Ashland Farmer Boy Rises From Canvas To Hit Blow

From the meager accounts coming to Klamath Falls this morning, it appears that Medford fans got an eyeful of powerful punches in the card at the Medford armory last night.

After an interesting preliminary card, the fans got calmed down to see what promised to be a hard fought contest between Gene O'Grady, Ashland farmer boy and favorite of southern Oregon, and Kid Dennis, hard slugging colored boxer from Denver.

The report says that just four blows were struck. Dennis hit Gene and Gene hit the floor. That made the referee peevish and he staid down to the count of eight to collect his reserve forces. When he got to his feet he planted a haymaker on the colored boy's mouth and that individual doubled up, described an arc in the air and landed on his shoulder in the opposite side of the arena, there to remain for a full five minutes before he realized what had hit him. That made the other two blows—total, four.

In the semi-windup, Billy Brendlove, Bend battler, and Teddy Mike of Los Angeles fought six fast rounds to a draw.

Klamath Falls fight followers are looking forward to the meeting between K. O. White and Feldman here Friday evening, with more than passing interest. Having seen White in action, many fans believe him a classy boxer, but so far Feldman is known only by his reputation and from what has been seen of his training work.

However, there are those who believe he will give the colored boy a run for the money. He is fast and has a punch with a real kick in it and White will have to be on his guard to keep from losing his reputation.

COAST CLUBS MAKE CHANGES

AVALON, Santa Catalina Island, Cal., Nov. 5, (AP)—Officials of Pacific coast league baseball clubs entered the second day of their annual meeting with all the major decisions made, and apparently only enough detail left to keep them occupied until noon today.

Yesterday's session, placid to the point of unanimity of opinion on leading questions, resulted in the retention of the split season for 1930 and a 25-week schedule. The opening date was set for Tuesday April 8, and a bonus of \$15,000 was voted for division at the close of the play the third week in October.

Four weeks of the schedule was announced, and in this section of the program was seen an attempt to overcome the bad weather bugaboo of the Portland and Seattle clubs, which held down gate receipts of the opening of the 1929 season.

The opening date is one week later than that of 1929, and both Portland and Seattle play in California two weeks before shoving the gates of their home fields ajar.

GLICK TAKES STETSON BOUT

SAN FRANCISCO, Nov. 5, (A P)—Joe Glick of Brooklyn, N. Y., left-jabbed and right-crossed himself into another decision over Frankie Stetson, San Francisco lightweight, in ten fast rounds at the State Armory in a return match last night. Glick, who outpointed the local boxer in a close bout in the same arena a few weeks ago, had Stetson groggy in the third and tenth rounds. Observers gave the easterner six rounds and Stetson four. Glick weighed 138 1-2, while Stetson scaled a pound and one half heavier.

Football Clannish Game in Chicago

Coach Alonzo Stagg, who for more than thirty years has been coaching the Maroon football teams, has his youngest son, Paul, playing quarterback on the varsity eleven and his other son, Alonzo, Jr., coaching the freshman team. In addition, Mrs. Stagg diagrams her husband's plays and end scouts the opposing eleven.

Coach Dick Hanley of Northwestern has his kid brother, Lee, playing quarterback and still another brother, Pat, acting as an assistant coach.

Football around Chicago is quite a clannish affair.

BELGE MIDGET FLAILS IZZY

NEW YORK, Nov. 5, (AP)—The elimination tournament by which the management of Madison Square Garden hopes to produce a generally recognized holder of the vacant flyweight title has passed its first round with only one surprise.

Last night's set of four ten round battles between leading 112-pounders served principally to entrench Eugene Huat, champion of Belgium more firmly in the favorite's position.

Huat, conqueror of Spider Pladner and Frenchy Belanger, made his New York debut in the principal bout of the night by administering a solid beating to "Izzy" Schwartz, New York's entry in the tournament. His victory came just after Willie Davis of Charleroi, Pa., who had been picked as the other probable finalist, had succumbed to the punches of his old rival, Black Bill of Cuba.

The night's two other victors were Midget Wolgast of Philadelphia and Ruby Bradley, Hol-yoke, Mass., negro. Wolgast eliminated Johnny McCoy of Buffalo, N. Y., from further competition while Bradley defeated Ernie Pevens of Chicago. In both bouts the decision was unpopular with the fans.

STANFORD NOT RESTING EASY

STANFORD UNIVERSITY, Cal. Nov. 5, (AP)—When the University of Washington bombards the invading Cardinals at Seattle Saturday, the battle will not find the Stanford eleven unprepared. Although there remained only three days before their train pulls out for the north, Coach Warner's men were faithfully drilling away at their many plays, thinking of victory only, and looking ahead to the "big game" with the hard fighting, conquering California Bears.

Coach Warner was slightly perturbed by the fact that Mush Muller, Card end and captain, was still incapacitated by injuries to his back suffered in the game with Southern California. Muller may still be out of the game Saturday against the Huskies. Pete Heiser, first string right guard, suffering with an injured knee, and Bill Simkins, also nursing a knee injury, were out of the play, but may be in the line-up for the clash with the Bears.

WOOD ALCOHOL FATAL TO TWO

PANAMA, Nov. 5, (AP)—Two seamen of the American steamer Graylock died at sea on November 3, from the effects of drinking poison alcohol while a third seaman, Carl Upmann, is now in the hospital at Colon gravely ill from the same cause. The dead victims, Leonard Larson and Eric Johannson, were buried at sea Sunday.

Upmann told the authorities that he and his companions had bought a bottle of liquor in New York and had mixed this with alcohol fished from a container in the ship's holds, not knowing it was poison. The ship's officers radioed the Cristobal health officials asking advice to treat the stricken men but their medical efforts were without avail.

M'LARNIN MAY REALIZE LIFE LONG AMBITION

Putting Mandell Out Of Running Gives Him Chance

CHICAGO, Nov. 5, (AP)—Jimmy McLarnin may not become the next world welterweight champion, but he has accomplished something that the present holder of the title, Jackie Fields, found too difficult a task.

McLarnin enhanced his standing as the foremost contender for the welterweight crown last night at the Chicago stadium where he gave Sammy Mandell, ruler of the world's lightweights, a thorough beating, winning a decision at the end of 10 rounds of great fighting.

Fields attempted to conquer the Rockford Shiek about a year ago, and received a fine boxing lesson from Mandell.

Mandell gave McLarnin a tugging year ago last summer when the baby faced fighter from Vancouver, B. C., attempted to lift the lightweight title, but last night found that at 143 3-4 pounds McLarnin was too tough for even his marvelous boxing ability. It was the first decision Mandell ever has lost, and was his first real defeat since he was knocked out by Joey Sangor, in 1928—when he was just getting started as a major performer.

McLarnin Too Strong

Mandell gave away six pounds to the slugger from Vancouver, B. C., and the handicap was too great. McLarnin who was too strong, and too aggressive was credited with six rounds, while Mandell who entered the ring the favorite was given but two.

The outcome was a surprise to most of the 22,812 spectators who paid \$102,368 to see McLarnin completely reverse the decision gained by Mandell in their lightweight championship a year ago last summer.

Sam's Chance Spoiled

The setback virtually wrecked Mandell's campaign leading to a shot at the welterweight championship.

In the semi-final, Otto Von Porat, Norwegian heavyweight, required less than one round of a 10-rounder, to dispose of Charles Smith, a recent invader from England. Von Porat knocked the Britisher down twice, the second time for keeps.

LIKES HIS GAME

MADISON, Wis., Nov. 5, (AP)—Dr. Walter Meanwell, the "Little Giant" of Wisconsin basketball, likes philosophy but not when it interferes with the favorite sport.

The University auditorium committee refused use of the gymnasium to Bertrand Russell, noted English philosopher, for November 20 because Dr. Meanwell said it would disrupt basketball practice. The campus philosophers have appealed to President Glenn Frank.

GUS STILL CHAMP

SEATTLE, Nov. 5, (AP)—"Dynamite" Gus Sonnenberg successfully defended his world's wrestling championship here last night against Charles Hansen, Omaha, winning falls late in the sixth and early in the seventh rounds with flying tackles. The match was held under the Australian wrestling system of eight ten-minute rounds.

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FIELDS KAYOS CHALLENGER IN SECOND CANTO

KANSAS CITY, Nov. 5, (AP)—Jackie Fields, king of the welterweights, had shattered, for a time at least, any future designs Dummy Mahan, San Francisco, may have on his crown. The champion, in a non titular battle here last night, sent the challenger to the canvas in the second round of a scheduled 10-rounder before 12,000 fans.

The mute boxer carried the fight to his opponent most of the initial round, landing many blows on the head and body of the champion. In the following round Fields pummeled Mahan's body with a steady attack of rights and lefts, and sent the Californian down for the count with a short left uppercut. Fields weighed 147 1-2 and Mahan 150.

Jack Dempsey, former world heavyweight champion, was the third man in the ring.

PELICANS FACE HARDEST GAME

Three hard games are still on the docket for the Klamath Pelicans, Bend, Ashland, and Medford.

It seems as though the K. U. H. S. is in for a real tough game when it plays Bend there November 11, according to the dope sheet. Bend has always turned out a tough team, and they usually win the Central Oregon championship.

Bend recently played Corvallis and won by the score of 37 to 7. Corvallis played Medford and won by a score of 14 to 3. This was the first time that Medford has ever been beaten for the last five or six years.

Although this is a non-conference game, the score will largely determine K. U. H. S.'s rating against Medford.

The following Saturday Klamath plays another game with the hard-hitting, fighting Ashland team.

Ashland is tied with Medford for first place in the conference, and they are hoped to win the championship, providing there is no upset on Klamath's part.

Western Conference Title Centers On Iowa City

The Iowa menace is Minnesota's concern this week for they will meet at Iowa City Saturday. With Northwestern and Indiana out of the way, Coach Spears started yesterday to elaborate on his offense, in preparation for the game that may make or break the gopher season.

Purdue May Gain

The situation caused by the schedule may work to the advantage of Purdue, which will meet Iowa after Minnesota takes its crack at Burt Ingerson's team. Ohio State's prospects of a victory over Northwestern Saturday were halted yesterday when Coach Sam Williams of the Buckeyes suspended Charlie Coffey, one of his star halfbacks, for the remainder of the season for infraction of training rules while the team was in Pittsburgh last weekend.

Illini Meets Army

Illinois started drilling for its intercollegiate clash with Army Saturday, after Coach Zuppke finished telling the varsity how bad it looked against Northwestern last Saturday.

Badgers Scoreless

Although battered in its defeat by Purdue, Wisconsin received no day of rest yesterday. Coach Thistlethwaite immediately went back to work to try to develop an offense which will function enough at least to score on Chicago Saturday. The Badgers have yet to score a point in conference competition.

Michigan is working busily to prepare a surprise for Harvard which will make its first midwestern appearance Saturday at Ann Arbor. Indiana has an open date this week and faces little work.

REPORT SAYS AGGIES MAKE 10-YEAR PACT

CHICAGO, Nov. 5, (AP)—West Virginia and Oregon State have agreed to a 10 year Thanksgiving Day football program on Soldier Field, Chicago for the benefit of the Shriners' hospitals for crippled children. The first game will be played in 1930.

Several nationally famous football officials will referee the games.

Report Partly Right

CORVALLIS, Ore., Nov. 5, (A P)—Soldier Field, Chicago, has been designated as the site of the West Virginia-Oregon State college football game Thanksgiving Day, 1930, under auspices of the Shriners. It is the first of a two-game series, the second to be played in Portland Thanksgiving Day, 1931.

The statement from Chicago that a ten-year program had been agreed upon by the two institutions was denied by Paul J. Schisler, Oregon State coach.

SPINK ARRESTED AT CHILOQUIN

J. C. Swindler, Chiloquin chief of police, yesterday denied that there was any political move in the arrest Friday night of R. C. Spink, former justice of the peace of Chiloquin and a prominent resident of that city.

"It was no political move at all," Swindler said. He stated that he saw Spink drive down the street to a place on the Main street where he parked and that Spink "signaled" in driving through the street.

Pleaded Guilty "I told him he had better park the car and walk home, that he was too drunk to drive," Swindler said. "He threw the car into low. I ran a few jumps, landed on the running board and pulled the key out of the switch."

Justice of the Peace Jack Almeter said that he asked Spink before he sentenced him if he knew the penalty and that Spink replied that he did and he then pleaded guilty to the charge of driving while intoxicated.

OYSTER DOCTOR
