Premium Payments Ready—

Announcement has been made by those in charge of the administration at the veteran's bureau at Portland, that officers have been authorized to receive premium payments on all forms of government insurance. The bureau will receive payments for veterans living in Oregon only. It has been stated, and they should no longer be mailed to Washington because the officer there will send them back to Portland. The payments to be made at Portland include premiums for five year insurance, converted insurance loan payments and loan interest payments. The office will also handle all details of reinstating lapsed insurance, writing applications for new insurance and handling all correspondence regarding insurance matters.

A delegation from Medford recently came here to get the favor of the local chamber on this question.

Medford contends that the road will cut off about 20 miles distance between Medford and the caves and the Grants Pass delegation argued that the road would be a duplication and is unnecessary.

Those attending the meeting from Grants Pass were Sam Baker, president of the Josephine chamber; James Bromley, county engineer; L. R. Conklin, county commissioner, and C. H. Woodruff, Big Horn of the Grants Pass Cymen.

The northern California and southern Oregon development situation was also discussed and laid on the table until a further date.

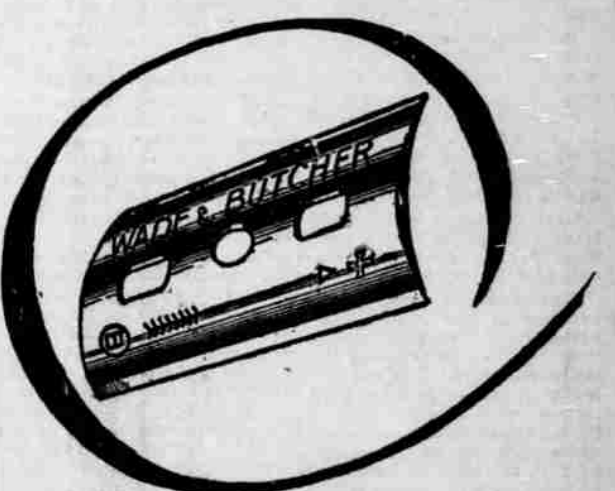
