OFFICERS HUNT DOUBLE SLAYER

INDEPENDENCE, Mo., Nov. 5 (AP)—Handicapped by the terror in which he is held by his neighbors, county officers today continued their search for George Hostetter, alleged assassin of Mr. and Mrs. Albert Weddle, who were shot to death Sunday night as they sat in their farm near here.

Neighbors of the Weddle family told investigators they would not talk until Hostetter was captured, and others said they would never testify against the man, who usually was armed. An extra force of deputy sheriffs patrolled the community today at the request of residents who feared the trapper. County authorities linked the slaying with the opposition of the Weddles to the proposed marriage of Hostetter and Mrs. Weddle's cousin, Miss Mary Hunter, who lives with her sister on a farm only a short distance away. Miss Hunter, questioned yesterday, admitted she and Hostetter had planned to be married. Miss Hunter's sister, Maud, co-owner of a 165-acre farm, said she opposed the match.

Timber Tax Fight Ends, Suit Withdrawn, Pay by November 24

month, increasing one per cent each month, is due and payable. Probably taxes in the amount of nearly a million dollars will be paid before November 24 at which time those who have not paid will be classed as though there had not been an extra 20 days' grace given.

No Interest, Penalty
Under the decree signed by Judge Bean it is ordered, adjudged and decreed that all funds and moneys tendered into the federal court by the protesting timbermen who offered a partial payment be returned to them, subject to the usual court fees. It is also ordered that the sheriff of Klamath county shall exact no penalty or interest on account of taxes payable in the year 1929 upon the tax roll for the year 1928 because of failure to pay same when due but shall receive such taxes without penalty or interest if they are paid before 20 days after the entry of the decree on November 4, 1929.

Neither party is to recover costs in the federal court suit.

Re-Veal Timber
The stipulation was signed by D. V. Kuykendall, Veazie and Veazie, and McCamit and Thompson, attorneys for the plaintiffs; and by District Attorney Wilson E. Wiley and R. E. Reames, attorneys for the defendants.

Main points in the order of the county board of tax equalization which has been signed and entered in the minutes of the board are:

1. All assessments of timberland in Klamath county on the 1929 assessment rolls shall be corrected and made upon the basis of the value per thousand feet as shown on a map filed with the clerk of the board and with the state tax commission. The map re-classifies and lowers some of the basic rates.

2. All Edgar and Cullison cruises shall be reduced 10 per cent with the exception of timber in townships 36, 37, 38, 39, 30 and 41, of ranges 6, 7, 8 and 9 east, on which timber the Edgar and Cullison cruise shall be used. The revised figures shall be used as a basis on which to apply the rates. The part of the cruise which will not be reduced is on the first part of the cruise made by Edgar and Cullison in the western part of Klamath county.

3. The assessed value of all mixed woods now on the 1929 rolls shall be reduced from 50 cents a thousand feet to 20 cents a thousand feet.

Ask State Assessment
In the resolution asking the state tax commission to make a complete survey and classification of all property in Klamath county "that any discrimination that exists at the present time will be eliminated" it is stated that the timber owners have stated that they are taxed 100 per cent of the property which they own, and that others are not so taxed.

What "a complete survey and classification of all property in Klamath county" means, is not definitely stated but it is presumed to mean a re-cruise of timber and an assessment by state officers of farms, real and personal property, throughout the county. The resolution in full is printed today.

Thank Commission
The county board of tax equalization has also passed a resolution thanking the state tax commission for its help in adjusting and settling the county's tax difficulties.

D. Q. D'Albini, expert accountant, is now working on the books of the county in order that all balances on hand at the close of 1929 may be taken into account and all sources of possible revenue for the year 1930 may be considered in making up the budget for the year 1930 on which the tax for 1929 is based.

To Name Budget Group
The budget committee has not yet been appointed by the county court, but it is expected that the members of the court will soon name the three citizens who will sit with the court to make up the budget.

The suit which was yesterday dismissed by stipulation of both parties in federal court was filed by the Weyerhaeuser timber company, Ralph E. Gilchrist, Gilchrist timber company, the Long-Bell lumber company, and the Shevlin-Hixon company, et al.

Settles Tax Troubles
It was based on the allegation that the 1929 budget for Klamath county was illegal because it assertedly did not take into consideration balances on hand at the close of 1928 nor some sources of expected revenue for 1929.

The complaints along with many others, both private persons, refused to pay small amounts until they saw the outcome of the suit which it found in favor of the plaintiffs who'd have thrown the 1929 rolls all off and reduced taxes for everyone, and larger companies who while not mentioned as plaintiffs in the suit were standing out with the five plaintiffs, will now pay the 1928 assessment.

The companies had tendered about \$135,000 in taxes which they did not protest. The amount was filed with the suit in federal court and will be returned and the companies will pay the full amount.

It is expected that the county's financial condition, which has

been cramped, with many departments of the county operating on a minimum amount, will be relieved within the next few days.

Several companies owning timber in the county had protested the 1929 assessments. The companies protesting were: Weyerhaeuser, Long-Bell, Shevlin-Hixon, Gilchrist, Yawkey, Day Brothers, Ralph E. Gilchrist, Walker and Hovey, and others.

Protests Analyzed
They protested taxing all timber, some of which will be cut this year and some on which taxes will be paid for 20 years before cut, at the same rate. It is thought that this objection has been removed on the map which is a part of the order.

They protested that the Edgar and Cullison cruise raised the amount of timber from 3 per cent in the western part of the county where it will stand as the basis for taxing to 40 per cent in other parts. This was reduced by 10 per cent by the agreement.

Whereas all other property in Klamath county, state of Oregon, had not been classified, and:

Whereas the large timber owners claim this is a discrimination against them, and:

Whereas discrimination should not be shown on the tax rolls, and:

Whereas the state tax commission of the state of Oregon has been of much assistance to this board of equalization;

Therefore, be it resolved, that the state tax commission of the state of Oregon be and hereby is requested to make a complete survey and classification of all property in Klamath county, Oregon, that any discrimination that exists at the present time will be eliminated.

IT IS, THEREFORE, ORDERED, FIRST, that all assessments of timberland in Klamath county, Oregon, on said rolls for the year 1929 shall be corrected and made upon the basis of the value per thousand feet as shown upon the map herewith filed with the clerk of this board and made a part of this order, and that a certified copy of said map be filed with the state tax commission.

SECOND, that said roll shall be corrected and equalized by determining the quantity of timber on lands covered by the Edgar & Cullison cruise as follows, to-wit: That all of the cruises as shown on the Edgar & Cullison cruise shall be reduced 10 per cent on said roll except in townships 36, 37, 38, 39 and 41 of ranges 6, 7, 8 and 9 east, on which area the Edgar & Cullison cruise shall be used.

THIRD, that the assessed value of all mixed woods now upon said 1929 rolls shall be reduced from 50 cents per thousand feet to 20 cents per thousand feet.

AND IT IS ORDERED that said roll be and hereby is equalized as above provided and that the assessor be and is hereby directed to enter in the proper column thereof under the head, "Values as Equalized," the proper sum arrived at by computations in the method above set forth and that when said corrections are made, together with all other changes ordered by this board, the said roll shall be and become the equalized tax roll of Klamath county, Oregon, for the year 1929.
