KRUSE ROLLS CHICAGO BOY

PORTLAND, Oct. 17, (AP)—A double heavyweight wrestling bill here last night resulted in a victory for Bob Kruse, Oswego, over Harry Demetral, Chicago, in two out of three falls, and a semi-final one-hour draw between Al Karasick and Kara Ar Sian Pasha, the Russian and Turkish exponents. Karasick and Pasha wrestled under the new system of rounds, wrestling ten minutes, and resting two. They went five rounds at a fast clip without either one being able to take a fall.

Kruse's size and weight were too much for Demetral. It was a rough match. Kruse took the first fall in 14 minutes 46 seconds with a wristlock. Demetral won the second fall with a reverse lock in 19 minutes 8 seconds. The match ended suddenly and dramatically when after seven minutes, Kruse shot his opponent to the floor with a heavy body slam and then dropped on him. Demetral had to be carried from the ring.

Football Fumbles Like Missed Putt

When football rule makers reduce the hazard of fumbling, they take an opposite stand to the rule making bodies of other sports. In reality, fumbles are just as much a part of the game of football as are errors in baseball and missed short putts in golf.

It is the human element of tension that keeps all games from becoming too machine-like and colorless. And the average coach and manager recognizes this. John McGraw never censored a player for making a physical error. "Errors are part of the game, just as much as base hits," he used to say. But he had a weak link in his argument. No pitcher could ever make him admit that bases on balls were part of the game, unless the opposing pitcher was dealing out the free passes.

SCHISLER NOT DOWN HEARTED

OREGON STATE COLLEGE, Corvallis, Oct. 17, (AP)—Oregon State's squad of 33 footballers were Palo Alto bound today, determined to end the string of northern defeats at the hands of California's "Big Three" by defeating the powerful Stanford machine next Saturday.

"It can be done," Coach Paul Schisler told a cheering student body at the depot as the squad entrained last night. "And it remains for us to do it."

The Staters finished their training here yesterday afternoon in a driving rain. The downpour failed to dampen their spirit, however.

Schisler announced he probably would start the following lineup against the Cardinals:

CHICAGO, Oct. 17, (AP)—Rival scouts will have to do without close-up action pictures of the Wisconsin-Notre Dame football game at Soldier Field Saturday.

At the request of Notre Dame, no movie or newspaper photographers will be permitted on the side lines during the contest. As soon as the game starts, they will be stationed in temporary platforms far away from the playing field.

AMERICAN STRONGEST
CHICAGO, Oct. 17, (AP)—President E. S. Barnard of the American league believes his loop is 20 per cent stronger than the National league, and he credits the New York Yankees for the showing.

"The persistent domination in our league has served to set such a pace that other club owners were compelled to buy better players," Barnard explained today. "As a result, the entire league is stronger. We have been bringing in better players, and today rank about 20 per cent stronger than John Heydler's circuit."

NORTHWEST IS INTERESTED IN COMING BATTLE

Oregon-Idaho Affair Has Football Fans All Huddling

PORTLAND, Ore., Oct. 17, (A. P.)—Pacific coast conference football will make its 1929 bow in Portland Saturday when the Universities of Idaho and Oregon meet on Multnomah stadium field, and on the outcome will hinge the championship of the northwest.

The king-pin of the Vandal's offense is Waldemar Pedersen, the "Galloping Swede," who does most of the ball-carrying from quarterback position. But Pedersen is not the only ball toter on the squad. There are four other quarterbacks capable of stepping in when necessary. Kenneth Barrett, a veteran from last year, Herbert Owens, Clinton Duff and John Norman are all drilled to take up the burden where Pedersen leaves off.

Kerchishnik at Half

Big Bill Kerchishnik, whose line plunging and defense play made a hit with Portland fans two years ago when Idaho played Oregon State at the stadium, has changed roles somewhat but is still one of the important cogs in the Vandals' machine. He plays halfback and his interference work has been a big factor in Idaho's previous victories.

Oregon Team Same

As for the Oregon team it is almost the same as the one that routed the University of Washington here last year, only a few changes having been made because of graduation. The Webfoots' attack centers around Johnny Kitzmiller, the "Flying Dutchman," so it will be a case of "Flying Dutchman" vs. "Galloping Swede" Saturday.

Backfield Strong

Supporting Kitzmiller are Dave Mason, captain and halfback, Charles Williams, halfback, Ed Moeller, fullback, Al Browne, ex-Benson Tech star who has just been shifted to the first string as halfback, Bobby Robinson, quarterback, Charles Spear and Wally Shearer, halfbacks, and Hal Hatton and Ridgeway Johnston, fullbacks. Most of the ball carrying duties fall to Kitzmiller, Mason, Robinson and Hatton, but the others can step in and smack the line when called. Moeller, Browne and Williams are defensive specialists and interference runners.

Four Veterans

On the Webfoots' line are four outstanding veterans from last year. George Stadleman at center, Marshall Shields at guard, and Austin Colbert and George Christensen at tackle. Eric Forster is Stadleman's understudy. Jerry Lillie is regular guard while the reserves are Ted Park, Sy West, Gilbert French, Henry Hayden, William Anater, Meredith Sheets and Cal Bryan. Second line tackles are Norman Jesse, Ralph Bates, Marion Hall, Homer Dickson, Irvin Schulz and Pat Lucas.

John J. McEwan, Oregon coach, has been stressing passes in practice this week which indicates this form of attack will supplement the baffling reverses and fake reverses used from the now famous "B" formation which was also employed by Stanford last year.

MEUSEL TO CINCINNATI

CARDINALS AND STATERS BOTH HAVE VETERANS

STANFORD UNIVERSITY, Cal Oct. 17, (AP)—With the Cardinal avalanche rolling smoothly and gaining crushing power with every day's practice, Oregon State, one of the big threats of the north was expected to meet its match on the gridiron here Saturday.

Announcement of the Cardinal line-up today, almost simultaneous with the announcement of the Oregon State line-up, revealed that neither aggregation would find victory an easy matter to attain. The notable feature of both line-ups was the

preponderance of regulars on each side, many of them veterans of football classics of another year.

With the exception of Preston at left end, and Helsier at right guard, the Cardinals named regulars throughout their line-up.

The Oregon invaders were scheduled to arrive at Pleasanton, across the bay tonight, and had a workout on the Stanford stadium scheduled for Friday.

The Cardinal line-up included: Nell, Muller, ends; Aarman Tandy, tackles; Driscoll, Dawson, guards; Heinicke, center; Fleishacker, Prentup, Rothert and Smalling, backs.

VANDAL EAGER TO DO BATTLE WITH WEBFOOT

MOSCOW, Idaho, Oct. 17, (A. P.)—The Idaho Vandals planned one more practice session this afternoon before they entrain for Portland, where on Saturday they expect to settle the first phase of the question of football supremacy in the Northwest this season.

Coach Leo Calland, whose adaptation of the thundering herd tactics of Southern California humbled the ponderous University of Montana 19 to 0 last Saturday, has developed a new series

of plays which he planned to reveal to Oregon, and the last practice today was all that was necessary to get them polished up, he said.

With the elimination of the University of Washington from serious consideration for Northwest honors, and Idaho's unexpected strength in the three games already played, the Vandals have risen to a point only slightly below Oregon, Oregon State and Washington State in the odds listing. A respectable showing against Oregon, rated at the top in this division, would enhance Idaho's standing, and it is for this that Calland has been working this week.

Calland expected to carry a

full squad of 25 players, including all its regulars, when he entrained tonight.
