TROJANS MAY SPRING SOME UNUSED PLAYS

Every Effort Will Be Made to Upset Cardinals

LOS ANGELES, Oct. 23. (A P)—Coach Howard Jones grimly planned to put his University of Southern California gridsters through their final scrimmage session here today, preparatory to their departure tomorrow for Palo Alto where they meet Stanford next Saturday in one of the most significant games of the Pacific coast conference. The workout will climax a strenuous three day period of training the Trojans have been getting. While the men of Troy have been working for more than a week behind closed gates, in anticipation of the conflict with Coach Glenn "Pop" Warner's Cardinals, those familiar with the Trojan mentor's thoroughness say that he has left nothing unturned in the way of rounding out a defense against Stanford plays.

Today's scrimmage. It was understood, would deal almost entirely with efforts by the varsity to stop Spartan players using the choice of Coach Warner's offense tactics.

A short drill on their own attack was expected to close the training period. Those who have followed the Trojans closely this season are of the opinion that Coach Jones has a lot of unused plays to spring on the Cardinals, including lots of pases.

Strangely, officially or otherwise, there has been little mention of a proposed array of end sweeping plays. This may mean that Coach Jones is convinced that it would be useless to turn the Stanford wingmen back, but it is hardly probable that something in the way of end runs will not be tried, with such speedsters as Jesse Hill, Marshall Duffield, and Gus Saunders in the backfield.

CANDIDATE FOR ANANIAS CLUB

BUFFALO, N. Y., Oct. 23. (A P)—Joe McCarthy, manager of the Chicago Cubs, was amused today over a statement of Jimmy Dykes, third baseman of the Philadelphia Athletics, that the Athletics knew all the Cubs pitching signals in the world series.

"If my men knew what the pitchers were going to throw they'd made so many runs in the very first inning they'd have to get an eviction order to get the side out," said McCarthy. "Any ball player or one who knows baseball will laugh. It's too ridiculous."

Dykes told the Delaware county real estate board at luncheon: "When one of our batters got on base, he would fix his eyes on Taylor, the Chicago catcher, who at times, was a little careless. The runner would stand in a perfectly natural position until he caught the signal, then he would move his hand in such a way that the batter was informed what kind of a ball was about to be pitched, or else a man near the batter would catch the runner's signal and relay it to the man at the plate."

CARTER PULLS BIG SURPRISE
SEATTLE, Oct. 23. (AP)—"Wildcat" Carter of Everett staged a dramatic comeback here last night when he knocked out Pico Ramires, Los Angeles, in the first round of their scheduled six round bout. Carter fought as a lightweight for the first time. He has been knocked out in his last four starts.

Jimmy Dolan, Los Angeles welterweight, won the six-round semi-final from Frankie Repose, Bellingham.

Klamath Pelicans Called Menacing Lake Scavengers

Pelicans of Upper Klamath lake have recently been maligned in the newspapers by a man who did not give his name, his statement being ascribed to a Klamath Falls visitor at the Heathman hotel. He recommended an open season on pelicans, stating that "one pelican will destroy more fish than 50 fishermen." Our authority for the assumption that pelicans have had the worst of it is A. C. Allen, member of the Oregon state board of horticulture. Mr. Allen, who now lives at Rocky Point and has been a resident of southern Oregon continuously for 25 years, is intimately acquainted with the bird life of Upper Klamath lake, on which he has spent many months each year at his summer home.

"If I do say it," said he, "I believe no man knows conditions affecting wild life on this lake better than I. I have photographed the birds, animals and fish, both in stills and motion pictures. I have written about the denizens of the lake and studied them. I am the author of two books: 'King of the Wilderness' and the 'Little Shepherd of Lava Lake.' Also I have written an article on the mysterious duck malady that has killed so many waterfowl in the Klamath lake region. This article will soon come out in Field and Stream."

"My personal observations, I will state positively that no white pelican (and they are the only pelicans on Klamath lake) can catch a healthy trout at any time. I don't believe a pelican could catch a trout if both the bird and the trout were put in a tank ten feet in diameter and two feet deep. Certainly the pelican cannot catch one in open water. Any man who claims it has never watched a pelican fish."

"The pelican is extremely slow. If he sees a fish jump he lumbers over to the spot, sails down, extends his feet before him to act as a brake and smashes into the water."

"He then foolishly looks around for the fish. What kind of a fish would be there?"

"The pelican never dives. He can only 'tip up,' open his beak and hope to bird heaven that something gets in it. More often than not he gets nothing. Sometimes he gets a piece of tule, which he swallows. The only fish he can catch is a dead or sick one."

"This will be evident to anyone who watches the pelicans. Besides, Professor Snyder of Stanford university, one of the leading ichthyologists of the United States, came up here a number of years ago. He was sent in by the government to settle this very point about the pelicans. He spent weeks in studying them, he killed a number of the birds and examined their insides, and he did not leave until he had satisfied himself on the point. He told me that the pelicans never caught a trout except one that was ready to die. Therefore, from that statement and my own observations, the pelican is useful as a scavenger to eat up the thousands of sick and dying suckers and chubs."

"I have watched, from a very close point of observation, the famous 'dives' of pelicans. I photographed them for Fox motion picture news. The unknown man who was quoted in a newspaper article jumped at conclusions and did not see the drive as it happens. The pelicans do not 'form a semi-circle' or 'stirring out in a fan shape.' They gather in a bunch. The front of the bunch maintains a line of remarkable straightness, almost like a company of soldiers. Those in rear close up to that line. They swim forward slowly, tipping up and gulping when they raise their beaks. They do not drive toward the shore except by accident. They usually are out on the shallow 'banks' and travel in any direction."

"The fish they are after are small chub, suckers and a few bull heads (not catfish). They get a few, not many and do not store all they can in a pouch when they have." I have never yet seen fish stored in the pouch below the beak. Even if they did the only fish they catch are chub and suckers and if the anonymous 'Klamath Falls visitor' knew as much as he pretended then he would admit that today Klamath lake is alive with chub and suckers and the great, wonderful trout is almost a thing of the past. No harm can be done by allowing the pelicans to catch ten times the chub they do catch.

"And the cause of the passing of the trout is not the pelican, or any other bird. It is caused directly by the wanton destruction of the fish by 'fish hogs' aided by the deadly motorboat. I have seen, time after time, certain 'fishermen' slaughter the fish by the hundreds of pounds. It is a well-known fact that it used to be no job at all for one motorboat to take a couple of hundred pounds of trout a day. I have seen string of them left to rot in boats and about the shores. I have seen men trying to give away their illegal catch of 100 pounds or more. The game wardens were powerless because of the motorboats. The fishing from motorboats while in motion should be prohibited and the bag limit should be cut down."

"But the pelicans do not catch trout or game fish. They can't do it! It is impossible! They are scavengers. And as for their beauty—just ask the tourists who watch the great, snowy birds sailing through his bonnet."—The 'Klamath Falls visitor' was talking through his bonnet.—The Oregonian.

STRANGLER TO TRY TO REGAIN HEAVY CROWN

LOS ANGELES, Oct. 23. (A P)—"Dynamite" Gus Sonnenberg, nursing a split lip and a bruised nose acquired in an unscheduled street encounter, will risk his heavyweight wrestling title in a bout here tonight with Ed "Strangler" Lewis, former champion.

Sonnenberg was injured, mentally and physically when he unexpectedly was called upon yesterday to defend himself from one of the flying tackles which occupy a prominent place in his own wrestling repertoire. His physical hurts, consisting chiefly of a profusely bleeding nose, he announced would not interfere with his title bout tonight.

His mental injury was assuaged somewhat by a battery of bandages against Pete Ladjone, ball bond broker and amateur wrestler, issued from the office of City Prosecutor Lloyd S. Nix, on Gus' complaint.

Sonnenberg charged Ladjone with butting him with his head without warning (terminating a discussion of the possibilities of a bout between the amateur and the champion).

Lewis, in preparation for his attempt to regain the crown, has been training with the University of Southern California football team, in an effort to develop a defense against the flying tackle which lost him the championship to Sonnenberg.

Sonnenberg is a former Dartmouth football player.

RICHER THAN EXPECTED

CHICAGO, Oct. 23. (AP)—Failure of baseball fans to return their tickets for the sixth world series game probably will net the Cubs and Athletics \$20,000 more than they had anticipated.

The total value of the pastebards for the game that never was played was \$202,000. Approximately \$140,000 has been turned back. The refund will close soon.

SCHOOL PLAYS INELIGIBLES IT IS ALLEGED

LA GRANDE, Ore., Oct. 23. (AP)—A protest against the Baker high school for alleged violation of eligibility rules of the state association during the present football season was filed by the La Grande high school with Roy C. Cannon, secretary of the board of control, Portland.

Specific violations charged that Baker was allowing ineligible players to participate in football games. Documentary evidence is said to have been mailed Cannon last night, accompanied by a protest for a hearing before Friday, the date of the Baker La Grande game.

R. D. Towler, principal, in a letter following the wire, mentioned the names of Carlton Crawford, Melvin Eilers, Harold Joslin, Clarence Webber, Carrol Smith as alleged ineligible players.

The accompanying letter attempts to show previous residence of the five players as follows: Eilers, Aurora, Ore.; Joslin, Spokane and Corvallis; Webber, Burbank, Cal.; Smith, Twin Falls, Idaho and Lime, Ore.; Crawford, Corvallis.

BAKER, Ore., Oct. 23. (AP)—Those in touch with high school athletics here, although not connected with the high school, were unable to understand the protest made by La Grande high school against alleged violations of the eligibility rules of the state association during the present football season.

BOXER DIES

NEWARK, N. J., Oct. 23. (A P)—Raymond Miller, 30, Newark boxer, died last night in a city hospital from internal injuries received Saturday night when knocked out in the first round of a ten round bout with Freddy Fraser. Miller was revived a few minutes after the knockout and went home. Yesterday he became unconscious and was taken to the hospital.

HAWKINS KAYOES BOLO

FRESNO, Cal., Oct. 23. (AP)—Freddie Hawkins, of San Bernardino knocked out Batling Bolo of San Francisco in the tenth round of a main event at the Ryan Arena here last night. They were lightweights.
