WENATCHEE IS APPLE KINGDOM

WENATCHEE, Wash., Oct. 25 (Special)—With National Apple week just around the corner, Wenatchee, apple capital of the world, is shipping more than a hundred thousand boxes of apples every twenty-four hours. Solid trainloads of apples leave here daily, consigned to distributors in all parts of the United States, in Europe and even the Orient.

National Apple week is October 21 to November 7. Washington produces approximately one-third of all the commercial apples grown in this country, and the Wenatchee district raises more than half the Washington crop.

The estimated production of the district this season is approximately fourteen million boxes. From three to five solid train loads of apples are puffing out of Wenatchee every day. Each train averages fifty cars, and is approximately half a mile in length. Nearly four hundred such trains will be required to haul the 1929 Wenatchee crop to market.

If combined into a single train, the Wenatchee crop would stretch out along the rails for nearly 200 miles. The value of the crop is approximately \$20,000,000.
