Double Bills Make Fans Happy, However

Casualties among unattached ball games, wandering aimlessly in the eastern storm, have been heavy in the last few days, but not one complaint has been registered by any fan. A bargain double-header involving the Athletics against the Senators at Shibe park yesterday was sunk without a trace, and moisture in and about the Polo grounds caused Charlie Stoneham to abandon the final Brooklyn-New York game of the season to its fate.

The Giants are booked solid in Philadelphia and Boston for the four remaining days of the season and could not play off yesterday's "postponement" even if they were mean enough to do it. Connie Mack does deserve some credit, however, for not moving to Washington with his double-header, which could be played there either today or tomorrow, weather permitting. Mr. Clark Griffith, it may be recalled, recently hauled the White Sox back to Washington for one rousing game against the Senators before permitting them to go peacefully about their business in the west.

The wholesale curtailment of the eastern half of the baseball program yesterday again left the Cubs and the Reds alone upon the stage, and this time the Cubs did better. They fell upon the portly Mr. Jackie May with such violence that he had to be led from the premises in the eighth inning, with Ray Kulp in the role of undertaker for a defunct ball game, which the Bruins won by 7 to 4.

Sheriff Fred Blake handcuffed the Reds neatly, but he had able assistance from Rogers Hornsby, who is bent upon finishing second in the list of National league batters, even if he cannot scale the top. The Rajah got two out of four yesterday, lifting his average one point to .350, which is only three notches below the runnerup, Babe Herman.

Brooklyn will not appear at Braves field this afternoon as the contest has been moved forward to Saturday to provide a doubleheader for back bay clients.

DUCKS UNABLE TO STOP STARS

In yesterday's drive, the Stars saved the situation by winning from the Portland Ducks 15 to 9, at Wrigley field, Los Angeles, where the Northerners had won the day before and almost knocked the props from under the league leaders. The victory kept the Stars a full game ahead of the Reds. Frank Shellenback was undoubtedly the hero of the battle. He not only pitched a brilliant game, but laced out a homer, a double and a single, all of which brought in six runs.

The Mission Reds bunched six runs in the first inning of their game against Seattle at Recreation park by a 7 to 3 score. Bombarding the Sacramento forces in the eleventh inning with six runs, the San Francisco Seals brought the long game to a climax with a 9 to 3 victory in the Capital city. "The great Mails" did the mound honors for the Seals, and all agreed he did them well.

The Los Angeles Angels had an easy time of it defeating Oakland in the latter's home camp 10 to 2, with Ed Baecht enjoying a good day.

Last Time Cubs-A's Met Both Had Great Infields

NEW YORK, Oct. 3. (AP)—The last time the Athletics and Cubs met in the world's series, 19 years ago, they presented two of the greatest, infield combinations of all time. Time has enhanced rather than dimmed the fame of Tinker-Evers-Chance double-play trio and the famous Davis-Collins-Barry-Baker quartet of 1910.

Neither of the infields that take their positions at Wrigley field next Tuesday compared as a whole with those ancient arrays. From an individual standpoint, however, the Cubs have one of the greatest performers of all time in Rogers Hornsby, while the Athletics have a great youngster in Jimmy Foxx. Frank Baker was the home run hero of his day, and Chance as a slugger, but neither had anything like the batting punch of Hornsby and Foxx.

"It" Charlie Grimm, the Cub field captain, is recovered sufficiently from a broken left wrist to be back at top form. Joe McCarthy's infield troupe, figures to have a slight defensive edge on their Mack rivals as well as a margin in hitting strength. "It" the double-play figures mean anything, the Cubs have a more effective combination, for they have registered over 160 twin killings, as compared to around 115 for the Athletics. At

but the Cub infielders have an advantage of about 10 points to the man with Foxx and Dykes, Hornsby and English topping their rivals by substantial margins.

Foxx is a much more dangerous batsman than Grimm, but the Cub captain is a consistent hitter, a more finished fielder and more experienced. Grimm was signed by Connie Mack when he was a kid of 17, back in 1916, but he never got a trial with the A's. This is his twelfth big league season and Foxx's fifth.

Max Bishop, the slender Mack second baseman, has a habit of rising to the occasion. He might turn out to be a series hero, but his record cannot compare with that of his great rival, Hornsby. Bishop may be a better man at going back after pop flies, but Hornsby has had a great year in the field as well as at bat. His batting mark is 140 points better than Bishop's and his experience is a vital Cub asset.

Joe Boley, out of the game a good part of the season, is a smoother-working shortstop than the 22-year-old Elwood English, but not so good a hitter. The versatile Jimmy Dykes, who can play any infield position acceptably, gives the A's a distinct edge at third base. Norman Millan is fast, and he has filled a spot that gave the Cubs a lot of early worry, but the ex-Yankee is not as seasoned or as dangerous a hitter as Dykes.

Instead, when the Stanford eleven battles the Strong Oregon University eleven Saturday in Stanford stadium, he will send his team out with a finely balanced and well timed attack that he calculates ought to bring victory.

One of the mainstays of the

Cardinal squad is Harlow Rother, who looms as the big ace of the Cardinal attack. He is being groomed for the right halfback position. Known as a great shot-putter, Rother is developing fast as a football player, practice sessions the last few days have indicated.

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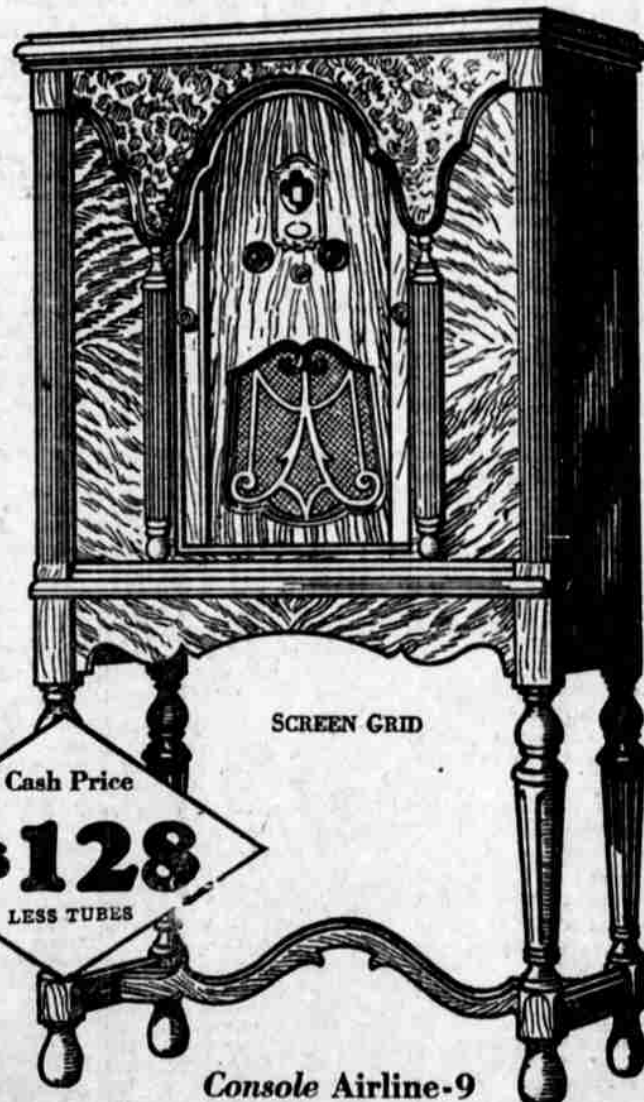
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
