AT THE THEATRES

AT THE PINE TREE

Tropic scenes of wonderful beauty, thrills such as a battle under water with a deep sea shark, and other vivid details of life in the tropics, embellish a romantic love story, in "The Pagan," Ramon Novarro's latest Metro-Goldwyn-Mayer picture, which comes Sunday to the Pine Tree theatre as a sound synchronized film with singing sequences which introduce Novarro's rich tenor voice to the motion picture public. He gives several renditions of "Pagan Love Song," the theme song of the production.

"The Pagan," adapted from the famous novel by John Russell, was directed by W. S. Van Dyke, who directed "White Shadows in the South Seas." The cast includes Renee Adoree, Donald Crisp, Dorothy Janis, and others of note, and the picture was made in its entirety in the islands. The company passed weeks in Tahiti and in the jungles to film this dramatic romance of tropical life.

Novarro plays a young half-caste islander, heir to a fortune and practically chief of a tribe, who is pitted against an itinerant trader in a struggle for the love of a native sweetheart. She, in turn, is the rival of a white adventuress on the island for the love of the youth. The white woman, "Madge," is played by Miss Adoree, while Miss Janis plays the native character. Novarro's sensational swimming through a shark-filled lagoon and his battle with one of the "tigers of the sea," the thrilling trek of hero and heroine into the primeval jungles, and other dramatic details surround a charming love story in the new picture. Historic spots on the island, and locales mentioned by the author, are used as settings for the new picture. Among them is the famous old church where the first missionaries Christianized the natives, and the queer little colony established on the shore near Tahiti by Zane Grey, the novelist.

Starting Sunday the new prices at the Orpheus will be twenty five cents for adults and ten cents for children.

AT THE LIBERTY

A big reward is in store for those seeing "The Royal Rider," which is headed for the Liberty Theatre, and scheduled to appear on Sunday.

Ken Maynard and his equine partner, Tarzan, are appearing in the fastest and most romantic picture they have ever made in "The Royal Rider," which presents an entirely new theme and plot for action. The story is not laid in the Old West nor does it involve Indians or stagecoaches. Europe, a boy king and an American governor in a small politically harried kingdom are the central and all-embracing features.

"The Royal Rider" is on the order of the "Gruelstark" theme, except there is no foreign princess or American diplomat to be seen. Instead a real Wild West rodeo is held on a thirty-acre arena in which royalty and peasant mingle and get the thrill of their lives watching these playmen risk their necks for entertainment.

"The Royal Rider" is a dressed-up attraction. Lavish sets showing the throne room with its court attaches in flowing robes of silks and ermine are to be seen. The entire story and action is a wide departure from the ordinary picture of this type. However, dress clothes

has not hampered the stunts and thrills of Maynard and his pals.

Harry J. Brown, supervisor of all of Ken's pictures, personally directed this Charles R. Rogers production for First National Pictures.

Others to be seen in support of Ken are Olive Hasbrouck, who has the leading feminine role; Phillip de Lacy, Joseph Burke, Harry Semels, Theodore Lorch and Billy Franey.

When the movies were in their earliest stages and were not taken at all seriously theatergoers enjoyed one particularly brilliant and unusually satisfying week every year. That was the week Maude Adams appeared.

Now the movies have to a large extent replaced the drama as the theatrical fare for the great majority, and so a movie with "the Maude Adams of the screen" as the star is a big attraction.

The picture is "The Road to Ruin" and the star Helen Foster.

This is the first picture in which Helen Foster has played a prominent part. She is a find, but not such an astonishing find as that. She is still in her teens and has been in front of a movie camera but a very few hours altogether. The good fortune for her and for the screen lies in the fact that she came along just at the time when "The Road to Ruin" was being made. The leading part is made for her and she makes the part.

Miss Foster has those same qualities of witfulness, daintiness and an indefinable charm that won such a warm place in the hearts of theatergoers for Maude Adams a generation ago. If she were on the stage it would be a certainty that the famous Barrie plays, such as "Peter Pan" and "The Little Minister," would be revived with Helen Foster as the star.

As it is her talents will be shown thru the medium of the camera and the prediction has been made by many critics that this child will become one of the brightest lights of the movies in a very short time. The reason is very easily seen in her performance in "The Road to Ruin," showing the last time today at the Vox theatre.

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INDIANS WILL HAVE HEARING ON OLD LAWS

A roll of the Indians who are members of California tribes is being compiled by Fred A. Baker, of the Indian service and formerly superintendent of the Klamath reservation.

The California Indians have been granted an opportunity of bringing suit against the government for lands said taken away from them in 1851 under 18 unratified treaties.

Mr. Baker is at present getting the names of Indians of all tribes in California and their descendants particularly in Siskiyou, Del Norte, Trinity and Modoc counties.

It is believed that some of the men of these tribes or their descendants are living in Klamath county and Mr. Baker wished them all to meet October 12 at Klamath Indian Agency where he will be present to take their names.

This will be the only hearing in Klamath county and the Indians will be registered at no cost to them, the government paying all expenses.

COMMITTEE TO FRAME THREE NEW MEASURES

Mr. and Mrs. A. M. Thomas left last night for Portland where Mr. Thomas will meet with members of the Granges of other counties and as a committee they will frame three initiatory measures.

The measures will be submitted to a vote of the people at the next election. They provide proposed laws creating the office of lieutenant governor in the state; limiting the time limit in electric water power filings, and allowing the forming of power districts by communities.

While Mr. Thomas is working with the committee, Mrs. Thomas will be a guest of Mrs. Bert Haney. Mr. Thomas is editor of the Klamath Basin Progress.
