CHAMPIONSHIP HOPES HINGE ON GAME TODAY

Thundering Herd And Cards Have Real Contest On.

STANFORD UNIVERSITY, Calif., Oct. 26. (AP)—With what has been called the strongest Southern California eleven in the history of the university, and before a crowd of 38,000 enthusiastic fans, Coach Howard Jones' Trojans were here to meet Stanford today in their annual battle, which this year will virtually eliminate one or the other from the championship race.

Stanford faced the invaders with only one regular on the injured list, half a dozen others having recovered from a bad knee epidemic that struck the Warner squad early this season. Pete Heiser, first-string guard, will view the proceedings from the bench, his place being taken by Ray Dawson.

Trojans Speedy Southern California pinned her hopes for victory on the powerful and speedy running attack that has enabled her to score 209 points already this season, plus a line that averages 196 pounds from end to end.

The Cardinals banked on the line smashing ability of Smalling, Fleischacker and Hillman; the clever passing of Simkins; and the elusive halfbacks, Prentiss and Moffatt.

ECKERSALL TO REFEREE GAME

MADISON, Wis., Oct. 26. (AP)—For the first time since he was almost mobbed by infuriated Badger fans in 1923, Walter Eckersall of Chicago was back in Madison today to referee a Wisconsin football game.

Eckersall, former University of Chicago gridiron star, refereed the Michigan-Wisconsin game in 1923 when Rockwell of the Wolverines made his disputed run, giving his team a 6 to 3 victory. As soon as the game was finished several hundred Badger rooters dashed on the field and Eckersall was saved by the quick action of football players of both teams.

His contention that he was forced to accept the ruling of the field judge on the disputed run satisfied Wisconsin officials and now that hard feeling of fans has subsided against him, he was requested to referee today's game between the Badgers and Iowa.

YOUTH KAYOES GRID MENTOR

ALBANY, Ore., Oct. 26. (AP)—William Baue, captain of the Salem, Ore., high school football team last year, was arrested here last night on a charge of assault and battery upon Coach Tucker of the Albany high school.

Baue had gone into the high school gymnasium dressing room to obtain a football used in the Salem-Albany game here today and won by Salem. Coach Tucker remonstrated with him and it is charged Baue struck Tucker on the head. The coach was unconscious 20 minutes, according to the witnesses.

Baue posted a \$25 bond and was released.

In many respects, football coaches are the most interesting of all who follow sport because they are the most interested in their work.

Knute Rockne of Notre Dame is a great believer in mixing humor with sarcasm and friendly encouragement with hard driving. He has been known to transform a listless, discouraged and apparently beaten team after the first half, into an inspired, resistless force in the second half, by his force and enthusiasm in addressing his squad.

Rockne doesn't show his emotions under strain, but on one or two occasions he has been close to a nervous breakdown at the end of a season.

Bob Zupke is another great example at inspiring his team before a battle and between halves. From the first day of practice he is completely absorbed in football and if the season lasted another month he would probably be cutting out paper dolls.

JAPANESE GIRL RAISES RECORD IN BROAD JUMP

SEOUL, Korea, Oct. 26. (AP)—Miss Kinuyo Hitomi, Japanese Olympic athlete, beat her own world's record for the running broad jump for women today, clearing twenty feet, two and a quarter inches.

Miss Hitomi's latest performance exceeds by three and three-quarter inches her record-breaking leap of five days ago. It is the latest in a remarkable series of recent feats which have enabled the Japanese marvel to lower the world's records for her sex in the 100-metre sprints as well as the running broad jump.

The accepted world mark for the running broad jump for women is 5.68 metres of about 18 feet, 7 1-2 inches. Miss Hitomi's application for recognition of her performance of 5.98 metres or about 19 feet, 7 1-2 inches, made last year, having been turned down because the petition bore only four signatures instead of six.
