### Snappy Bout Feature Tonight's Pavilion Fight Card

Tonight's main event at the Legion pavilion is about the best match that Tex Bickerstaff has arranged in his 2 1/2 years of matchmaking here. It should be a whole of a bout, if clever boxing and heavy slugging combined count for anything.

The Tiger is one of the fastest boys ever seen here. His bout with Walter Cleghorn three weeks ago convinced fans that he has the heart of a great fighter—always ready to trade in and give and take. He has fought main events in Madison Square Garden, meeting the best men of his weight, including such stars as Maxie Rosenbloom, claimant of the light heavy weight championship, Joe Anderson of Covington, Ky., Red Ullian, Geo. Dixon, Homer Sheridan, Wilson Yarbo, and others.

Feldman is a combination of boxer and fighter, too. He is a young chap and bound to make a name for himself in his chosen profession. It will be his first appearance here, but fans are enthusiastic about his work and he is bound to be an audience pleaser.

#### Fast Semi Final

The semi 6 rounds at 133 pounds finds two rivals for the supremacy in their weight in southern Oregon—Frankie Munroe, the pride of Chiloquin, and the ever popular Bend favorite, Billy Breedlove. This pair met once before, about a year ago, and boxed to a draw. Ever since that time each claimed the victory, so now, through an accident which prevents Teddy Mike from appearing, Munroe and Breedlove will have an opportunity to settle the argument. Mike straddled a ligament while training and was forced to cancel the engagement, much to the sorrow of Tex, who had counted much on this match to strengthen the whole card. Teddy is a high class performer and will show here as soon as he is in shape again.

Munroe and Breedlove will each weigh around 133. It is a good match, for Munroe is a boring in type of fighter, willing to take a chance against a skillful boxer such as Billy is. Fans will like this go.

#### They Well Matched

That coming heavy weight from Dairy, who has only boxed about 8 rounds in regular matches may meet something to keep him guessing tonight when he faces Swede Johnson, fighting lumberjack who tips the beam around the 205 mark. ### DEMPSEY WAS AUTHORITY ON RACING SPORT

CHICAGO, Nov. 8, (AP)—The death of Jack L. Dempsey, veteran racing authority and writer, has taken from the turf sport one of its most interesting characters. Dempsey died yesterday at Dallas, Tex., where he had gone to report the racing revival meeting in the Lone Star state. In death he has joined Sam Hildreth and James Rowe, Sr., famous American trainers; Mars Cassidy and Lester Dean, noted starters, and John Ed. Madden, one of the country's leading breeders of thoroughbreds, all of whom died within the past few months.

### Bad Shoulder To Keep Myers Home

NEW YORK, Nov. 8, (AP)—Although the matter will not be definitely settled until after an examination it is unlikely that Dave Myers, New York university's negro quarterback, will get into tomorrow's game against the University of Georgia. His left shoulder is injured. N. Y. U. athletic authorities have announced that two physicians who have no connection with the university will make the examination. Their judgment will be final in the matter. The negro star said yesterday that he did not believe he would be able to play.

### Card-Husky Bout Center Of Coast Interest Saturday

SAN FRANCISCO, Nov. 8, (AP)—Affording a respite from the hectic developments in the coast conference football race during the last two weeks, only one gridiron event of major importance will hold the interest of conference fans tomorrow. At Seattle, the Cardinals of Stanford university and the Washington Huskies will tangle in the feature contest of the day. The Cardinals have dropped one game this year, to Southern California, and Washington has lost several, but the game promises to be hard fought. The Huskies are seeking to vindicate their deposed coach, Enoch Bagshaw, in the eyes of the football world by taking a victory over either Stanford or California, whom they meet next week. The leader of the conference, the University of California, will tangle with the Montana Grizzlies at Berkeley. In all probability this game will be an easy victory for the Californians, and Coach Nils Price is planning to use second string men throughout the major part of the contest.

The other conference clash of the day will be between Washington State, the leader of Pacific Northwest eleven, and the University of Idaho Vandals. The game will be played at Pullman, the home of Washington, and from all indications should be a win for the home team. Southern California, who was upset by California last week, takes on a non-conference opponent this week, meeting the University of Nevada in a game at Los Angeles.

### Airplanes Carry Nevada U's Team

RENO, Nev., Nov. 8, (AP)—Eight large cabin planes, were ready for a takeoff at nine o'clock this morning to carry the University of Nevada football squad and its corps of trainers and coaches to Los Angeles where the "wolf pack" will meet the University of Southern California Trojans Saturday. The flight, a distance of more than 400 miles, is expected to take three and a half hours, the regular flying time of the Nevada air line company, which operates a daily service between the two cities.

### ALL QUIET ON MID-WESTERN FRONTS TODAY

#### War Will Break Out For Fair On Saturday

By WILLIAM WEEKES Associated Press Sports Writer CHICAGO, Nov. 8, (AP)—The ominous quiet preceding storms and wars permeated western conference football camps today, in anticipation of tomorrow's brilliant program of games. Headlined by three inter-sectional games and one contest of vital championship importance, the day ranks as the biggest of the season in the midwest. Nearly 300,000 spectators are expected to jam into the stadia with the Michigan-Harvard game at Ann Arbor, topping the list in attendance at from 87,000 to 90,000 but not outranking the Illinois-Army struggle at Champaign, as a spectacle.

While the Wolverines are attempting by victory over Harvard to salvage something from the wreckage of their worst season since 1919, and Illinois goes out to atone for last week's defeat at Northwestern, Minnesota will tackle its toughest foe of the season so far, meeting Iowa at Iowa City. The other inter-sectional contest will bring together Mississippi and Purdue, the big ten leader, at Lafayette, Ind. Ohio State, the surprise team of the conference, will put its big ten record, marred only by a tie, on the block against Northwestern at Columbus, O., and Wisconsin will try to account for its initial conference victory at the expense of Chicago, at Chicago. Indiana, alone, will be idle.

Outside the conference Notre Dame and Drake will furnish the attraction at Soldier Field, Chicago.

# ARMISTICE PROCLAMATION

## ARMISTICE DAY

LET it be known throughout the Klamath Basin and the State of Oregon that all business houses, professional offices and all other institutions that do not serve humanity with food, shelter or immediate necessities, shall close their doors the entire day of Monday, November 11th, 1929, which is

### ARMISTICE DAY

And on that occasion which commemorates the closing of the World War when the Kaiser of Germany mistook himself for a Divine Power and attempted to lick the world and failed, let it further be known that together with soldiers who fought in Europe there will be Paul Bunyan who will take charge of all affairs both official and unofficial in Klamath Falls for the day of November 11th.

I hereby declare that none shall interfere with Paul Bunyan as he wields his axe in this lumber town letting his chips fall where they may—

There shall be dancing and jollification both over the celebration of the ending of the World War, the hope that there never will be another War, and the presence of Paul Bunyan in Klamath Falls.

Captain Collier is hereby appointed body guard for Paul and the Captain shall choose his own escort.

Let the cannon roar at sunrise on Armistice Day; let the flags be unfurled; let joy be unconfined; and in celebrating that event just give Paul Bunyan and his escort right of way on every street of the city.
