

FIND BODY OF CULT'S VICTIM

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Rhoads home. The dogs had been pets of the dead girl, and, according to the story told by Mrs. Rhoads, represented the seven tones of Gabriel's trumpet, which should proclaim resurrection morn. The investigation was started at the request of Clifford R. Dabney, wealthy Venice, Cal., oil operator, who alleges that after becoming a member of the cult, he advanced approximately \$40,000 to Mrs. Blackburn, pending the completion of a book she was writing, to be known as "The Sixth Seal," and upon which the colony based its beliefs. Mrs. Blackburn's arrest on an embezzlement charge disclosed activities of the cult which brought revelations leading to the discovery of the girl's body.

Mother Tells Story
Her husband standing silently by, Mrs. Rhoads led investigators to her step-daughter had died of diphtheria, January 1, 1925. Believing that she would be resurrected, the body was placed in an improvised, copper-lined casket made by Mr. Rhoads, packed in ice, and for more than a year had been transported from one dwelling to another, as the family changed residences. Despairing of the resurrection that never came, Mrs. Rhoads told officers that the burial took place February 10, 1926.

Casket Uncarved
Following the recital of her story, Mrs. Rhoads led officers to the bedroom and ordered her husband to lift a trap in the floor. With shovels provided by Rhoads, officers dug into the ocean soaked earth, and within half an hour two caskets—one containing the body of the girl; the other the remains of seven dogs—were resting on the bedroom floor.

Suspect Poisoning
Both caskets were taken to the coroner's office. Due to their airtight construction, officers said, the body of the girl and the dogs were in fair state of preservation. After six hours of post mortem examination of the girl's body, Dr. H. F. Wagner, county autopsy surgeon, said he was unable to determine the cause of death, and the body was turned to the county chemist for tests of suspected poisoning and for further examination today. Mr. and Mrs. Rhoads are being held as material witnesses. No criminal charges as yet have been filed against the foster parents or other members of the cult in connection with the girl's death. The parents are subject to prosecution on a charge of failing to report death, and also of attempting a private burial, police say.

TAX BOARD TO HELP KLAMATH

The state tax commission will sit with the county board of tax equalization on the protests of Klamath county timber owners on the 1929 assessment roll, it was learned yesterday by W. T. Lee, assessor, from Charles Galloway, a member of the board.

In the letter Mr. Galloway stated that members of the board will arrive Thursday evening and wish immediately to start work on reviewing the protests and examination of the reports of the hearings on the protests which were heard before the county board of tax equalization.

Adjourn Until Friday
The county board of tax equalization yesterday adjourned to meet Friday, October 11. Under the state law the board which convened on September 9 is automatically adjourned on October 9, which would be next Wednesday.

By adjourning the board may again meet with the state tax body to settle the protest matter. The county board of tax equalization invited the state tax commission to meet with them when County Judge Fred R. Goddard disqualified himself as a member of the board, leaving only two members, C. R. DeLap, county clerk, and Assessor Lee. Judge Goddard stated that since he is named with the county as defendant in a suit filed in federal court with some of the protesting timbermen as plaintiffs he feels that he should not sit on their protests now.

Eight timber companies are protesting the 1929 roll and complain and allege that mixed woods should not be taxed, that the zoning system adopted this year is unfair, that a reduction of 15 per cent should be made in the cruise for breakage, fire loss and beetle loss; some of them also challenge the Edgar and Cullison cruise completed in 1927 and on which the 1928 and 1929 assessments were levied.

Expect Final Decision
Charles V. Galloway, Earl Fischer and John Carlin are members of the state tax commission who will sit with Assessor Lee and County Clerk DeLap to adjudicate the protests of the timbermen. It is felt that with the help of the entirely unprejudiced state commission members sitting on the board the timbermen will be satisfied with the decision rendered and further that the commission members, with vast experience in tax matters, may be able to work out a solution that will be satisfactory

in the future. Timber companies who have protested are the Weyerhaeuser Timber company, the Long-Bell Lumber company, Shevlin-Hixon, Walker and Hovey, Gilchrist Timber company, Ralph E. Gilchrist, Fremont Land and Timber company, and the Yawkey Timber company.

County Clerk DeLap is ill and confined to his home at the present time.

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about 100 yards when they encountered a barbed wire fence. Mr. Miller had crawled under the fence and was waiting on the other side for Montellus and Caywood who started to go under at the same time.

Montellus' gun was accidentally discharged and Miller fell to the ground.

Inquest Held
An inquest was held this afternoon at the Earl Whitlock funeral home by Henry V. Joyaux. The coroners jury was composed of A. B. Collins, C. E. Riley, Roy Durbin, Robert H. Galloway, James Webb and Frank Ward. The juryman reported that the affair was an accident and Montellus will not be held.

Dr. F. C. Adams, physician and surgeon, was called as witness and reported the autopsy. Eva Michaelson, nurse at the Hillside hospital was also called as a witness in the inquest.

The autopsy revealed that the humerus in Miller's arm had been broken and that the shot from the 12 gauge shot-gun had formed a circle of about 2 1/2 inches in diameter. This made an opening or cavity which was filled with a quart and a half of blood. The shot had penetrated his right shoulder and gone through his chest wall making a hole of about an inch and splintered his right rib and entered his lung, finally lodging in his back bone.

Hemorrhage Caused Death
The direct cause of death was given as internal hemorrhage caused by a gun-shot.

Montellus was asked by T. R. Gillenwaters, deputy district attorney, to give a statement.

Mr. Montellus reported that he had scratched his hand and evidently shifted his gun in some manner so that it came in contact with a taut piece of the barbed wire, pulling the trigger down and discharging the gun.

An unsigned note on the seat of the car said: "If anyone finds me I ask them not to report it. Take my car and contents and leave me here. No one whom I know knows where I am or will try to find me."

An insurance policy made out to the woman gave her address at Volney hotel, Spokane, Wash.

Prohibition Violation Is Charged. Two Women, Ten Men Held

In a roundup of alleged prohibition law violators, federal, state, county and city officers arrested 12 here Friday night and yesterday. Two of those arrested were women.

Woman Denies Guilt
Mrs. Martha Rasmussen, of the Traveler's rooms, 804 Main, was arrested by officers and yesterday entered a plea of not guilty to charges of sale and possession of intoxicating liquor.

Al Troy, Altamont Acres, was arrested and entered a plea of guilty to charges of sale and possession. Sentence was deferred by Justice of the Peace Barnes. Thomas A. Oliver and Herbert Rogers were taken into custody at the Pastime pool hall and are charged with sale of intoxicating liquor. The officers allege that the two are "hip pocket bootleggers."

Mrs. Cary Held
Charles Riedel, arrested on the old Fort Klamath road, posted \$150 bail on charges of sale and possession of intoxicants and trial was set for Monday at 10 a. m.

Mrs. L. W. Cary and R. V. Morris were arrested at 1505 Main street and officers state that at the time of the arrest they were in possession of 13 gallons of moonshine whiskey and gin. They are charged with sale and possession. Mrs. Cary is the wife of L. W. "Whitey" Cary, who is now serving a 13 months' sentence in McNeil Island federal penitentiary on a liquor charge. Mrs. Cary just recently filed suit for divorce from Mr. Cary.

Service Station Man Held
Jack Miles, who has once before been convicted on a liquor charge, and Jim McKenna were arrested at a house in Altamont Acres and are charged with sale and possession of moonshine.

Charges of sale and possession have also been lodged against D. E. McMillan, 317 Martin street. Officers state that McMillan was convicted of a similar charge previously.

Charles Davis, of the Superior Service station on South Sixth

street, was arrested on charges of sale and possession of liquor. Officers seized 11 pints at the station, they state.

Officers Louis Mueller, Clarence Worden, Deputy Sheriff Fred Robinson and Lloyd Linville and in cases where arrests were made within the city, Chief of Police Keith Ambrose, were the arresting officers.

REPORTED MORE GUNS SECRETED

CANYON CITY, Colo., Oct. 7. (AP)—Tennessee, brought about by a belief more guns were secreted about the Colorado state penitentiary here, today gripped watchful guards and officials.

Coincident with putting a second convict in solitary confinement, search of the institution yesterday revealed two revolvers hidden in a coal pile. The noose dangled close to three heads as a result of the investigation and findings thus far, it was generally understood, with the official inquiry just getting underway in full force.

One official, unnamed, said he was certain five convicts in the prison were armed—that is, they had arms hidden which a careful search had failed to disclose. The official would not comment on the basis for the belief.

LISBON, Portugal, Oct. 7. (AP)—Large tracts of land were under water and thousands of olive groves ruined in central Portugal today after a violent storm passed through that section during the week-end. The village of Rideira was destroyed. Many villages were isolated and no trains were running.
