

ANCIENT MAYA CITIES FOUND BY LINDBERGH

Party Discovers Four Uncharted Places in Mexico.

ILA COZUMEL, Quintana Roo, Mexico, Oct. 11. (AP)—Four ancient Maya cities, hitherto uncharted, were discovered Thursday by Colonel Charles A. Lindbergh, his wife and their companions in several hours of flying in inland Quintana Roo.

The first was sighted within an hour after the party left Belize, British Honduras, and shortly after it crossed the Rio Hondo into the territory. General definite mounds set about a triangular plot were found, and the location was mapped carefully, although it was too cloudy for photographing it.

Mrs. Lindbergh, wearing light knickerbockers, high boots, blue shirt and a silk scarf about her head, herself discovered the second ruins, which at first seemed just a bit of white wall glistening above the deep green of the bush. Three small towns finally were located nearby. Dr. A. V. Kidder, Carnegie institute scientist, believing them to be, probably, the center of a Maya city which flourished a millennium ago.

Indians Scared
When the third city was discovered later in the afternoon, Santa Cruz Indians beneath ran from the plane as it flew above them.

Colonel Lindbergh sighted the fourth ruin, probably the most interesting find of the day, a great mound rising 60 or 70 feet above the ground, with its crumbling walls visible from as far as 12 miles away. Dr. Kidder described it as a perfect type of Maya empire edifice. Although the ruin was within 30 miles of Santa Cruz de Bravo, no human habitations were seen.

Two other cities, well known to archaeologists who have investigated the ruins in this region, then were picked up by the party aboard the plane as it headed for Isla Cozumel. One of these was the city of Coba, not larger than the four ruins the aviators had discovered for themselves.

OREGON TOWNS GET LOW RATE

PORTLAND, Oct. 11. (AP)—Cities and towns in the territory adjacent to Portland will profit by reductions in power rates which have been announced tentatively by power companies and the public service commission, members of the commission said today.

When the new schedules are made effective the cities of Vancouver, Grays Harbor, Salem, Oregon City and other towns will have much lower power rates than are enjoyed by small cities and towns in the Puget Sound district.

The last few details of the schedules were in the hands of T. Griffith, president of the Portland Electric Power company, and G. W. Talbot, president of the Northwestern Electric. Engineers of the power companies were still studying the new schedules.

CAUSE OF DIABETIS

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PROF. COLLINS OUTLINES NEXT LECTURE TOPIC

Following his lecture of last week, in the course in literature in England and America in the 1920's, in which he pointed out evidence of the break in literature of the 1920's with that of the twenty years just preceding, Professor Wilkie Nelson Collins, instructor in the University of Oregon evening class which meets regularly each Friday evening at 7 o'clock in the City Library, will tell of the definite things in novels, plays and poetry that writers in the 1920's think they have done to constitute this direct break. There will also be a rapid survey of the newer people who seem to count for most in the 1920's both in England and America.

"One good way of seeing up any generation is to find out what it cares for most in the

traditional material that it uses," argues Professor Collins. The subject of his lecture on Friday evening of this week will be "Out of the Past," and he will talk about the shifts of emphasis in valuing old literary reputations that make the 1920's seem different from the naughts and teens of the twentieth century.

During the next two or three weeks he will discuss at some length the sensationalists, insisting that they color more than anything else all modern writing, and then he will take up the psychological novel and show its present intensified program and what various writers of the 1920's have done with it.

Those who missed the first meeting of this class but who wish to take the course should attend this meeting on Friday evening if possible. Enrollments in the course will be permitted as late as the third meeting on October 13, after which registration will be closed. There are
