Granger, district forester, today issued a statement declaring the fire situation in national forests of Oregon and Washington was such that it is impossible at this time to rescind the order closing the national forests in the two states. Granger said the situation is still hazardous and that thousands of men remain on the fire lines in both states. A general heavy rain must come before the closure will be revoked, he said.

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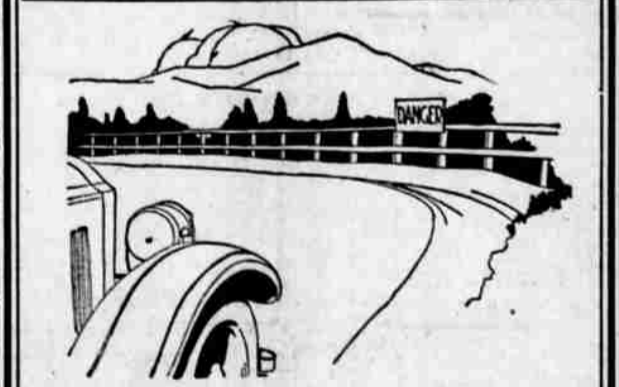
