NOTICE OF SPECIAL REFUNDING BOND ELECTION
SHASTA VIEW IRRIGATION DISTRICT

Notice is hereby given that a special election has been called and will be held in Shasta View Irrigation District on Friday, the 25th day of November, 1929, at which election there shall be submitted to the electors of said district possessing the qualifications prescribed by the Oregon Irrigation District Laws, the question whether or not refunding bonds of said Shasta View Irrigation District in the aggregate principal amount of \$93,300 shall be issued for the purpose of refunding a like principal amount of outstanding bonds of said district, dated November 1, 1923, bearing interest at the rate of 6 per cent per annum, payable semi-annually, and authorized at an election held in said district on the 28th day of July, 1922 (being the present outstanding portion of the total issue of \$120,000 authorized at said election).

Said election will be held and the result thereof determined and declared in all respects, as nearly as practicable, in conformity with the provisions of the Oregon Irrigation District Laws governing the election of officers.

At such election the ballots shall contain the words "Bonds—Yes," and "Bonds—No." The electors shall vote for or against the proposition by stamping or marking a cross (X) in the voting space after the words "Bonds—Yes" or "Bonds—No," respectively. If a majority of the votes cast are "Bonds—Yes," the Board of Directors shall cause refunding bonds in said amount to be issued, or such portion thereof as may be necessary from time to time.

The polls shall be opened at eight o'clock in the morning of the election and be kept open until five o'clock in the afternoon, when the same must be closed. For the purpose of this election, said Shasta View Irrigation District has been declared to be one election precinct. The following electors have been appointed Judges of Election of said election, to conduct the same, and the following named places have been named and selected as the polling place at said election:

Polling place—Residence of Harry Wilson in said District.
