## OREGON SHOULD DOWN HUSKIES

EUGENE, Ore., Oct. 21. (AP)—For the first time in many seasons the University of Oregon football team is considered to have more than an even chance to defeat the University of Washington Huskies at Seattle next Saturday because of the showing last year.

Oregon's Webfoots were victorious over Washington last year by 27 to 0. The doubtful strength of the Huskies this year is illustrated in its 6 to 6 tie with Montana and its crushing defeat by the University of Southern California, 45 to 0, is another point in Oregon's favor.

Oregon's Record Good

The rivalry between the two schools, existing since Oregon's victory in the first game in 1900, has been emphasized in the past few years more than during earlier days. In 1924 Oregon surprised the conference by defeating the Huskies in an upset at Eugene, 7 to 2.

However, the greatest battle between the two schools was waged at Seattle the year following. That year Washington won the Pacific Coast conference title, but in the final game of the season was nearly knocked from its position when an Oregon team, coached by Dick Smith, rose up to hold the Huskies 15 to 14.

Last Victory Impressive

The first game of Captain John J. McEwan's era at Oregon was lost to Washington 23 to 9 at Portland in 1925. The next year was another battle typical of Oregon-Washington rivalry, but Washington won by the last quarter score, 7 to 0. Last year at Portland the Webfoots scored their greatest triumph over Washington since the 43 to 0 win in 1900.

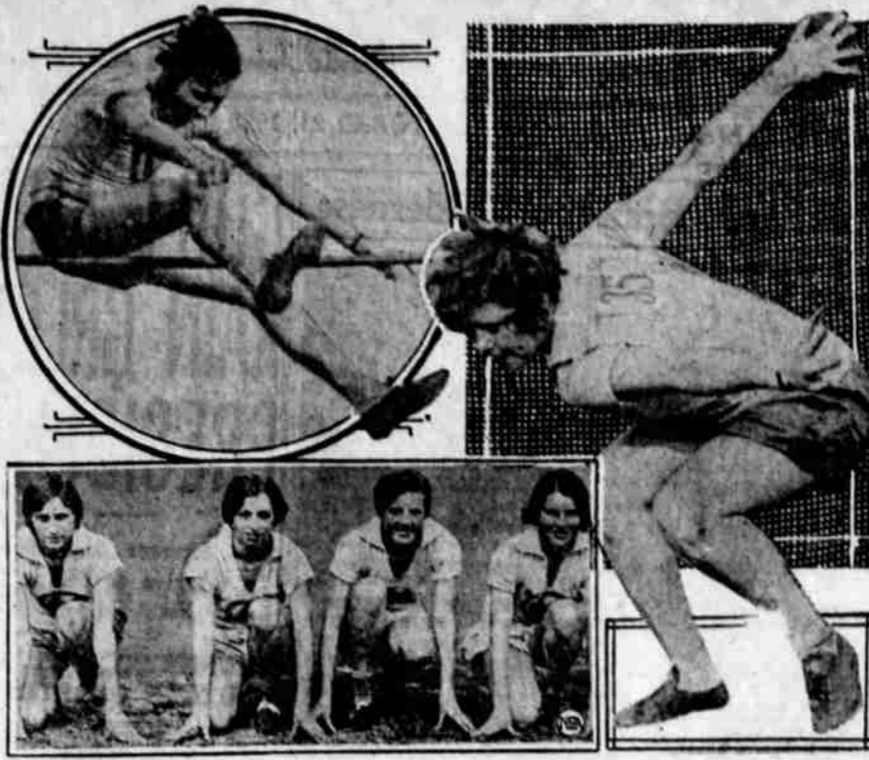

### CHURCH FOLKS WIELD RAZORS DURING FIGHT

EVANSTON, Ill., Oct. 21 (AP)—The internal troubles of the Mount Zion Baptist church (colored) reached the razor stage yesterday. Three deacons were seriously injured. One, Samuel Sanders, was slashed across the neck and may die. Twenty members of the congregation were cut and bruised.

Three persons were arrested, including the pastor, the Rev. G. A. Long, and Simon Matthews and Alex Cobin, deacons. Should the wounded Sanders die, police said charges of murder would be made against the three.

For a year there has been trouble between one faction of the church and the pastor. Yesterday's meeting was under a court order which called upon the church to hold an election before November 4 to determine whether Long should continue as pastor.

G. W. Gibson, a deacon expelled a year ago, began heckling the pastor and demanding reinstatement. Deacon Matthews pushed forward and told Gibson to sit down. Blows were exchanged and soon the meeting had divided into two sides, one backing Gibson, the other supporting Matthews and the pastor. Chairs were used as clubs and projectiles. Razors flashed.

Five squads of policemen were required to break up the battle which spread to the church yard and blocked traffic as motorists stopped to watch the fight.

### FLAT TIRE IS DEATH CAUSE

PORTLAND, Oct. 21 (AP)—Losing control of his automobile when a tire went flat, John Hiltunen, 45, was killed here today. The machine suddenly swerved and bumped into a telephone pole. Hiltunen's head struck an upright on his windshield. Death was caused by either skull fracture or shock.

The car was not badly damaged. Investigators found the tire flat and a dent in the radiator. Witnesses said Hiltunen was driving at a moderate rate of speed.

### FIRE DESTROYS FACTORY

SAN FRANCISCO, Oct. 21. (AP)—Fire in the Consolidated Milling Company plant, in the Mission district, destroyed four buildings, machinery and stock. Loss was estimated at \$50,000. Spontaneous combustion was believed to have started the blaze.

### FIREMAN KILLED

WORCESTER, Mass., Oct. 21. (AP)—A fireman was killed and a dozen were seriously injured in a fire which destroyed a warehouse block this morning. Lieutenant Carl R. Swenson was killed when a wall toppled on firemen who were within the building.

Damage was estimated at about \$200,000.

### Stanford-Trojan Conflict Big Noise This Week-End

NEW YORK, Oct. 21. (AP)—There should be football fireworks sufficient for entertainment along every sector this week end but the main detonation is likely to echo from the Big Bowl at Palo Alto, California. Close to 85,000 spectators in this far western counterpart of Yale's famous arena will see Stanford and Southern California light the fuse of their sensational rivalry.

### Battle Of Coaches

This clash between Cardinal and Trojan, between the coaching systems of Pop Warner and Howard Jones, not only figures to decide the championship of the Pacific coast but to have a vital bearing upon the National title situation.

Both elevens have their eyes focused on this twin goal as well as on each other. Southern California takes on Notre Dame and Carnegie Tech later as part of its drive for National honors. Stanford winds up its season by entertaining Red Cagle and his army mates, so that the incentive to win is about as keen as it can possibly be.

### Stanford Stock Up

Until last Saturday, U. S. C. was generally expected to be the favorite. The Trojans were off to a fast start and reached a peak of power by crushing Washington 45 to 0 on the latter's own gridiron. Stanford, coming along more slowly, aroused its backers by polishing off Oregon State 40 to 7. A margin of exactly 19 points more than Southern California's edge over the same team. On this basis and the fact that Warner always has something up his sleeve for a big game, Stanford now rates at least an even choice.

Both have California to contend with later. U. S. C. in fact, meets the Golden Bears the following Saturday at Los Angeles, but California, to justify any title hopes, must show more than it did Saturday in beating a scrappy but subnormal Pennsylvania team.

### Army Meets Yale

In the east, this week's most colorful affair will be the annual charge of West Point's Cadets in the Yale Bowl before upwards of 75,000 spectators. But Dartmouth's battle with Harvard at Cambridge may have an important bearing on the championship situation.

The Crimson's unmistakable power, demonstrated in tying Army after Cagle had run wild, will be a severe test for Dartmouth. Harvard, however, will find Al Marsters about as difficult as Cagle to stop.

### Rockne Seeks Revenge

Notre Dame, gathering headway in its comeback by vanquishing Indiana, Navy and Wisconsin in succession, runs into the rugged Carnegie eleven at Pittsburgh in the outstanding intersectional engagement of the week. The Tech Tartans handed Rockne's Ramblers a trimming last year but it will be a surprise if they repeat. Seeking revenge is the main October objective of the Hoosiers.

Pittsburgh has let up after an impressive string of conquests. The Panthers play Allegheny in preparation for their next big game with Ohio State, now the pace setter among the Big Ten.

### Ohio Running Strong

Ohio, having beaten Iowa and Michigan, expects to make it three straight conference victories by beating Indiana this week. Purdue and Chicago, two

other unbeaten conference teams, battle it out while Illinois plays Michigan and Iowa tackles Wisconsin. The march of Illinois toward a third title in a row was checked suddenly Saturday by a tie with Iowa.

The big noise in the Big Six group is the clash between Nebraska and Missouri at Columbia with the Tigers, going strong, confident of turning the tables on the 1928 champions.

Tulane's bid for southern conference honors depends on the green wave's ability to roll back Georgia Tech's tornado at New Orleans.

The southwestern conference race has a lull this week while in the Rocky Mountain conference, Utah's champions expect to continue their march toward another title at the expense of the Colorado Aggies.

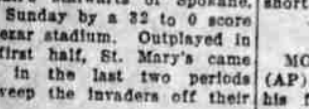

### HOSPITAL ASKS OFFICERS' AID

POMONA, Calif., Oct. 21. (AP)—Following the rioting and escape of 17 inmates from the state narcotic hospital at Spadra, near here, last night, a request had been broadcast to officers in adjoining towns and counties to aid in recapturing the men. None was seriously injured.

The men, brandishing pieces of garden hose filled with sand, drove back the unarmed guard last night and scaled the fence which surrounds the institution. Two of the men were taken by Pomona police shortly afterwards. These are Harry Rutan, 26, and Charles Luke, 30, both of San Francisco.

Rutan and Luke, according to police, complained about the hospital food, their treatment at the hands of the guards, and that they were not given enough narcotics. This is the second recent outbreak, 13 inmates having escaped from the institution two months ago. Most of them were arrested and returned. A number of them were among the 17 who rioted last night.

### BAGSHAW MAY RESIGN SOON

SEATTLE, Wash., Oct. 21. (AP)—The Post-Intelligencer said today that Enoch Bagshaw may resign soon as head football coach for the University of Washington Huskies.

The newspaper said that defeats by southern California and Washington State College, together with the tie game with Montana brought football matters to a head. The Post-Intelligencer said that after the game with Washington State Saturday, the Huskies lost 20 to 13, a conference was held between Bagshaw's advisers and student body heads. The student board of control sought Bagshaw's resignation last winter.

The newspaper said that some of the coach's friends advised him to resign and then offer his services for the rest of the season because of the difficulty of obtaining a new coach on short notice.

### DROWNS IN BEACH

MOSS BEACH, Cal., Oct. 21. (AP)—Torn from the grasp of his father who sought to rescue him, Richard Lennner, 12, San Francisco, drowned at Martin Beach when a comb broke over the rock from which he was fishing and swept him out to sea. The father succeeded in reaching his son, 100 yards from shore, but the heavy breakers beat him off.

### SEATTLE WELTER MATCHED

EUGENE, Ore., Oct. 21. (AP)—Joe Selloff, Seattle welterweight, has been matched in a ten-round main event here Friday night with Chuck Borden of Eugene. Joe Dagutis of Portland and Mickey McCafferty, Cottage Grove, are matched in the six-round semi-windup. Each weighs 140 pounds.

NEW YORK, Oct. 21. (AP)—John McGouldrick, second officer of the steamship Croise, was taken into custody today by police in connection with the murder on Oct. 11 of Jack Kraft, former New York newspaper employe, on the liner's last trip from New York to New Orleans.
