WHEN Hayden Hayden, distinguished artist, prepared to submit a poster in the competition for use in the 1929 Red Cross Roll Call for members, he was confronted with the problem of finding a model for the typical American girl he wished to depict. WHITE DEFEATS NEGRO. NEW YORK, Nov. 6. (AP)—In the only congressional election yesterday, Joseph A. Gagan, democrat, defeated one negro opponent, Hubert T. Delaney, by 13,438 votes.

The election in the 21st district, largely negro, was held to fill the vacancy caused by the death of Royal Weller, democrat.

RED CROSS HAS RIGHT OF WAY

In an address delivered last April before the national convention of the American Red Cross in Washington, D. C., Frank A. Arnold, director of development for the National Broadcasting company, told the Red Cross delegates that only one organization in the world shared with the president of the United States the privilege of instantaneous right of way over their facilities when there was a message to be delivered to the American people—and that organization was the American Red Cross.

Flag Protected—This recognition of the Red Cross as an unofficial arm of the government is exemplified in many ways. In the first place, the Red Cross operates under a congressional charter, granted in 1905. Its president is the President of the United States, and the departments of state, treasury, war, navy and justice are represented on its central committee. The Red Cross flag is privileged to fly on a level with the national emblem and is protected from unauthorized use by federal statute.

Red Cross First

At no time is the co-operation between the Red Cross and the government more strikingly illustrated than when a major disaster overtakes some section of the United States. Through being in constant communication with the U. S. weather bureau, the Red Cross is notified in advance of impending storms and floods and in many instances, notably the Florida and West Indies hurricanes and the Mississippi flood,

has been able to have its workers on the scene before the catastrophe has occurred, after a disaster has struck, the Red Cross can call upon the army, navy and marines, the coast guard, the public health service, the bureau of lighthouse, the coast and Geodetic survey, the department of agriculture, and the department of commerce for any assistance it may need. It is in great part due to the co-operation extended by the Red Cross by these government departments and bureaus that quick relief in emergencies has been achieved, and in many catastrophes the suffering of disaster victims would have been more intense and prolonged had not this intimate working relationship existed.

Finally, the accounts of the Red Cross are audited each year by the United States war department and the Red Cross report submitted to congress, assuring the American people of honest and conscientious stewardship of their membership fees and donations.

The sale will be made, it is expected, on a consignment basis with a cash advance of \$3 1-2 cents on number one stock. Confirmation of the advances has not been received.

Five bids were secured by the association, but all proposals were rejected. The bids ranged from 10 cents to 35 cents cash f. o. b. cars, and were the highest proposals to be received by any of the four pools.
