DAIRYMEN WILL OPERATE PLANT

(Continued from Page One)

the coast and in Klamath Falls will be manager of the plant here.

Name Committee
An organizing committee was named last night to complete the legal organization of the cooperative under the provisions of the amended cooperative act which went into effect on June 4, after the formation of the association under the corporation laws.

U. E. Reeder acted as chairman of the meeting last night. He is a prominent dairyman on Merrill route and was president of the board of directors of the first association. Other members of the committee appointed to complete the organization last night are R. C. Short, Merrill route; Hans Nylander, Merrill route; E. Mochatt, Midland; and Robert Gordon, Fort Klamath.

Provisions Better
The new act limits the ownership of stock in the association to members of the cooperative and frees the organization from the restrictions of the act which forbids price fixing in restraint of trade, allowing a greater latitude to the farmers.

The cooperative, the third in Klamath county, allows the farmers a mutual marketing agency which will help to stabilize the prices on farm products and will aid in developing the dairy industry in Klamath county. It is believed that it will not only be an incentive for dairymen to increase the size of their herds but also the quality of the milk produced.

Lease Plant Space
In the organization of the new cooperative no solicitations were made in the territory south of Merrill which is in the territory of the Mallin creamery and cheese factory nor in the Langell Valley section where the dairymen are members of the Langell Valley cheese factory association. Three memberships which were taken in Langell Valley before the formation of the cheese factory association there were returned to the signers without request.

Space sufficiently large to accommodate the cooperative has been leased from the Klamath Ice and Storage company. A cement floor has been laid, a boiler installed and more than \$8000 worth of the latest machinery has been ordered for the new plant.

Explains Organization
The machinery includes equipment for the marketing of milk, the production of butter and cheese. No ice cream will be made at present but may be manufactured later.

C. A. Henderson, county agent, introduced the speakers at the meeting last night. J. H. Napier, attorney for the association, explained the type of organization which will be formed to carry on the work of the organization previously formed.

The board of directors of the first association were largely instrumental in the successful completion of the formation of the cooperative, it was stated.

Membership Open
The organization is open to membership and members may subscribe stock. Actual operation of the plant will be started as soon as the machinery is installed, and the final articles of the cooperative have been completed.

C. L. Mitchell, production manager for the Challenge Cream and Butter Association, a sales agency for 17 cooperative northwest creameries, spoke as did G. O. Gatlin, market specialist of Oregon State College.

Mitchell Speaks
Mitchell explained the marketing of products of cooperatives and the great growth in the last few years. He stated that on high priced, irrigated land dairy cattle are more economical food producers than beef cattle. He further stated that hay grown in Klamath county should be fed in Klamath county to insure the greatest financial benefit to the county and to those who raise the hay.

He advocated a cow testing association and the formation of cooperatives as a method of strengthening industry and increasing the financial return to the farmers and to the county as a whole.

Gatlin to Reassure
Professor Gatlin assured the members of the co-operative that he would give his utmost assistance in the organization. He advocated the formation of a financial reserve and the sale of stock in the association to members only.

No action was taken last night relative to marketing the products of the association, as the local market at the present time is more than sufficient. Butter, cheese and milk is at the present time shipped into Klamath county, it is stated, and it is believed that the local market will more than supply a demand for the products.

COMMITTEE TO BE HEARD ON MUNICIPAL LAW

The following communication from Hal E. Hoss, secretary of state, explains the purpose of a meeting which should interest every municipality in the state:

To Whom It May Be of Interest:

"The last session of the legislature enacted a law requiring the secretary of state to formulate and prescribe a uniform system of accounting for all municipal corporations, excepting any county or municipal corporation located within any county having a population in excess of 100,000. The attorney general has advised that the term 'municipal corporations' as used in this law, includes counties, cities, school districts, special road districts, highway improvement districts and irrigation and drainage districts. The law also provides that before a final recommendation is made a hearing shall be held by the secretary of state, which anyone interested might attend.

"In order to carry out the intent and purposes of this law to the best advantage, I have asked the League of Oregon cities to appoint a committee to ascertain procedures and practices in various parts of this state as well as in other states, and to be in position to report to me their recommendations in connection with the public hearing called for in the law. This committee will be ready to report on the afternoon of October 24th, and in consequence I am calling the meeting for that time. The session will be held in the Hall of Representatives, in the State Capitol building at Salem, commencing at 2:00 o'clock on the afternoon of October 24, 1929, and you are earnestly urged to be present to participate in the discussions and to give me the benefit of your experience. This is an extremely important matter and I trust that you will make every effort to come.

"A regular meeting of the League is to be held in the same room on the day following, i. e., October 25th, and which I am sure you will want to attend. The date for our hearing has been set so as to be convenient for those who attend the League meeting, but in any event I again urge you to arrange to be with us at our accounting meeting on the afternoon of the 24th.

PERMITS SHOW HEALTHY TONE

Building permits for the month of September totaled \$102,322, according to reports filed recently. This is an increase of \$25,468 over 1928, when the permits were \$76,854.

Of this amount, 15 commercial permits in the amount of \$51,599 were issued; one industrial permit of \$500, and residence permits of \$49,893 constituted the total.

Totals for the first nine months in the year are as follows: January, \$86,310; February, \$49,257; March, \$1,881,355; April, \$1,487,411; May, \$153,310; June, \$252,583; July, \$333,330; August, \$56,090, and September, \$102,322.

The largest permit for the month was issued to R. E. Wattburg, for an extension and another story to a building on Klamath avenue, amount, \$15,000.

HAD NO RIGHT TO ANNUL WRIT

MEDFORD, Ore., Oct. 2. (AP)—Federal Judge Robert S. Bean today ruled from the bench that Mrs. Ethel McDermid, Klamath Falls, Ore., had no grounds for the annulling of an agreement she made with the Kesterson Lumber company, Davis, Calif., for the settlement of damages for the death of her husband, Simon McDermid, in August, 1928.

Mrs. McDermid, testimony indicated, accepted \$4,250 in settlement, and in the present action alleged "misrepresentation" and asked for \$45,750 more. The court rules there had been no misrepresentation.

AIRMAIL STARTS
MEDFORD, Ore., Oct. 2. (AP)—The first air mail flight from the Medford municipal airport was made today by planes bearing 15,000 special letters mailed by Medford residents. The airport is ready for reception of planes.

trict in the state is that of Klamath county for this year. Mr. Henderson continued. He also pointed out that the heaviest alfalfa crop ever produced here is that of this year on the irrigated lands of this section. Recently a hay growers' association was organized in the Tule Lake district for the purpose of stabilizing the price of hay as far as they are able and this organization will have a great deal to do with the success of this crop, inasmuch as they endeavor to keep the price down in reach of the stock men. The price is practically normal, being probably the lowest in the state. Lake county hay is selling at from \$15 to \$18 a ton.

The potato outlook for this year is particularly favorable, according to present statistics and crops.

The acreage is less than last year but the market is entirely different, being just in reverse to that of 1928 when the early potato digging flooded the market. An increase in the price is to be expected and at least 1000 cars are expected to be shipped out of this county this year. 500 cars have already been contracted for at an average price of \$1.85 per hundred.

Last year 1200 cars went out from the county, averaging in price about \$50 per hundred, bringing in approximately \$60,000 which was the same as the year before. Compared to the forecasted income this year of \$700,000, it is easy to see how the market has advanced.

This condition is partly due, Mr. Henderson went on to explain, to the new Modoc Northern railroad which passes through this part of the county, giving the growers several new loading stations, eliminating from 20 to 30 miles haul. An increase in the crops and acreage for next year is also to be looked for, because of the fact that the market this year has been so favorable.

The grain yield in the Tule Lake homestead section has been the greatest ever known in that district. 300,000 sacks of grain bringing in about \$500,000 is 50 per cent larger than ever before. One farmer in that territory reports 77 and three tenths bushels of grain to the acre and others are almost as productive.

The Tule Lake homestead proposition is growing more favorable, according to reports from the agriculturalist's office, and the type of people on the land allotted to them is favorable.

The balance of the grain crop in other parts of the county is also good and probably will be higher than normal. Prices should be favorable.

The dairying industry, also, shows some progress although the field here has not yet been nearly developed to capacity. The industry is expected to bring in about three fourths millions this year which is only about a fourth what it should be. Recently Langell Valley farmers started a cheese factory and the feasibility of this and the room for advancement was pointed out by Mr. Henderson.

Percy Murray was chairman for this meeting and the program included several numbers by the Kiwanis quartet, composed of Merland Stroud, Jack Bowering, Fred Houston and Dewey Powell.

Next week the forum will be in charge of a delegation of members of the Bend chamber of commerce.

Four Clubbed
All of those injured except Sheriff Adkins, Biggestaff, Stepp and Cannon were shot. These four were clubbed during the affray.

The source of the first shot was not definitely learned. Sheriff Adkins said that he did not know where the first shot came from, but that he thought it came from the picket line. He said that a number of those wounded had been shot down by their own people, asserting that one man standing beside him fell as a number of shots were sent in his direction.

Sheriff Adkins announced that he had telegraphed Governor O. Max Gardner, asking for troops.

tion last fall and elected by a large majority. Extremely popular with the North Idaho bloc of republicans, Kinne was often mentioned as a possibility for governor next year.

Born in New Brunswick, Canada, 55 years ago, Kinne came west when he was 32 years old to open a mercantile enterprise at Coeur d'Alene, Idaho. Later he moved to the Clearwater river region and became wealthy in timber and other operations. He managed several lumber mills, and was interested in real estate when he died.

Kinne received nationwide publicity last June when three men kidnapped him in a projected robbery campaign. In the search that followed his release five men were arrested and sent to the penitentiary for long sentences.

O. C. & E. HAS FREIGHT WRECK

A train wreck occurred on the Oregon, California and Eastern railroad at 12:30 Tuesday noon when five cars jumped the track a short distance east of Olney.

Railroad officials stated last night that it is believed the wreck was caused by a broken rail, since several rails were found broken after the wreck. Three of the cars loaded with logs tipped over after leaving the track. No one was injured.

All signs of the accident had been cleared away, the damage repaired and the track was reported clear at midnight last night.

SPUD GROWERS MEET TONIGHT

Potato growers of Klamath county will meet tonight at Henley auditorium to discuss grading and to set a price for pickers for this season.

W. L. Close, federal inspector and grading expert, will be present to explain the United States grading rules for potatoes which have been adopted for the state of Oregon.

Seymour Jones, state market agent, is also expected to be present at the meeting and to make an address and enter the discussions of the growers.

JEWETT TELLS DIFFERENCE IN OREGON'S DEER

At the suggestion of the state game commission, Stanley Jewett, of the United States Biological Survey, has issued a statement calling attention to the differences in the kind of deer found in Oregon. The statement follows:

"The principal distinction between the mule deer of Eastern Oregon and the Columbian black tail of Western Oregon, is this: The mule deer is by far the larger of the two species and can be distinguished from the smaller black tail by its larger ears and short white tail with only a black tip, while the black tail deer, not only being smaller has a much wider tail, the outer surface of which is black all over and although the under side is white, it only shows on the tip of the tail. The range of the two species is well defined. The mule deer is found in the Blue mountain counties and in Harney, Lake, Malheur and the eastern part of Klamath county. The black tail is found in all counties west of the summit of the Cascades and the only places where the two species could possibly meet are in the yellow pine districts near the vicinity of The Dalles to Klamath Falls.
