EXTENSION OF POSTAL ROUTES IS ANNOUNCED

As fast as the sidewalks are uncovered and mail receptacles are provided the city letter carriers will deliver mail to the residences on Owens street between Orchard and Wantland avenues and on all cross streets between East Main and Owens streets from Orchard to Wantland avenue. It was announced last night by John McCall, postmaster.

Mail receptacles should be placed on the porch where the residence is within 50 feet of the sidewalk, to protect the mail from storms or theft, Mr. McCall states. The paving of 90 blocks in Mills addition and the building of sidewalks for that distance will allow all those on the improved streets to receive carrier service as soon as the streets are opened, Mr. McCall states. At the present time a survey is being made in that district for the purpose of ascertaining the needs in service. In the past year two carriers and an auxiliary carrier have been added to the carrier staff at the post office. From the growth and amount of business handled it is probable that it will be possible to relieve authorization from the post office department for an added carrier, Mr. McCall believes.

DIVORCE SUIT FILED MONDAY

Fannie Marchland yesterday filed action against N. Marchland, some times known as Nestor Marchland, and E. H. Lawrence asking divorce and property settlement. Judge A. L. Leavitt is attorney for the plaintiff. The complaint states that the
