EASTERN BALL CLUBS MOSTLY QUIET FRIDAY

American Leaguers All Rest in Honor of Huggins.

The baseball stage was left vacant yesterday except for the performances at Philadelphia and St. Louis. The Phillies defeated the Braves by 11 to 5 in the first clash of a three-game series, cementing their position in fifth place, and the Cardinals made it two straight over the broken Pirates by 4 to 2. The Pittsburgh defeat left the Buccaneers only two games ahead of the Giants, with a week of the season to go.

The clan McGraw has eight games to play; the Pirates have six. If the giants can win six out of eight, the Pirates must take four out of six to prevent a tie. The task of the Giants, however, is by no means negligible. A deficit of two games is no mean handicap at this season. Chuck Klein got his 42d homer in the first inning, with one on, and moved into a tie with Melvin Ott of New York for the league lead. Klein's drive also tied the National league record set in 1923 by Rogers Hornsby, and equaled this week by Ott.

Frank O'Doul, the reformed pitcher, formerly of the Pacific Coast league, had a perfect day at St. Louis, with three safeties and a pass. He lifted his average from 3.91 to 3.94, and virtually clinched the National league championship. Babe Herman has only 3.84, and has just six games in which to make up the deficit.

Fred Frankhouse and Sylvester Johnson outpitched Ervin Brame to give the Cardinals their second straight over the Pirates. Bunched hits in the first inning settled the issue.

The other National league clubs were not scheduled, and all of the American league entries remained idle because of the funeral services of Miller Huggins in New York.

ACTORS AGAIN STAND AT TOP

Just like the song they sing about Finnegans, the Hollywood stars today were "in again," after defeating the San Francisco Mission Reds and thus breaking out of a tie for the league leadership. The lead has been traded back and forth between the clubs this week, and they have been tied twice. The series standing gave both two games each.

The Stars returned to a one game lead over the league pack by routing the Missions with a five-run rally. The score was 8 to 4. Again the stands at Recreation park were packed, giving evidence of interest in the crucial series of the season.

The Bay City team scored its first run in the opening inning, bringing two more across in the seventh. Howard Craghead clamped the lid on the Ducks after they had scored their lone tally off Edwards. The Ducks today were in third place in the league standings.

Seattle defeated Sacramento in the northern city 9 to 4. The Indians tommy-hawked Tony Freitas for 13 hits.

The Los Angeles Angels won their fourth straight game of the present series over the San Francisco Seals at Wrigley field, Los Angeles, the score being 4 to 2.

TONY THRUSTS MACK OUT OF CHAMPIONSHIP

CHICAGO, Sept. 28. (AP)—The thumping fists of Tony Cannonieri, former featherweight champion, have thrust back the bid of Eddie Mack of Denver, for the right to challenge for the world's lightweight championship.

Mack became a technical knockout victim of the New York Italian in the eighth round of the main bout in the Chicago stadium last night. Mack's chances of overcoming the former featherweight ruler, were wrecked almost as soon as the fight started, when he sprained his right ankle. He fought gamely and managed to give Cannonieri trouble with his left, but could not withstand the easterner's assault in the later rounds. The bout was stopped in the eighth after a right to the jaw had dropped Mack for a nine count. A crowd of more than 11,000 paid \$38,000 to see the card.

LENHART GETS NOD.

ROSEBURG, Ore., Sept. 28. (AP)—Denny Lenhart, Roseburg army-navy light heavyweight champion for 1928, was given a close 10-round decision over Jack McGreer, Kansas City, in the opening boxing card of the season last night.
