## MID-WESTERN SCHOOLS HAVE EDGE ON EAST

### Two Saturday Games May Change Status However.

CHICAGO, Nov. 7 (AP)—Upon Michigan and Illinois Saturday will fall the burden of maintaining the edge held by the western conference over intersectional football opponents.

Three Out of Five  
In five games big ten teams have triumphed three times over adversaries from the east and south, with Chicago defeating Princeton, Minnesota defeating Vanderbilt and Wisconsin downing Colgate. Colgate got one back for the east by trouncing Indiana, and Pittsburgh scored the second victory for the east by trimming Ohio State last week.

The Illinois are accorded a better chance of coming through victorious over Army Saturday at Urbana, than Michigan is of defeating Harvard at Ann Arbor. Michigan has not scored a victory in three major contests.

Minnesota and Iowa are drilling for their battle at Iowa City. Both teams are moaning about injuries to regulars, but are fairly fortified with replacements.

Northwestern will take to the road tonight, heading for Columbus to meet Ohio State. The Wildcats are in excellent shape to develop the edge necessary to stop the Purple.

Although Coach Jimmy Phelan of Purdue, does not take the Bollermakers' intersectional contest with Mississippi lightly, he is working with his eye on the Iowa threat, a week from Saturday.

Chicago Not Worried  
Chicago has done little hard work in preparation for Wisconsin but will have its full squad, with the exception of one man, available for battle against what is likely to prove an exceedingly tough Wisconsin team. Indiana will be idle Saturday and Coach Pat Page is experimenting in an attempt to devise a combination which can cope with Northwestern a week hence.

Notre Dame will tackle the Drake Bulldogs Saturday. They will meet at Soldier Field, Chicago, Notre Dame's 1929 "home grounds."

## HUSKY SIGNAL BARKER GREEN

SEATTLE, Wash., Nov. 7, (AP)—A third string quarterback will likely lead the mauling battered and bruised University of Washington football team against the powerful Stanford eleven here Saturday.

Johnny Geehan and Bill Miltstedt, regular quarterbacks, are both suffering leg injuries and Coach Enoch Bagshaw has been using Jack Patrick, a comparatively green signal barker at the important position in practice this week.

Patrick has played very little this year.

Geehan has been improving fast and may be able to see some action. Bagshaw has been giving him a good rest this week in a hope that he will fully recover in time for the game.

The contest will be the last till at home this season for the Huskies. The following Saturday the Washington eleven will play California at Berkeley and then journey to Chicago to meet the University of Chicago in its final game of the year.

## IT COST OVER \$2,000,000

But It's Worth Every Cent of It  
Says Texas' Richest Man

ARLINGTON DOWNS, Tex., Nov. 7, (AP)—W. T. Waggoner, one-man host to a party of 10,000, sat in his own grandstand yesterday and chuckled. His \$2,000,000 party, the opening of Arlington Downs race track, had gone over with a bang.

When the crowd passed the 9,000 mark, despite intermittent gusts of rain, Waggoner said he had his money's worth. His sun tanned face—a tan accumulated during forty years of riding cattle ranges in north Texas—wrinkled as he chuckled and said: "I've got my money back already. I wanted them to be here and I'm glad."

Just how much this precedent breaking party cost isn't known, but it was well over two millions. And it was precedent breaking, not only in the sum expended, but in the fact that there was no gambling or drinking—in the open.

A little sign was posted conspicuously: "The laws of Texas do not permit betting on horse races. Kindly cooperate. The Volstead law will be strictly enforced. Texas Jockey Club." Another \$4,000, for six races, is offered in purses today.

## COLORED STAR NOT KEPT OUT BY AGREEMENT

NEW YORK, Nov. 7, (AP)—New York University announced today that Dave Myers, negro quarterback, would play against Georgia Saturday provided that he recovers in time from an injury received in the Penn State game.

In a memorandum issued today in which he said the so-called "gentleman's agreement" between the two universities that Myers was not to play had never existed and that he had been misquoted in newspaper stories about the apparent discrimination against the negro star, professor Giles L. Courtney, chairman of the N. Y. U. board of athletic control, said that Myers' physical condition would be the determining factor. He added "Mr. Meehan willingly accepts the view of the board of athletic control and he will be guided accordingly in naming the starting lineup for Saturday's game."

Head Coach Chick Meehan previously had announced that Myers would not play.

## KARASICK WINS ROUGH MATCH

PORTLAND, Ore., Nov. 7, (AP)—In a rough wrestling match here last night, Al Karasick, light heavyweight, defeated Harry Demetral, two out of three falls in the main event and Chet Wiles, wrestling traffic cop, and August Sepp, Seattle, went 45 minutes to a draw in the special event. Karasick took the first fall from Demetral in 25 minutes, 40 seconds, after exchanges to face with fists and kicks to the body. Demetral came back

equally rough to take the second fall in 11 minutes, 10 seconds when after getting set for an airplane spin, suddenly shot Karasick headfirst to the mat and pounced upon him. Karasick took the third fall with a reverse headlock in 15 minutes, 10 seconds. The fall came after eight applications of this punishing hold.

Wiles took the first fall from Sepp in 17 minutes, 32 seconds with wristlocks, Sepp taking the second fall in 19 minutes, 13 seconds with a half airplane spin and body slam.

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## NEVER TOO ILL TO COACH TEAM

SOUTH BEND, Ind., Nov. 7, (AP)—Coach Knute Rockne of Notre Dame, admits there is little chance of his being able to walk around before the end of the football season—but that isn't going to keep him from directing the Ramblers' preparation for the southern California game at Soldier Field, Chicago, November 16.

Rockne, who has been in bed for the past two weeks, nursing his infected leg, insists that the business of getting ready for the Trojans, is his business, and he will be there.

"I'll have to do the coaching from the car," Rockne said, "but I'll be where the practicing is being done, and that's something, you know."

## PURDUE HOLDS YARDAGE LEAD

CHICAGO, Nov. 7, (AP)—Purdue's backfield trio of Glen Harmeson, Alex Yunevich and "Pest" Welch, continues to lead the western conference in ground gaining, with an average advance

of 4.75 yards for each trip with the ball from scrimmage. Harmeson is the individual ace, having carried the ball 87 times for a total of 513 yards—an average of 5.5. Art Phamer, Minnesota's versatile back, has tried 43 times for 218 yards, giving him an average of 5.1 yards. Win Brockmeyer, another gopher star, has averaged five yards even.
