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FORMER CITY BUSINESSMAN SAID SUICIDE

Lawrence Rich's Body Found in Frisco; Woman Story Investigated

Lawrence B. Rich, who died in San Francisco last Saturday, presumably from suicidal intent, was formerly a business man of Klamath Falls and was well known to a number of people who still reside in this city. His body was found in a Van Ness avenue apartment Saturday. He had swallowed poison. Police are investigating the motives behind the act. A sealed note addressed to a "Mr. Jenko" was left by Rich and is in possession of the San Francisco coroner's office. Evidence that a "mystery woman" who had figured in Rich's life was being investigated by authorities, according to reports. Police were also informed that Rich had recently lost his position as floor manager in one of the large department stores and was beset with financial difficulties. His wife is an invalid in a sanitarium. Rich was owner of a shoe store in this city over 10 years ago. According to reports he had married another woman, though his first wife was still living and was an invalid in a sanitarium. While he was living here, Mrs. Rich came to Klamath Falls upon learning that he had married again, according to reports. It was only a very short time after this incident when Mr. Rich suddenly sold his business to Mr. Van Bellen and left for the south. A Klamath Falls woman who recently visited in San Francisco reported meeting Mr. Rich in the department store where he was employed. This was but several days before his body was found. The exact date of his business activities in Klamath could not be learned, but while here he resided in a house on High street owned by E. J. Murray.
