Antelope In Lake County—
Antelope by the thousands are roaming in bands in Lake county, according to Dr. R. F. Wendling, who has returned from a fishing trip to Donner and Blitzen river, a stream heading in the upper reaches of the west side of Steens mountain in Harney county. "In the vicinity of Hart mountains," says the doctor, "we found great numbers of antelope. You will see a single buck, a band of 20 or so, and great herds which look as though they contain 1000. At all events, that section is thickly populated with the antelope. They are in a preserve and they have been well protected that they have multiplied notably. Hart mountain was formerly known as Warner mountain, and is in Warner valley, the western side of the mountain being very rugged. The name was changed when a cattle brand of heart shape was used by a cattle outfit in that vicinity. The mountain was covered with sheep when I was there a few days ago. There is a good road from Plush, Lake county, to the west side of the Steens mountains. That is, it is a good natural road save for ten miles at the Plush end, which is rough going. The road has been made by passing vehicles and does not show on the state highway maps. Fishing over in the Donner and Blitzen river was fine. There are few better fishing streams in the state, and it is a good stream because so few people know of its existence. When people ask me where I have been and I tell them into the Steens mountains country they want to know where that is."—Morning Oregonian.

TRESPASSING IS EXPLAINED

While hunting is the most important subject of thought and conversation, it might be well to quote from laws on trespassing passed by the state. According to Marion Barnes, local game warden, the game code is operative and its laws are all laws of the state relative to all hunting.

On page 31 of the game code will be found a section entitled, "Hunting Upon Inclosed Lands". The section reads as follows:

Section 21. No person shall hunt with a dog or gun upon the cultivated or inclosed land, or the occupied unclosed land of another without first obtaining permission from the owner, occupant or agent thereof. No prosecution shall be commenced under this section except upon complaint of owner or agent of such cultivated or inclosed land.
