PATSY DE LAP STRUCK BY CAR

Receives Broken Leg and Head Injuries; Driver Pays Brake Fine

Patricia Jean, 7-year-old daughter of Mr. and Mrs. Loyd DeLap, was severely injured yesterday when she was struck and knocked to the pavement by a car driven by Ira Childers as she was crossing the street on her way home from school.

The accident happened on Riverside drive near the city limits and almost in front of the girl's home at about 3:30 p. m. She suffered a broken leg, deep lacerations of the scalp and a possible fracture of the skull. She was immediately taken to the hospital in Childers' car, where she was unconscious for several hours.

Childers states that he was returning from the Weyerhaeuser mill, where he had been to apply for a job, and that he was unable to stop his car after seeing the girl in the street.

He was arrested and pleaded guilty to a charge of operating a car with defective brakes. He was fined \$35 by Police Judge U. S. Balentine. Chief of Police Keith Ambrose said that he and Traffic Officer Totten tested the brakes on the car and found them very poor and defective. The impact threw the girl for some distance. Her scalp was badly lacerated and it was not known last night whether she suffered a fractured skull or not.

This is the second child of the Loyd DeLap family to be struck and injured by cars in the past year. Their eldest daughter was struck by a car on Main street last year and received a fractured leg.

DONALD PALMER PLEADS GUILTY

Donald Palmer was arrested yesterday by Policeman Lewin on a charge of failure to stop and render aid and failure to report an accident after Palmer had hit Ida Manera, young girl, at Martin and Oak streets on October 19.

When brought before Police Judge U. S. Balentine, Palmer pleaded guilty to the charge and was fined \$15, which he paid. The girl was bruised in the accident.

GIRL TRIES SUICIDE. SALEM, Ore., Oct. 31. (AP)—Miss Vera Pack, 17, student at Leslie junior high school here, is near death at a hospital from a self-inflicted bullet wound.

The girl was employed at the home of Mr. and Mrs. Douglas McKay. No motive for the shooting was known but it was said Miss Pack had been keeping company with a local young man, and that sometimes she had met him instead of going to the home of her parents at Rickreall.
