Jasper Newton Bennett widely known resident of this section passed away at the home of his brother, R. H. Bennett of Eureka Monday morning of last week, following a brief illness. Bennett was not feeling his best and a few weeks ago went to San Francisco for medical advice. He was under the care of a specialist there two weeks and then went to the home of his brother in Eureka. After arriving in Eureka, he failed rapidly having been confined to his bed most of the time.

Bennett was born at Gregory's Landing, Missouri, April 6, 1862, and remained there until 1881, when he moved to California. In 1885 he came to Klamath Falls, where he made his home up to the time of his illness.

## PRESIDENT DECLARES BUILDING CHARACTER UNIVERSITY'S WORK

Appealing to fathers and mothers of Oregon to get in closer touch with their children in college, that parents may know and fully realize the work the university is doing, Dr. Arnold Bennett Hall, president of that institution, made an extremely forceful talk Saturday night at a dinner served at the Willard hotel in honor of the university head and his party, who were in the city on a tour of the state.

"Our work is to build character in the boys and girls of Oregon," said Dr. Hall. "It is the greatest work I know and I have dedicated my life to it. Others at the university have done the same thing, and we ask you as fathers and mothers to join us with your moral support in what is without doubt the greatest thing in this life—shaping the lives of young people."

**Need Leadership.**  
"Oregon needs leadership badly. We must find it in the young men and young women. To have leadership that is sane, safe and spiritually right, the boys and girls of this state must have the proper training."

"I want to lay before you the program of your university. I want to impress upon you the work we are doing to surround your child with the proper atmosphere of good citizenship, to make him realize the right course is the only correct course in life, to develop him mentally, spiritually and physically. And that is exactly what we are doing. We come to you on this mission of getting acquainted with the urgent request that you know your university. We want you to know every feature of it, to inspect it, to take an interest in the studies of your child, and to personally meet the faculty."

**Made Deep Impression**  
With his faultless English, his sincere thought and his splendid delivery, Dr. Hall impressed everyone at the banquet table and created a renewed loyalty to the university.

The evening's program opened with a vocal solo by Dr. Cassel, accompanied by Mrs. Ted Gillenwaters, Dean Powers, of the university extension department, spoke on the work being done over the state in extension work. He told of a sheep boy in Lake county who accomplished excellent results with a course while herding sheep, and of many others, including mothers and grandmothers, who had availed themselves of the opportunity of an education by using the extension work provided by the university.

**Oregon Mothers Represented.**  
In the party was Mrs. Walter Cook, president of the Oregon Mothers, and Mrs. J. F. Hill, president of the Portland group of Oregon Mothers. Each of these ladies made a delightful talk, telling of the work the Mothers were doing and intended to do in the future. Miss Marian Phy, secretary to Dr. Hall, spoke briefly and Walter M. Cook, a prominent business man of Portland, expressed his pleasure over the occasion.

**Reception in Afternoon**  
A very enjoyable reception was held for the guests at the parish house of the Episcopal church Saturday afternoon by the Klamath Mothers group.

Mrs. Leslie Rogers and Mrs. D. V. Kuykendall acted as the committee for the reception. During the afternoon Mrs. J. F. Hill spoke as follows:

"No longer is college life looked upon as a place to provide preparation for life, but as a part of life itself. It is in college that youth is 'weighed in the balance.' Up until this time he has been directed by the home—wisely or otherwise. When he has left the home to enter college he finds himself suddenly faced with the problem of running on his own power. If the home has met its responsibility the student is not apt to be 'found wanting.' The tree is known by its fruits. This young generation can with assurance claim to be the fruits of the generation preceding it."

"Standards on the campus will be commensurate with the standards of homes represented there. These varying home standards are the cause for many campus problems and can be solved only when faced by students, faculty and parents together."

"Youth and age have always viewed life from different angles and because of this it is hard for them to understand and interpret each other. They speak a different language. There is need for the older generation to keep abreast of the times; to rid themselves of the idea that the 'good old days' were best. These are the 'good old days' and parents must recognize it. They must keep in friendly touch with the younger generation and know their problems and appreciate the courage and initiative which they use in tackling these problems. Parents need to commend, not condemn; to encourage, not discourage; to lead and

not to hamper. "This friendly co-operation and sympathetic understanding can come only through wisely guided organization. It is characteristic of modern youth that they were the first to see the value of organization. And now this spirit has caught the older generation and we have the Oregon Dads and Oregon Mothers. We can summarize our desire for usefulness in saying with Bishop Irving Johnson of Colorado: 'We usually symbolize the school as 'I think,' the home as 'I love,' and the world as 'I do.' It is our job to make the school love more, the home think more, that in the world the children may do more.'"

**Outlines the Plan**  
The organization of the Oregon Mothers was outlined by Mrs. Cook, who told of the growth of the movement throughout the state. Although the group formally met for the first time last May, it has progressed until now there are units in every part of Oregon. Portland alone has more than 700 members.

The real need of the Mothers' organization is to bring the mothers into the university," Mrs. Cook said. "We want the mothers' enthusiastic support, we want the mothers to get acquainted with the student problems. An intelligent study is made possible for all mothers through their local groups. You have no idea how much just your interest will do toward realizing the great future of our university."
