## O'GRADY AND BENNETT MAKE FAIR SHOWING

### Main Events Seem Unable to Put Over Staff.

Not a little dissatisfaction was expressed by fans at the showing of Gene O'Grady and Tommy Bennett in their ten round light heavyweight fight at the Legion pavilion last night. Although apparently in fine condition, both fighters were unable to unhook anything that was dangerous to either opponent.

To those who have seen Gene fight before, it was evident that he had lost some of his ring form. This is attributed to a long rest since his last fight and his supporters feel that if he keeps in training he will recover his punch and develop more speed. In the fight last night Bennett was the aggressor throughout and if a decision was to be left to the fans Tommy would get it.

### Italian Is Clever

As in his fight with Cleghorn, Tommy saved himself by clever footwork and dodging. Several of Gene's right hooks that had the appearance of carrying a lot of TNT went wild because the clever Italian wasn't in the vicinity of the intended blows. On the other hand, Tommy could not put over anything to hurt Gene, except, possibly, when he indulged in rushing tactics. There was scarcely a time throughout the ten rounds when either batter looked to be in danger.

### Semi-Windup Fast

If the crowd was a little disappointed in the main event it might have been due to the semi-windup. Johnny Spencer and Austin Rosander put up about the best fight seen here in many a moon. These boys are both clever, the one a shifty boxer with a telling punch, the other a hard hitting, boring-in type who can give as well as take a lot of punishment.

Rosander admirers are of the opinion that he has not kept in as good training as he should. That opinion may have been encouraged from the fact that he did not floor Johnny. Austin may not be in his usual form just now but it must be remembered that he was up against a veritable young wildcat of the ring, a chap who is fast developing into a comer in his weight. There is no doubt that Rosander would have done some damage if he had connected some of those uppercuts, but everytime he took a wicked swing the target was in some other corner or cleverly blocked it.

Spencer is getting to be a great favorite of the local fans and he is undoubtedly headed for bigger games.

### Steamboat Wins

Steamboat Jackson won the feature bout from Chuck Rosander. The bout consisted of 4 3-minute rounds. Chuck is a game and clever boxer but he could not reach Steamboat with anything that hurt very bad. Both boys worked hard to give the fans a show and this spirit helped to make up the loss felt in the main event.

### One Knockout

Just what Tiny McComber's chances are for the heavy belt will not be known until he meets a worthy opponent. In his match with Red McCormick last night neither had a chance to get up a sweat for Tiny delivered two punches in the first three minutes that counted Red out. The boys sparred around the ring several times before coming to blows. Red getting in one or two taps before Tiny belted him one on the jaw which upset him. Red took the count of nine and then got to his feet. He made one more pass at Tiny and that worthy uncorked another right jab to the face which started the gore flowing and dropped the unfortunate Red to the floor for the full count. Tex will have to get a bigger man for Tiny next time.

## Guess Hitter Can Often Pick Balls

Many pitchers are known as "guess hitters" ball players. They are the fellows who try to out-guess the pitcher and anticipate in advance what he is going to throw them. Some of the best hitters are of this type.

"Hack" Wilson of the Chicago Cubs is one. If he guesses right he gives the ball a long ride, but if he guesses wrong he is completely crossed and looks bad. Rogers Hornsby picks the ball out as it comes up to him. "You can't hit anything you don't see," he says. "These guess hitters are all wrong."

Sherwood Magee, the old Philadelphia slugger, was still another type of hitter. "I always look for a fast ball," he said. "Then if the pitcher dishes up a curve, I'm not so badly crossed as I would be looking for a curve and he would dust me with a fast one!"

### A TENNIS MATCH

Working on the theory that the best rest is a hard day's work, Joe McCarthy is keeping his regulars at their accustomed posts as the Hiredlings of Cornelius McGillicuddy take their ease upon the bench—or even away from the park altogether.

The Pirates stopped the Braves by 10 to 3 at Pittsburgh in the only National league game. Lloyd Waner hit a homer with two on, and Lester Bell re-tallied for Boston with the bases empty. Jess Petty pitched against Perry and Touchstone, eastern league additions to the Boston roster.

Wet ground in St. Louis built up a Sabbath doubleheader for the Cardinals and the Robins. The rest of the league had a scheduled open date.

## VETERAN STAR

### Eddie Collins Gets Into His Seventh World Series

For one player in the 1929 series between Philadelphia and Chicago, there will be no novelty. Eddie Collins is the athlete. While it is very doubtful if Collins will get into the series as a regular, there is more than an outside chance that he will be called upon to do a little pinch hitting. In a pinch, there is no one in whom Connie Mack has more confidence. Slow of foot, his eye is still as keen as ever at the plate.

The 1926 event will make the seventh world series in which Collins has been a participant. He last appeared as a performer in the annual classic in 1913, the off-color affair between Cincinnati and Chicago. His first world series was in 1910, and, strangely enough, the opposing team was the Chicago Cubs under Frank Chance. Now, 20 years later, the same cities meet, with Collins still in the limelight.

Collins had his best year in his debut as a world series performer. Just a youngster, and pitted against the supposedly invincible Cub staff, headed by "Three-Fingered" Brown, he had a batting average of .439.

The one and only Babe Ruth is one of the few players who have topped Collins as a world series performer in the matter of endurance. The Bambino has been fortunate enough to share in nine events.

This year Collins' part in the series will probably be confined to carrying out Mack's line of strategy from the coach's box at third.

## DENVER PRO TO PLAY IN OPEN CHAMPIONSHIP

PORTLAND, Ore., Sept. 21. (AP)—Johnny Rogers, Denver, Colo., known as the longest hitting golf professional in America, today joined the ranks of other notable players who will participate in the Oregon open golf championship at Columbia country club, October 31, November 1 and 2.

Rogers' entry followed that of Al "Abe" Eppinosa, who has paid entry fees. Tommy Armour, Walter Hagen and Johnny Farrell have promised to be here for the event.

Rogers has won practically every driving contest the pros have conducted in recent years. Although the purse has been set tentatively at \$1200, Columbia country club officials were preparing ways in which to enlarge the money.

## SEALS-ACTORS TIED FOR TOP IN WEST RACE

### No One Has Advantage in Second Half of Season.

Hollywood and San Francisco two of the most powerful baseball clubs in the Pacific coast league, placing their chief faith in battery and pitching strength, stood at the head of the league today, in a tie with 1 won and 35 lost as the record for each in the second half of the split season. The Mission Reds, a constant threat to the first place club, lurked in third rank.

The stars went back into first place by splitting a double header with Los Angeles. They came from behind with a four run rally in the eighth to capture the opener 6 to 4, but were squelched thoroughly in the nightcap which turned up a 15 to 7 victory for the Angels. Both games were played at Wrigley Field, Los Angeles.

Only the fact that the Seals had won three straight up to yesterday from the Mission Reds at Recreation park, kept that club in the battle for first place against Hollywood. The Missions turned the tables by defeating the league leaders 3 to 2.

The Indians dropped another to the Oakland club in the northern camp, the battle ending 5 to 2, and giving the Oaks three victories to one for the Redskins. Craghead was almost invincible.

Portland took both halves of a doubleheader from Sacramento in the north. The Ducks swam to an easy 10 to 4 victory in the first, and made it 4 to 3 in the afternoon. In both games, the Portlanders came from behind. Sacramento rolled up a four run advantage in the first contest only to lose it in the third inning, while in the nightcap, the victors scored all their runs before the Ducks brought their first runner across the plate.

"We look for the A's to beat the Cubs. Both are great ball clubs, but naturally I am backing my own league representative, my own Mack has the best team in the business right now, and I believe I can safely say it will be the victor in the series."

## PILOT FORCED DOWN

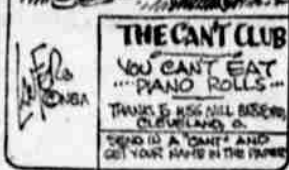

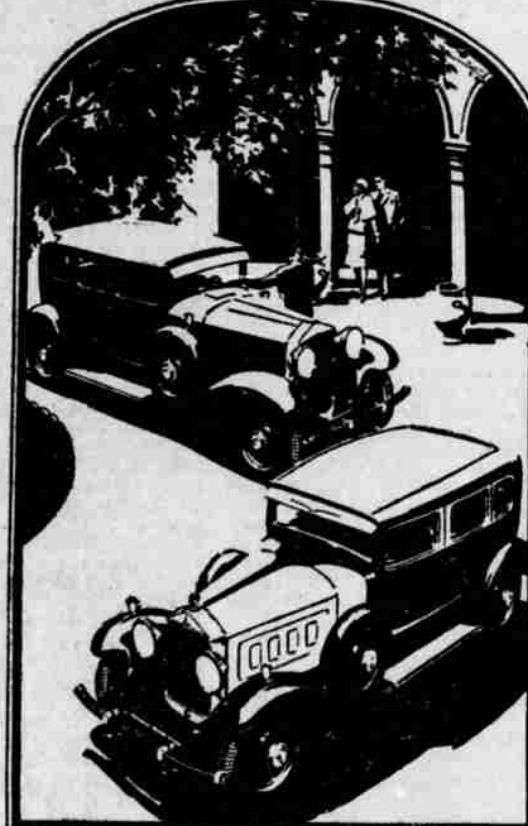
