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DISEASE FREE POTATOES WILL PROFIT FARMER

County Agent Offers Suggestion to Growers

During the past two years the Wey-Zuehrman Company of Stockton, California, have been experimenting on the S. P. Dehlinger ranch with the growing of Wisconsin Pride potatoes for seed to be used on their ranch near Stockton. This year 12 1/2 acres were grown on the Dehlinger ranch, producing 2975 sacks or a total weight of 342,740 pounds.

An interesting piece of experimental work was carried on by Karl Dehlinger, young son of S. P. Dehlinger. Forty days after the potatoes were planted, Karl stated out a number of hills that were not disturbed until digging time when they were dug and sacked individually in paper sacks. The aggregate weight of the 299 hills so selected was 2650 pounds, allowing 24 pounds for tare, giving net weight per hill of 6.77 pounds. These hills were selected as average healthy plants, free from mosaic diseases at that time.

This small experiment would indicate that disease-free tubers will get a much higher yield than those affected with the various mosaic or virus diseases. In an average field containing 10,000 plants per acre, this would make a yield of 67,200 pounds per acre, or around 670 sacks. With the proper kind of seed, good soil and good irrigation, there is no reason why production records in Klamath county shouldn't exceed those of any other district. Also, the growing of seed in the Klamath basin for the growers near Stockton should be an important future development of the Klamath potato industry.

P.)—Five-year-old Betty Jenkins met her death in an automobile accident in which her mother, Mrs. Rorer Jenkins, Kalamia, Wash., and her aunt, Mrs. Howard Jenkins, suffered minor injuries. The car was driven by the child's father who collided with another in an attempt to avoid striking an oncoming machine.

AT THE PINE TREE
Al Jolson, star of "Say It With Songs," all-talking, all-singing Vitaphone special, now showing at the Pine Tree theatre, was born in St. Petersburg, Russia, and brought to America at an early age, the family making their home in Washington, D. C. The elder Jolson—for so the family still spells the name—was fifth in a line of Jewish cantors and quite naturally wished his favorite son to succeed him in the service of the church. Cantor Jolson's antipathy to the theatre must have been far exceeded by the son's love for it, for the latter, when still a lad, managed to get a part in Israel Zangwill's "Children of the Ghetto" and even to be engaged as ballyhoo man for a traveling circus. Some time after the Spanish War, while singing in a Washington cafe, his father had him placed under surveillance. He soon became ill and was at once taken home. After an astonishingly swift recovery, he was off again, next being seen in an Al Reeves burlesque show.

Vaudeville experience followed—himself, his brother, and a mutual friend appearing in a sketch under the name of Jolson, Palmer and Jolson. It was during this period that the idea of using burnt-cork was suggested by a negro dresser, his black-face work bringing him instant and tremendous recognition.

"I never go in for impossible stuff," Jolson has stated. "Everything I do, anyone can do. I never have gold for my reward in a picture. It is always the girl, or I hold my job on the ranch until I get a better one."

"But I never close a picture with me in evening clothing and residing in a palace. I want to make the kind of picture that, when a fellow sees it, he will go out and say that there was nothing in the theme that he himself could not accomplish."
