

NEWS IN BRIEF

Crater Lake Lovely—

"During this period of the year, when Indian summer carresses the land, Crater Lake is at its best. On every side the hills and gorges are aflame with color. The more than sky-blue lake, nestling under its precipitous walls of varied hues, offers a marvelously lovely contrast in color tone, the most vivid blue in the world, that of the waters of the lake under a cloudless sky, standing out against the background of scrubby birch that covers the rocky and high walls of the surrounding crater. This scrubby forest in the cerise hues of mountain ash, madder and magenta. The huckleberry bush and willow mingle with the green of mountain hemlock washed clean of summer's coat of pumice dust. The cool air, warmed by a golden flood of radiance from the sun, is heady, exhilarating like old wine. Rain on October 6, 7 and 8 made it possible to burn brush that had been piled along the highway, thus completing the work of roadside cleanup. The old checking station at the south entrance to the park and the mess hall at Government camp have been torn down and their former locations beautified. All cars are now checking at the new checking station at Anna Springs."—Oregonian.

All Records Eclipsed—

All previous records for tourist travel to Crater Lake were surpassed during the travel year ended October 1. The records reveal that 125,435 persons visited the Crater Lake National park, lured by some of the world's most beautiful scenery, as well as by the matchless fishing offered and the opportunity for comfortable camping and hiking trips, where the soul of the tourist can commune at first hand with nature at her wildest. Heavy travel to the lake region this fall, due to the exceptionally fine weather conditions, has given promise that the coming year will see another record for the number of visitors to Crater Lake broken. "The October weather," says Margaret Sargeant, Crater Lake National park correspondent of Wild Life Lines, "has permitted travel to the lake to continue at the rate of 100 cars a day, or a total of 2033 cars, carrying 6789 visitors up to October 20. This is three times the number of visitors we have had from October 1 to June 1 of any prior year."—Oregonian.

W. Zimmerman in Portland—
"With a monthly payroll of \$200,000 and the government turning loose about \$700,000 a year, there is no wonder about Chillicothe being a lively town," said W. Zimmerman, banker of Chillicothe, who is in Portland on business. "The Indians are paid off every six months, and twice a year they have a great time and spend their government money about as fast as they can. The payroll of the mills is large, considering the small population, and the mill hands and lumberjacks put their wages in circulation when they get it. There are great times when Fourth of July comes, and all the lumberjacks are rolling in wealth. When it comes to sports, outside of Portland, Chillicothe has larger crowds at its boxing exhibitions than any other town in the state. The receipts will be from \$100 to \$500 more than at Medford. But wrestling would not attract a dozen people. Things are always lively at Chillicothe, but we have not had a killing in six months."—Oregonian.

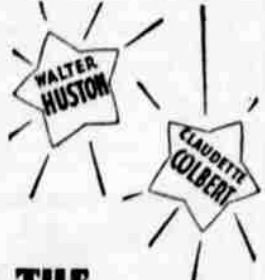
