LOS ANGELES, Nov. 2 (AP)—Two seasons of gridiron supremacy remain to be settled today before the 76,000 football enthusiasts who will gather at the Coliseum to witness the clash between the University of California eleven and the Trojans of the University of Southern California.

Hangover Grudge
For when the men of Troy line up against Coach Clarence "Nips" Price's proud Golden Bears, the play will have direct bearing on the scoreless draw which lurks in the background of a year ago. Moreover, the winner of today's classic stands in good stead to finish the Pacific coast conference season with the championship honors.

Both Teams Better
Both mentors have teams of better caliber than those they sent in against each other at Berkeley a year ago. Man for man, the opposing lines are considered to be almost on a par, with a pretty conflict promised between the forwards.

Smart, deceptive backfield combinations are boasted of by each school, while the two coaches are bleated with an imposing array of reserve material. On the substitutes may hinge victory or defeat.

The Oregon State Beavers were considered slight favorites by virtually everyone in this city last night except the band of Cougar followers who journeyed down here from eastern Washington. The visiting Washingtonians could see nothing but a Cougar victory.

Three In The
Three teams—Oregon, O. S. C. and W. S. C.—are tied for first place in the northern division and the Oregon-University of California at Los Angeles contest at Eugene and the Beaver-Cougar battle here today made up the semi-finals of the title race. All three eleven have lost one game each. Oregon and O. S. C. both fell before the onslaught of the Stanford Cardinals and W. S. C. dropped its first conference tilt to California.

OREGON WILL TRY RESERVES IN GAME TODAY
Eugene, Nov. 2 (AP)—The University of Oregon Webfoot and the Bruins from the University of California at Los Angeles were matched here today in the annual "Dad's Day" football game.

Odds heavily favored Oregon to win, but Coach John J. McEwan was prepared to send in his first team. He planned to experiment with his reserves in preparation for the game with Oregon State college here on November 16, should the opportunity present itself, however.

The Uclans were here in full force with the exception of Don Jacobson, who was injured in the first game of the season, and Bob Ramus, who has been out of the last two contests with a severe cold.
