When Hell Broke Loose In Colorado Prison



Here is the scene at the Colorado penitentiary at the height of the convict outbreak, with clouds of smoke rolling from burning buildings while convicts, guards and citizens engaged in a murderous battle, which ended only after seven guards and numerous convicts were slain. This picture, carried by plane from Denver to Chicago and transmitted by telephoto from there to the San Francisco bureau of NEA Service, shows (1) cellhouse No. 1, destroyed by fire; (2) cellhouse No. 3, where rioters murdered guards and selves; (3) where prison guards rallied after the first attack by mutinous convicts, and (4) where national guardsmen, with machine guns, lined up at the west gate.
