### HUNTERS GET IN SHAPE TO BAG BIG CATS

Cash Prizes Posted By Commission Is Incentive

Cougar hunters in all sections of the state where the big cats abound are getting into shape and making preparations to win the cash prizes which have been offered by the state game commission for the five men who kill the most of the deer slaying animals between June 1, 1929 and June 1, 1930. Prizes are to be awarded as follows: first \$175; second \$125; third \$100; fourth \$50 and fifth \$40. Officials of the game department believe that the offering of these prizes in addition to the regular \$25 bounties will increase the number of cougar killed. During the fiscal year of the department that came to an end on September 30, figures show a substantial increase in the number of bounties collected by cougar killers.

**Sub Agents Relieved**  
Several sub agents for the sale of fishing and hunting licenses have been called to task and relieved of their responsibilities because of aid given men arrested for violation of the game laws. In several instances men have been arrested for not possessing licenses when hunting and fishing. They have made the contention that they owned licenses but left them at home. The wardens have made investigations and found that these men hurried back to their respective towns, called upon their friends who have sub agencies for licenses and prevailed upon them to issue licenses of dates a week or so in advance of the time of meeting the wardens and accept checks of a like date.

### STOP TROJANS IS OBJECT OF PRICE'S BEARS

Fans Not Expecting Upset Saturday However.

BERKELEY, Calif., Oct. 31. (AP)—Ready to tackle their most formidable foe this season, the Bears of California will entrain tonight for their battle Saturday against the Trojan clan of the University of Southern California in Los Angeles.

**Bears Stronger**  
Without doubt, the Bear aggregation this season is a much better organization than that which held Southern California to a scoreless tie a year ago. Knowing the strength of the Trojan eleven of last year, observers declare that the present California squad would be a favorite over the last season's team. However, upsets will occur, despite the efforts of rivals in football, and the California Bears may show strength as yet unrevealed.

**Backfield Tricky**  
The present California backfield holds many possibilities. Coach Nils Price has worked long and hard to bring out new offense tactics and new strength in first call reserves, and it was believed he had accomplished his purpose. Ed Griffiths, a fast man and a real corner, has been groomed for full service. Clarence Garrity, strong defensive star, Joe Hickingbotham and Rusty Gill were other new stars in the making. Lee Eisan was looked upon as an attacking threat as well as a clever quarterback. Ed Kirwan, who made a name for himself in the game against the Olympic club, was another reliable Bear, and there was Eldred Lane and Lee Rice, both of whom have been trained for the halfback posts, and have shown plenty of speed. And, of course, there were those veterans, Stann Barr, Bennie Lom and Ellis Thornton, the latter star of the Pennsylvania game.

**Have Chance**  
The Bears were confident today they had a chance in Saturday's contest, and a hopeful sign was the excellent condition and morale of the Blue and Gold. "Stop the Trojans" has been a by-word at practice sessions.

**PARIS, Oct. 31. (AP)—**Etienne Clementel, veteran radical socialist, chairman of the finance committee of the senate, and former minister of finance in the Herriot cabinet, today accepted "in principle" the task of forming a cabinet to succeed the recently defeated Briand ministry.
