PROSPECT OF RAIN CAUSES WORRY TO FAN

Winning Streak May Be Broken by Bad Weather

PHILADELPHIA, Oct. 10. (AP)—Baseball fans in this world series town who have been on the verge of going into ecstasies over the double victory of the Athletics over the Cubs, found something to worry about today.

The weather man predicted a possibility of rain tomorrow, the day of the first series game here.

Rain is the worst thing that could happen on Friday, in the opinion of 40,000 rabid fans, who have waited fifteen years to see a world's series tussle.

Tickets Boosted
With the jubilant Athletics on their way home from Chicago, ticket speculators boosted prices substantially today. Two victories over the devastating Cubs, the speculators contended, put gold borders on the pasteborders for the three games to be played here. They were abroad in the land early, quoting \$80 to \$100 for a three-game pair of tickets that cost the original purchaser \$33. Heretofore the prices asked ranged from \$50 to \$75.

Warrants Don't Worry
Fifty "John Doe" warrants, said to have been issued for the arrest of speculators, seemed to have little effect on their activities. "Sandwich men" advertising ticket agencies have appeared in such numbers that at times they have the appearance of cluttering up pedestrian traffic. If the A's had come back from Chicago two down, tickets would have been worth about \$2 per game, speculators said.

Section Not Listed
One speculator's office, where tickets are bought and sold, reported the purchase of a block of seats last night, and upon checking up with the club found that the seats were in a section not listed at Shibe park. Further examination revealed that the stock upon which the counterfeits were printed, and the printing itself, differed slightly from that of the genuine tickets. The men arrested had about \$250 in their possession, and several sets of the alleged counterfeits.

LEWIS TAKES IOWAN AGAIN

PORTLAND, Oct. 10. (AP)—Ed (Strangler) Lewis, the heavy-weight wrestling champion, for the second time in three weeks defeated Howard Cantonwine, Iowa, taking two out of three falls here last night. The first fall was one of the fastest on record here, Lewis taking it in 17 seconds with a toe hold. In doing so, Lewis crossed up everybody, including Cantonwine, who expected him to use his famous headlock. Cantonwine took the second session in 19 minutes 45 seconds, when he spread Lewis' broad shoulders on the mat with a reverse double wristlock. Lewis took the third fall in 8 minutes 15 seconds, when, after Cantonwine was bearing down with a wristlock, Lewis suddenly smashed him on the chin with the heel of his right hand. Cantonwine went down, partly stunned, and Lewis was on him with all his 230 pounds.

Des Anderson, ex-national amateur champion in the 145-pound division, took one fall from Cal Herman in the 30-minute preliminary.

McLARNIN GETS K. O. ON SAMMY

NEW YORK, Oct. 10. (AP)—Jimmie McLarnin has learned that the bigger fellows can fall just as hard as the little ones, if they are hit on the right spot. Jimmy made his debut as a full-fledged welterweight last night, and his punch produced the same result against Sergeant Sammy Baker as it did against Jimmy's opponents in three lighter classes. The result was a first round knockout. It took one minute for McLarnin to establish a firm connection between his right fist and Baker's head. The New York veteran went down for a count of nine only a few seconds later, and arose just to take a final blow from Jimmy's right hand that ended the battle in two minutes of the first round.

Baker did not recover for several minutes after he was counted out. McLarnin tipped the scales at 144 pounds, and had to concede a two-pound advantage to his adversary.

SAN FRANCISCO, Oct. 10. (AP)—Things looked mighty bad today for the Hollywood Stars in their struggle against the San Francisco Mission Reds for the championship of the Pacific Coast league. They were looking for a silver lining as the third game of the post-season pennant series was scheduled to begin, but the clouds that obscured their chances were quite dark.

So far, the Mission Reds have maintained a strangle hold on the lead, defeating the Stars twice in the two opening games of the series. Two defeats in a row in a series of only seven games is a difficult obstacle to overcome, and the Stars know it. When the Reds won the second game by a score of 8 to 6 at Recreation Park yesterday, the Stars saw their pennant chances begin to glimmer. Should the bay city club win two more straight, the series would end with the fourth, and the pennant with all the spoils would go to "Red" Killifer's outfit.

Although the two clubs are evenly matched, and their chances were conceded to have been equal, both games won by the Reds were bagged by superior pitching. In yesterday's game Bert Cole pitched for the Missions, and he admitted that the going was anything but easy. He credited the bat work of his team mates with having in a large measure brought the victory.
