

County Needs Money; Tax Payments Help Situation

With taxes being paid at the rate of about \$2,000 a day, the county may have sufficient money to run it during October, it was learned yesterday from a survey of the balances in the various funds and a comparison of the balances with the expenses for the month of September.

There is at the present time in the current expense fund from which all general expenses and salaries of county officers are paid \$14,169.51. During the month of September expenses paid from this fund amounted to \$15,153.77. With the second half of 1928 taxes being paid in it appears that the county will be able to "pay cash" this month.

Schools Worst Hit

Probably the county school, and county high schools will be the hardest run for money during the month, with many of them already operating on funds borrowed by the boards of directors of the various districts.

According to officials in the tax collector's office the people are paying the second half of the taxes at the rate of about \$2,000 a day. The treasurer's books show that \$316,882 is yet unpaid of half of the 1928 levy. \$861,674.23 should have been paid by May 15. \$544,792 has been paid on the 1928 levy, of \$1,723,348.57.

County Expenses Cut

The tax collector has on hand the present time approximately \$12,000 collected since September 28, when the last turnover was made to the county treasurer.

Some irrigation districts, according to the county treasurer, have already issued some protested warrants.

In the county school fund there is at present \$6,789.19; in the city grade school fund \$30,142.77; in the Klamath Union high school unit No. 2 fund \$2,811.70. Other county high school units have small amounts in the treasury.

County expenses where it is possible, have been cut to the minimum by the county court and the elected officers.

Suits, Protests Pending

Meanwhile, the suit of a number of timber companies is still pending in federal court and has not yet been set for trial. The suit is to restrain the county from collecting the 1928 tax levies under the budget drawn up a year ago. The timber companies contend that the budget is illegal and improperly drawn.

Members of the state tax commission will arrive Thursday evening to sit with Assessor W. T. Lee and County Clerk C. R. DeLap on protests of the 1929 rolls as filed by seven timber companies of the county. It is hoped by county officers that the protests and tax matters can be adjusted satisfactorily to both the companies and the county when the matters are taken up Friday.

For the benefit of the public, the News this morning is running the complete list of balances on hand, as shown by the books in the county treasurer's office at the close of business September 30.

The News also is printing the expenses from each fund from which money was expended in September.
