## HORTON SMITH SENSATION AT GOLF TOURNEY

### Plays Opening Round In Portland at 5 Under Par

PORTLAND, Nov. 1. (AP)—With Horton Smith, young professional from Joplin, Mo., favored to lead the flock, in view of his sensational performance of yesterday, the second round of the third Oregon annual golf championship was to get under way on the Columbia Country club course here at 9 a. m. today.

Makes Round in 67  
Smith, driving with terrific force, played the 18 holes of the opening round yesterday in 67, five under par, and two strokes better than his nearest rivals, Ed Dudley of Delaware and Mortie Dutra of Tacoma, each with 69s.

A gallery of more than 1,000 followed the outstanding matches on the first day.

Amateurs Scarce  
Eight contestants, including Smith, bettered par, and three others were but a stroke behind. Amateurs were notably scarce the charmed circles of low scorers. A. E. Otis, Portland, led the simon pures with a 73, tying with Phil Taylor, Victoria, B. C., and Lighthorse Harry Cooper, Buffalo, N. Y., in fifth place.

Hagen 72  
Following Dudley and Dutra in second place was Craig Wood, ex-New York, with a 70. Four playish open champ, and Tommy Armour, ex-national open champ, tied with 72s. The other two players were Neil Christian, Portland pro., who demonstrated some superb golf, despite an injured arm, and Olin Dutra, Los Angeles.

Willing High  
Dr. Oscar F. Willing, defending champion and runner-up in the recent National Amateur championship at Pebble Beach, was high among the amateurs. He had a 73. Frank Dolph, ex-western titlist, and another Portland amateur favorite, could do no better than a 75.

The 100 contestants in the second round were to tour the 18 holes today in threesomes. At the end of today's play the field was to be split, the lowest 50 scores and ties entering the final 36 hole round tomorrow. In case of ties in the final round, play-offs will be held Sunday.

## THREE-WAY TIE IN NORTHWEST DUE FOR BREAK

SEATTLE, Nov. 1. (AP)—One of the three undefeated football teams in the Northwest conference is doomed to take the count tomorrow afternoon, unless the Pacific-Willamette contest ends in a tie.

Whitman, Pacific and Willamette are tied for first place in the conference, Whitman and Pacific with two victories and no losses, and Willamette with one win for a clean slate.

The Whitman missionaries have a practice game with East Oregon normal scheduled for tomorrow, but only the second string players of the former team are to see action. When the contest was arranged it was agreed that none of the Whitman regulars would be used.

The Pacific combination was badly shaken up while defeating College of Puget Sound last Saturday. Pete Miller, quarterback and backfield star, was injured, and may not start tomorrow.

The two cellar teams, College of Idaho and Linfield, will clash at Caldwell, Idaho. It will be a chance for one of the schools to break into the win column, as both have lost their first two starts.

LOS ANGELES, Nov. 1. (AP)—Coach Howard Jones is of the opinion that the Golden Bear of the University of California, which his U. S. C. Trojans face tomorrow, is a touchdown better than the team which last season held them to a scoreless tie.

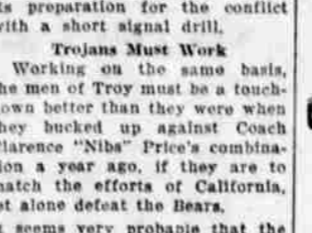
