COAST LEAGUE PENNANT GOES TO HOLLYWOOD

Four Straight Games of Series Taken by Actors

LOS ANGELES, Oct. 14. (A P.)—The Hollywood Stars, a team which could place no better than fourth in the first half of the Pacific Coast championship split season, but which forged ahead fast in the final half to finish on top, today possessed the league championship title, the Mission Reds, who won the first half and pushed Hollywood hard for second half honors, bowed to the stars in the play off series which ended Sunday with a spectacular 8 to 3 victory by Oscar Vitt's sheiks.

After dropping the first two games of the play-off, Hollywood triumphed with four straight wins to bring to owner Bill Lane his first pennant after a score of years in coast baseball here and at Salt Lake City. The whirlwind finish was staged before 15,000 fans at Wrigley Field, who saw the Stars pull out of a 3-3 tie with a spectacular five-run assault in the eighth inning. Four singles and a double, plus two errors when the Reds obligingly blew up, wrote the 1929 league history.

Frank Shellback, Hollywood hurler, clinched the hero honors of the championship series by pitching his second straight win and hitting his third home run of the play off. Holding the Missions to nine scattered hits, he would have been uncured upon, but for two circuit clouts which accounted for the losers three tallies. It also brought Shellback's victories for the season to twenty-eight.

Mickey Heston, who swatted out three Hollywood runs with a homer and a double, Dod Lee, who checked a Mission threat with a sensational catch of a line drive, and Bill Rummel, who, after being hit in the head by a pitcher ball Friday, left the hospital yesterday to pinch hit in the eighth and start the winning rally with a single that brought in a run, were other heroes of the title winning game.

PAISLEY MEN PURCHASE EWES

John V. Withers and W. H. Harvey, sheepmen of Paisley, have recently shipped into Lake county 300 head of registered yearling Hampshire ewes from the flock of J. N. Reynolds of Corvallis, Oregon.

The sheep were collected from a flock of five hundred registered ewes, and are of outstanding quality in their type. The ewes of this flock have been shearing 11 pounds per head in the valley and are even expected to do better in this part of the state.

Some stud rams of very excellent quality have been selected to breed to this flock of sheep and some outstanding stud and range rams are expected from them. Two of the stud rams represent the best Hampshire blood in the United States, that of the "Thousand Springs Farm" of Wendell, Idaho, owned by Minnie B. Miller, president of the American Hampshire Sheep Breeders association.

Another one of the stud rams represents the blood of the finest Hampshire flocks in England; that of G. Kalens Water's Burcham Manor flock.

John McGraw, the manager of the New York Giants, usually pitched the World Series games from the bench. As the opposing clubs were continually looking at him, he gave his signs to his catcher, through a player sitting near him. McGraw was a firm believer in curve balls in a pinch and players on the other clubs often referred to him as "the best curve ball pitcher on the Giants staff."

A catcher on the Giant team almost had to have a "rubber neck" as he had to look to the Giant bench before every ball pitched.

Art Nahr and his catcher, Earl Smith, used to "cover up" and do their own "guessing" by means of a private "fast" and "curve" ball sign that was given with McGraw's sign from the bench.

Nehr tells me he kept track of twenty signs and that the Giant Boss was "wrong" nineteen times.

Conference Teams Pointing For Next Saturday's Games

SAN FRANCISCO, Oct. 14. (A P.)—Over the gridiron trial those two faithful lieutenants of football—victory and defeat—have dashed again in a spectacular sortie that either enlisted willing cohorts or chopped down new victims to the cause of inflated pigskins.

Four survivors in the Pacific Coast conference championship campaign answered the call to arms today. Three had fallen by the wayside to join as many more already removed from the list of contenders in preceding Saturday battles.

Californians Lead
Southern California, Stanford and California remained as standard bearers in the south sector. Idaho's Vandals shouldered the conference title burden in the north. All were victors in conference conflicts last Saturday. Two will risk their chances again next week end.

Keyed up with their latest triumph, a smashing 57-0 setback to the University of California at Los Angeles Bruins, the Cardinals of Stanford set about today preparing for an invading Oregon State eleven next Saturday. Those warriors from the timber country already have bowed to the power that is southern California's but Coach Glenn Warner has too much at stake to take chances at this time.

Idaho Looks Strong
Idaho, winner over Montana last Saturday, 19-0, will come to Portland in an effort to vanquish an old time northern rival, University of Oregon. Although defeated by Stanford, the Oregon squad, nevertheless, figures to be more than a door mat for Idaho. In fact, a "second guess" may come in handy on the game.

Trojans Take "Breather"
Conquerors of Washington by the overwhelming score of 43-0, Southern California's Trojans will take on a "breather" in Occidental college, meanwhile pointing for Stanford a week later. All other things being equal, the meeting between Southern California and Stanford appears to be the test from which will rise the under-structure of the conference championship.

Bears Unimpressive
Undefeated but thus far unimpressive in their play, California's Bears were enroute today to Philadelphia for an inter-sectional struggle with the University of Pennsylvania eleven next Saturday. California turned back Washington State last week, 14-0.

Each loser in a conference game, Washington and Washington State meet at Pullman in their annual classic with State

honors as well as conference standings, at stake.

FINES LEVIED THIS MORNING
