers performed for Cleveland.

Babe Has 46
Ruth ran his total to forty-six, by far the highest in either circuit, and Gehrig mounted to thirty-four, second best in the American league.

The Browns batted Bob Grove from the box to win the opener from the Athletics by 6 to 2, but George Earnshaw pitched a steady game in the nightcap to triumph by 4 to 3, his twenty-second victory. No other pitcher in the Major league can boast so many. Earnshaw allowed only one earned run, two markers in the eighth being scored on that rare spectacle, a passed ball by Mickey Cochran. Those two tied it up, but the A's pulled out the decision for Earnshaw with a single run in the home half.

Senators Advance
Washington dislodged Detroit from fifth place by a margin of one and one-half games through a double victory over the Bengals by scores of 3 to 0 and 1 to 0. Hogsett, the \$60,000 southpaw recruit, said to have been purchased by Detroit from Montreal at a fire sale rate of something like \$40,000, showed himself every inch a pitcher in his Major league debut, even in defeat.

Chicago and Boston, in the American league, and Brooklyn and St. Louis, in the National had no games scheduled.

FAMOUS COLT SENT TO BARN

NEW YORK, Sept. 19. (AP) Whichone, 2-year-old star of the Harry Payne Whitney stable, is to be retired from racing for the season, James Rowe, Jr., the Whitney trainer, has announced. The winner of the futurity and the Saratoga special was shipped to the farm at Brookdale, N. J., yesterday along with 10 stablemates. The rest of the Whitney string was shipped to tracks outside of the metropolitan district, 15 horses going to Maryland and seven to Kentucky. Boojum, running mate of Whichone, was sent to Brookdale but will be prepared for the Pimlico steeplechase.

5 Strokes Under Par for 2 Holes

Barrie Payne, the golf humorist, told me the other day of a player making two holes in competition in five strokes under par. Chasteen Harris, a rugged little player from Memphis, came to the fourteenth hole at Belle Meade, Nashville in the Southern Golf association tournament.

The 14th hole is 475 yards long. Harris got a long drive followed by a No. 2 iron shot that finished 13 inches from the pin, and holed his eagle 3. The 15th hole is just 351 yards, a par 4, set in a punch bowl green. Harris, employing a brassie, smashed the ball and had the extreme satisfaction of seeing it roll up on the green in the direction of the flag. A moment later came a wild yell from the players on the next tee, overlooking the green. "It's in the hole," they shouted.

On a pair of holes which had a par 5-4, Harris had done 3-1. This cuts a stroke more from par than Jack Hutchinson's famous brace of holes in the British open at St. Andrews in 1921, when Jack holed a 1 at the 8th and a 2 at the ninth. Thus was four strokes cut from par in two holes in succession.

SEALS MAKING BID FOR FIRST PLACE AGAIN

Half Game Separates Them From Top Place.

The San Francisco Seals, champions last year in the Pacific coast league pennant campaign, today were within half a game of the league leadership, now held by the Hollywood Stars. Five of the eight coast league clubs maintained their close grouping in the final lap of the 1929 season.

The Seals forged into second place yesterday by defeating the Mission Red- at Recreation park for the second time, this week. The score was 19 to 5, both teams bagging a dozen clouts each. "Dutch" Reuther was the object of the Seals' wrath early in the game. In the fourth inning he was driven to cover under a barrage of base hits.

Hollywood's leadership standing remained at 50 games won and 33 lost due to postponement of yesterday's battle with the Los Angeles Angels because of a rainy day in the southern city. Jim Edwards, southpaw pitcher who was sold to Oakland for some reason or other, proved at Seattle that it was not for lack of ability. Big Jim allowed Seattle five hits for eight scoreless innings, and finally wound up with a 6 to 2 victory.

A single bad inning caused "Junk" Walters to lose his game for Portland and Sacramento won 3 to 0. The debacle came in the fifth, when Walters was touched for three safeties. Rohrer's homer for the Sacs helped to put the win across. Both teams held to five hits each.

GUS DOWNS JOE
LOS ANGELES, Cal., Sept. 19. (AP)—Gus Sonnenberg, world's champion heavyweight wrestler, took two falls out of three in a title match here last night with Joe Stecher. 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Wrigley Wants Permanent Champs and Elastic Park

CHICAGO, Sept. 19. (AP)—The '29 champions of the National league, Chicago's Cubs, their collective blood pressure undisturbed by the clinching of the pennant, today faced the business of going through the motions of 11 ball games, before engaging the Athletics in the battle for world title acclaim.

Although no championship has come to Chicago since 1919, and none to the Cubs since 1918, almost no excitement accompanied actual triumph of the team assembled by William Wrigley, Jr., and Manager Veeck. The Cubs had only to wait for the law of averages to go to work for them, and finally missed the thrill of making the deciding gesture themselves when Boston administered the coupe de grace to Pirate hopes in the first game of yesterday's doubleheader.

Only a half-hearted cheer greeted the news when the Boston victory over Pittsburgh was posted at Wrigley field where about 7,500 fans sat shivering as the New York Giants defeated the champions, 7 to 3.

McCarthy, Wrigley and President William L. Veeck, were smilingly happy.

For Wrigley the title was his first as the owner of a major league club, but his imagination did not stop work. "I started out to get a team that would win a pennant," he said. "Well, the effort has been successful. But I am going to have a pennant every year, if I can—and after that I want an elastic ball park where everyone can get in for a world series."
