POP DIRECTS ALL PRACTICE WITH SECRECY

Even Old Grads Are Excluded From Stadium

STANFORD UNIVERSITY, Cal., Oct. 22. (AP)—Behind the locked doors of Stanford's famous stadium, Coach "Pop" Warner and his galloping Cardinals today were preparing a surprise for the University of Southern California Trojans who invade this battleground Saturday. It was secret practice, shut out from all prying eyes, even those of the scribes and old grads. Coach Warner announced the secret sessions would continue until the day of the game.

Jones There Saturday
Whether the reason for all this seclusion springs out of the fact that Coach Howard Jones of the powerful Trojan aggregation attended last Saturday's game here during which the Stanford eleven trounced the Oregon State squad 40 to 7, was a matter of conjecture. Certain it was, that little of the Stanford method escaped the keen eyes of Jones, and it was a good bet that Jones returned to his own field with a fair idea of what the Trojan job would be.

New Attack
At any rate, it was known that Coach Warner was grinding out a new sort of attack to meet a different situation. A whole new series of passes was needed, and a method for combating the crushing center drive expected from the men of Troy.

Cards Improving
With the return of several Cardinal veterans to the lineup, the Cardinals expect to be stronger Saturday than at any time so far this grid season. Ready to return to the line were Harlow Rother, halfback, John Preston, end; Bill Simkins, fullback, all of them have been out of the game for varying periods. Not since the first of the season has Warner been able to use his complete backfield.

Aside from Pete Heiser, best guard in the line who is laid up with an injury, the regular line will be in the game Saturday. Whether Heiser would be able to play was a matter of doubt. As to possible backfield combinations, no idea was forthcoming. It was known that Warner was working on this phase of the campaign at practice.

ROCKNE GOING TO PITTSBURGH

SOUTH BEND, Ind., Oct. 22. (AP)—Physicians here have to do a lot of talking and threatening to keep Coach Knute Rockne away from Pittsburgh and the Carnegie Tech-Notre Dame football game Saturday.

Rockne stayed away from Pittsburgh once and never has forgiven himself.

In 1926, the Notre Dame wizard decided he would like to see the Army-Navy game at Chicago. So he sent his great team to Pittsburgh to play Carnegie certain it would bring back the bacon. Carnegie started the football world and Rockne as well by swamping the Ramblers.

"I don't want to miss a Pittsburgh trip after that 1926 episode," said Rockne, who has been forced to remain at home during the past two week ends because of his ailing leg. "I'll go this time if I have to go in a wheel chair."

LERAIN'S LIFE CRUSHED OUT

BALTIMORE, Oct. 22. (AP)—Walter Leraian, Philadelphia National league catcher, died today of injuries received when a motor truck hit him on a sidewalk.

John Mogner, a former sand lot baseball player in the days when "Peck" was playing with the St. Martin's club, gave a pint of blood for a transfusion operation.

Leraian was struck yesterday afternoon. Police said that Charles Lloyd, driver of the truck, swerved to avoid a collision with another machine, and ran onto the sidewalk, crushing Leraian against a building, inflicting internal injuries, severe body bruises and breaking one leg.

Lloyd was arrested, as well as August Meyers, driver of the machine which Lloyd was avoiding at the time of the accident.

FAMOUS "IRON MAN" DOOMED

NEW YORK, Oct. 22. (AP)—Death apparently was near today for Joe McGinnity, famed "Iron Man" of the National league a quarter century ago.

The 58 year old pitcher, whose baseball career spanned 22 years,

was dying at his home in Brooklyn. Physicians said there was virtually no hope for his recovery.

McGinnity failed to rally after an operation, August 27, for removal of a tumor. A second tumor has developed and in view of the old pitcher's weakened condition surgeons deemed another operation inadvisable.

PENDLETON, Ore., Oct. 22. (AP)—Jack Kentworth of Portland knocked out Jimmy Larson of Seattle in the second round of a scheduled 10 round main event here last night. Both weighed 147.

UNIVERSITY OF OREGON, Eugene, Oct. 22. (AP)—George Stadelman, Oregon's powerful center, probably will never play collegiate football again. He was listed here today as being out for the rest of the present season and this is his third and last year of football.

Stadelman suffered a broken bone in his right ankle Saturday when the Webfoet swept through Idaho at Multnomah stadium, Portland, for a 34 to 7 victory.

Other injuries suffered by the Webfoet squad were inconsequential. Colbert, tackle, has a cracked rib and Bob Robinson, halfback, a twisted shoulder. Both will be in shape for Saturday's game against the University of Washington Huskies at Seattle, however, Coach John J. McEwan said.

SOVIET PLANE TAKES LEAVE FOR CHEYENNE

OAKLAND, Cal., Oct. 22. (AP)—The Russian monoplane "Land of the Soviets" took off here at 5:59 o'clock this morning for Cheyenne, the next scheduled stop on its flight from Moscow to New York.

A. V. Petroff, vice president of the Amtorg Trading Corporation of New York, was aboard the plane with his four countrymen. The airman, Semron A. Shestakov, commander of the flight; Philip E. Bolotov, second pilot; Boris E. Sterligov, assistant navigator, and Dmitri V. Fufsev, spent the night at the airport here.

The fliers announced prior to the take-off that while they did not expect any motor trouble, they had arranged to change motors at Cheyenne in event it becomes necessary. The motors had been shipped ahead.

Commander Shestakov, voicing the appreciation of himself and his fellows, warmly commented on the reception extended to them on their arrival, and the hospitality they had been shown in Oakland and San Francisco. He declared that the distance had been annihilated by aviation, and that the spirit of friendship between Russia and America, now brought closer together, would efface intolerance.
