Mass Production Of Laws

AMERICA'S mania for mass production in all lines is amply demonstrated in the activity of the various legislative bodies of the country. Keeping pace with the American frenzy that "there ought to be a law" for this or that, more than 50,000 measures were introduced in the various state legislatures in the current yearly sessions; 16,291 new laws were enacted in 43 out of the 48 states—or nearly 46 new laws for every day of the year. This does not include the laws enacted by congress.

These figures were made public recently by Michael J. Hickey, secretary of the National Industrial Council, who, in submitting a report to representatives of manufacturing associations from all sections of the country, had the following comment to make:

"The merry whirligig of American lawmaking," said Mr. Hickey, "went on apace in the more than 43 states where legislative sessions have been held in 1929. Official figures gathered by the council from the various states show a total of 52,017 bills were introduced and 16,291 new laws finally enacted in 43 states.

"It is earnestly to be hoped that President Hoover's law enforcement commission will not fail to give careful thought to our annual and biennial rush for making new laws in large volume. Long and close observation leads to the conclusion that so long as we continue to indulge our American passion for mass production of legislation, we cannot hope to attain or restore general public respect for law, nor expect effective law enforcement."

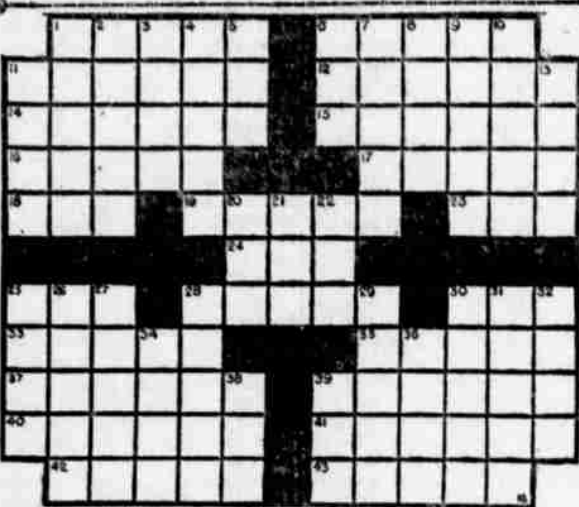

DAILY LETTER ON AFFAIRS AT U. S. CAPITAL

The Shearer Affair Raises Some Interesting Points—Too Loud Patriots Hereafter Will Be Open to Suspicion—and Someone May Sell Charlie Schwab a Gold Brick.

WASHINGTON, Oct. 16.—So many lessons are to be drawn from the expose in which Mr. William Baldwin Shearer has been the central figure that one may as well start enumerating them and stop only when the space gives out.

One of the first concerns patriotic propaganda. It has been said by effectively demonstrated that those who beat the drum loudest and most incessantly for military and naval preparedness may not be the most patriotic patriots. Sometimes they are just working for shipbuilding or munitions companies. Mr. Shearer appears to have shown the advisability of checking up on the antecedents and connections of such drumbeaters whenever they get especially noisy.

The super-patriots who are forever warning us of British, French, Bolshevik, Czechoslovakian or Senegambian plots to encompass our national destruction may in the future find themselves viewed with more suspicion. Mr. Shearer was forever spreading such stories and still is.

They Have Varied Ideas
Sometimes such trouble-makers are only trying to collect money for forged documents. Sometimes they are looking for or keeping jobs on the payroll of glib patriotic societies or shipbuilders. Sometimes they are only persons with nationalistic phobias who may or may not hate the idea of world peace.

Another series of lessons concerns either the ethics or the apathy of big business men. For purposes of this learned dispatch, one need not necessarily disbelieve most of the stories told by the wealthy shipbuilders who hired Mr. Shearer, although there is a widespread tendency to do so. To take the more kindly view and to believe their own admissions, they were just suckers. They were "jazzed off their feet" by the loud, aggressive Mr. Shearer.

Now, when a bunch of hard-headed shipbuilders can be persuaded by a man of Shearer's background to pay \$25,000 so that he can take a joy ride to Geneva and perpetrate his pernicious whims, the hard-headedness and perceptiveness of such gents certainly comes into question. Gold-brick salesmen, blue sky operators and other confidence men will surely be compensated on their doorsteps. The only view which doesn't reflect on their intelligence simply demolishes their reputation for veracity, for they insist that they didn't hire Shearer to force an outcome at the Geneva conference which would give them more cruisers to build and that what he did for them was worthless.

Having learned that much about some of our big business men, we may be about to be given another lesson concerning the memory of patriots—especially the memory of the pious and fearful Mr. Charles M. Schwab, whom Shearer calls "the Star of Bethlehem." Either Mr. Schwab, man of vision, self-sacrificing genius and self-confessed idealist has no memory whatever or Mr. Shearer is a damned liar or Mr. Schwab is a damned liar. These are the only possibilities.

For after Mr. Schwab had denied that he ever saw Shearer, Mr. Shearer testified that his employment by the Bethlehem and other companies grew out of his conversation with none other than Mr. Schwab. Thus the next lesson to be learned will concern this issue of veracity or memory and the question is being asked what reason Shearer could possibly have had to connect such a story.

Other lessons which have

been taught if not yet fully learned concern the conduct of high naval officers at naval arms conferences. There's another issue of veracity, for Mr. Drew Pearson, the newspaper correspondent, says members of our naval delegation at Geneva were trying to queer the conference and the naval officers themselves deny it.

The Power of a Forgery
But the gullibility of our politicians in public office when confronted by forged documents appears to have been re-demonstrated. Shearer was totting around a document purporting to be the outline of a British plot against us and after he showed it to former Senator James A. Reed the fiery Jim unbored himself of one of the hottest big navy, anti-British speeches heard for many years.

Even an expert from the Navy Intelligence Department, where greater faith is placed in forged documents than anywhere else except the State Department and Army Intelligence Division, has now denied the document's authenticity. Goodness only knows how many members of Congress and the cabinet shivered all night between the sheets at the time Shearer was showing the thing around Washington.

SPECIAL TRAIN PLANNED FOR ALTURAS GAME

So much interest is being manifested in the football game to be played between the Klamath high school and Alturas school teams Saturday afternoon, that plans are being made to run a special train from this city to Alturas and return over the Modoc Northern line.

The special will be run not only for the team and rooters, but also others who may desire to see the new line and were unable to go on the first excursion. It is planned to have three coaches, one for the team and high school band, one for the rooters, and one for those not particularly interested in football but desiring to see the new line, the country it traverses and Alturas, as well as the new Pickering mill.

If the Southern Pacific decides to run the train, a round-trip fare of \$4.20 will be charged, which is the regular one-way fare rate. Any businessmen or residents wishing to take the trip are requested to call Paul T. Jackson at Klamath high school and make reservations.
