A party of Weyerhaeuser timber company officials visited in Klamath Falls yesterday for a few hours and then returned last night to Tacoma, Wash., by train. They inspected the Weyerhaeuser mill while here.

While they were shown over the mill by R. R. Macartney, manager here, and Lloyd R. Crosby, assistant manager, they had no statement to make last night relative to the progress of the construction work or the approximate opening date of the mill.

When the matter of the timber tax protests of the 1929 rolls was mentioned and it was brought out that members of the state tax commission would be here to help decide on the protests, Mr. E. H. Tietcomb, general manager of the Weyerhaeuser company stated, "I am very pleased to hear that. He would not discuss the subject further."

George S. Long, chairman of the board of directors of the Weyerhaeuser Timber company and a vice president of the company, headed the party composed of F. H. Tietcomb, general manager; F. E. Weyerhaeuser, director; H. Irvine, director; Charles H. Ingram, assistant to the general manager; W. L. McCormick, secretary of the company, and A. W. Clapp, also connected with the company.
