AT THE PELICAN

Apparently destined to achieve big things on the dialogue and singing screen, Morton Downey, Broadway's golden-voiced tenor, who scored so emphatically as Tommy O'Day in "Mother's Boy," is seen to excellent advantage in his second Pathé star dialogue picture, "Lucky in Love," which will be seen and heard at the Pelican theatre Sunday and Monday.
