PARIS, Oct. 22, (AP)—Georges Clemenceau has weathered a storm which threatened him yesterday and today apparently was to be returned to the former surprising vigor of his 88 years.

Dr. Laubry, completing his examination of the former premier, said he found him in excellent condition and in his usual joking mood after a fine night's rest.

Cheerful news came also from the bedside of France's other ailing statesman, Raymond Poincare, who yesterday underwent an operation for a disorder of the pelvic region. Hospital authorities said the former president had a very good night and "he is getting along extremely well."
