

ROBINSON-CLEGHORN ALL SET FOR TONIGHT

CLEGHORN, IN FAREWELL BOUT, WILL TRY FOR K. O.

Eskimo Leaving for San Francisco Saturday Morning to Take on Fastest Light Heavies of Coast. Tiger Is Fast Man and Eskimo Has Hard Job Ahead.

When Tiger Bob Robinson and Walter Cleghorn, the fighting Eskimo, square off for the main event at the Legion pavilion tonight, the fight fans of Klamath Falls are going to see a battle royal.

From pre-fight dope gathered at the training bouts, this Tiger is one of the sweetest boxers that ever donned the mitts in the local arena. It requires three or four boxing partners for him each evening, and when the hour is up he is just getting in good fettle for a scrap.

This is just what is needed to make a good fight with the Eskimo. Cleghorn is perhaps the toughest hunk of the lot. He has yet to be knocked off his feet, and it is a waste of words to enter into a discussion about the way that boy wades into his opponent. He just does it, that's all. And his record shows that his style of fighting is successful.

Tiger Is Corner
But to get back to the Tiger. Joe Robinson, his manager, who by the way, is inspector of police at Oakland, Calif., has a great prospect in this colored boy. Robinson has won all of his last twelve fights, defeating such good boys as Tiger Johnny Cline, Jimmy O'Dowd, K. O. Sullivan, Frankie Denny and a host of others. He is well liked wherever he fights. On the last five cards, fought at Eureka, Calif., he has been in the limelight for the main event. He certainly will give Cleghorn the fight of his life, thinks Tex Bickerstaff, local matchmaker.

Eskimo in Pink
Cleghorn, under the masterful training of Ernie Olson, is certainly in the pink. He has never appeared in such a fighting mood as he is for this bout, for he knows this Robinson is a great fighter, and as he leaves to take a match in San Francisco with Chick Devlin following tonight's battle, he wants to win, as it will help him a whole lot in getting matches in the south.

Cleghorn will weigh 160 and Robinson 162.
Semi Will Be Hot
The semi-final bout, six rounds between Steamboat Jackson and Jack Crim will be some fight, according to Tex. They met once before. "Rowboat" with a bad jaw received in training, was in no shape to take one on this vital spot, so after going along good for three rounds the classy Chiquita boxer, Jack Crim, shot a left hook for the jaw and the lights went out for the game and ever popular Steamboat. "Rowboat" is betting part of his purse that he takes Jack tonight.

Jack is in perfect shape. He has trained faithfully with Cleghorn, and if he gets over tonight he is going along with Manager Olson and the Eskimo to invade the south for matches. Tex wishes them all the luck in the world, as they gave their best to please the fans here.

Four Round Special
The four round special between Pat McFadden, fighting lumberjack, and the rejuvenated Billy Huff looks like a fan pleaser. Huff is the favorite along the Rialto, 10-8.

Tiny to Show
The heavyweight sensation from Dairy will try to make it five straight by the KO route when he tangles with Battling Bunker. This McCumber is a sweet prospect, and if taken along right he will make a tough heavy for any one to meet. The whole district, Bonanza, Dairy, and as far as Lakeview will be at the ringside to root for their coming champion.

Curtain Raiser
The curtain raiser finds two heavies slated for four rounds, but you can bet either Jack Straka or Red Spence will hear the birds sing. The little kidder, Tuffy Brown, with a string of 19 bouts, will find a tarter in young Ryder, son of the famous Kid Ryder, who used to please the fans here a few years ago.

Dick Reed will referee. The first bout starts at 8:45 p. m.

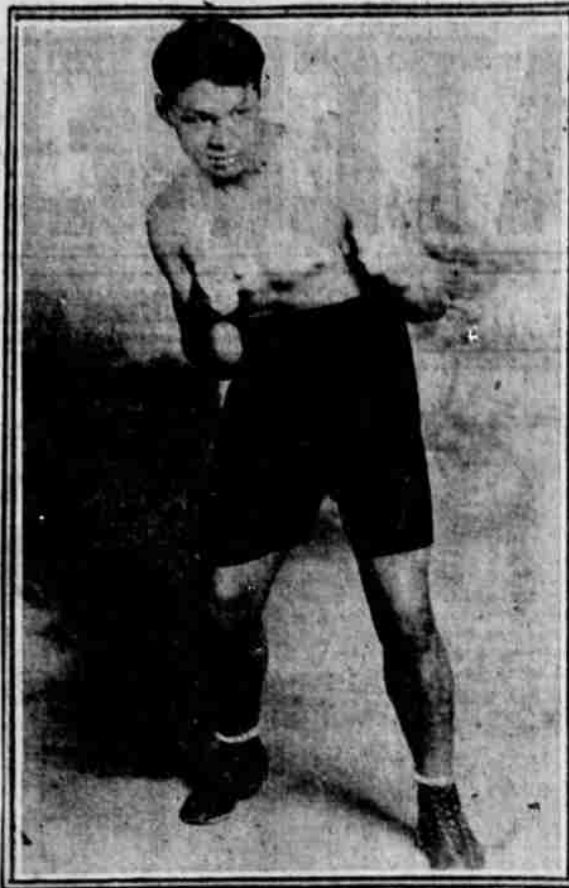
Repeated rumors of vandal power have not been disregarded by the Oregon athletes. McEwan maintained they served only to put his squad on a keener edge.

Five players on the Oregon squad will face the Vandals for the second and, incidentally, the last time when the two teams romp onto Multnomah field. They are Stadelman, center; Wood, reserve end; Mason, captain and fullback; Williams, halfback and Robinson quarterback. All five played against Idaho in 1927, when the Vandals and Oregon battled to a 0-0 tie here.
