FIRE PREVENTION WEEK

Fire Prevention Week for the state of Oregon officially began on Sunday and this week from October 6th to 12th, inclusive, has been set aside by the governor for special observance of the causes of fire hazards and of means of their prevention.

Following is the proclamation recently made by the governor: "The annual loss of life and property by fire in the state and nation is enormous. Last year the nation's fire loss amounted to four hundred seventy-two million dollars, and that of the state of Oregon to six million seven hundred thousand dollars. Up to September 1st of the present year, Oregon's loss by fire amounted to approximately three million dollars, not including the tremendous devastation visited upon our great forest wealth. Fully eighty per cent of this loss is attributed to thoughtlessness and carelessness.

Each year, as a means of awakening the people to the enormous extent of this waste and the necessity for more determined resistance to this annual economic loss, a week is set aside for special observance of the causes of fire hazards and of means of their prevention. This year by presidential pronouncement, the week of October 6th to 12th, inclusive, has been designated as Fire Prevention Week.

Believing that every effort now exerted in behalf of precaution against fire will yield abundant future returns in the conservation of precious human lives and valuable properties,

Now, therefore, I, L. L. Patterson, governor of the state of Oregon, by virtue of the authority in me vested, and in conformance to the proclamation of the president of the United States, do hereby proclaim the week of October 6th to 12th as Fire Prevention Week, and I sincerely urge all of the people of Oregon, all industrial, commercial, civic and fraternal organizations, and the press and pulpit of the state to unite in this annual season of observance of precautionary measures to the end that the scourge of fire may be abated.

In testimony whereof, I have hereunto set my hand and caused the seal of the state of Oregon to be affixed on this 27th day of September, A. D. 1929.

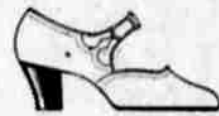

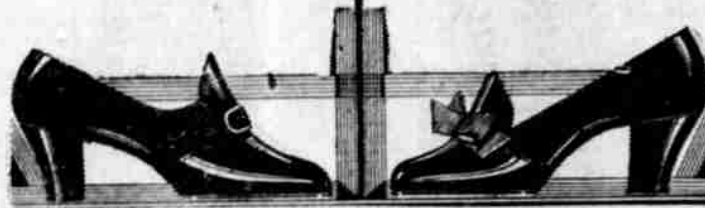
