

FERTILIZER AIDS ONIONS

Demonstrations Show Value and Cost of Increase

Results of the use of commercial fertilizer on onion plots carried on by the county agent's office on the D. A. McComb farm in the Hager district have been completed and released, showing that it pays to use the fertilizer.

Muriate of potash, 2-12-3 and 3-10-10, commercial fertilizers, were applied on plots of 1-20th of an acre, with check plots on which no fertilizer was used.

The ratio 2-12-3, for example, represents the parts of nitrogen, phosphorus and potassium in the fertilizer.

Fertilizer 2-12-3 applied at the rate of 1,000 pounds to the acre yielded at the rate of 10, 100-pound sacks per acre more than the check plot. The fertilizer cost, including freight, \$29.72 a thousand pounds here. Largest onions grown were produced on this plot.

Fertilizer 3-10-10, and muriate of potash fertilizer applied at the rate of 1,000 pounds to an acre yielded 30 sacks more per acre than did the check plots. Cost of these fertilizers a thousand pounds was \$33.67 in Klamath Falls.

"Under conditions similar to these it will pay the onion grower to use these types of commercial fertilizer if his onion will not him \$1.50 a hundred pounds," Victor Johnson, assistant county agent, states.

The onion seed was planted March 25 and the fertilizer applied one inch deep with a drill, between the rows, on April 17. All plots in the demonstration were cultivated and irrigated an equal amount, according to Mr. McComb.

Charles Lenhart Fined, Released

Charles Lenhart was released from custody last night after he had entered a plea of guilty to possession of intoxicating liquor, alcohol, and a fine of \$200 had been turned into the court by Lenhart's attorney, D. E. Fletcher.

Lenhart appeared before Justice of the Peace W. B. Barnes and admitted possession of 72 gallons of alcohol which were seized by officers Wednesday at the Fred Lyons place in Altamont. Charges of possession of beer and possession of moonshine were dismissed.

A warrant has also been sworn out against Lyons charging him with possession of alcohol, beer and moonshine. "This is not by any means the end of this case," Louis Mueller, one of the arresting officers, stated last night.

GARRET HOLDS OLDEST EFFIGY

CONSTANTINOPLE, Nov. 8. (AP)—Turkish police Thursday discovered in the garret of an old Armenian woman of Smyrna what may prove to be one of the oldest effigies of Christ in existence. She said her great grandfather found the statue in the environs of Biblically famous Ephesus.

Smyrna museum authorities believed the statue to be at least 1,800 years old, but are awaiting the dictum of Constantinople authorities who have left for that city.

STUDYING TAXES

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Plant Inspection To Be Saturday

Inspection of plant and equipment of the Klamath Co-operative Dairyman's association at 643 Spring street has been set for Saturday. It was announced last night by Karl Stone, manager.

From 2 until 4 Saturday afternoon the plant, which includes equipment for making butter, cheese, and market milk, will be open to all who wish to view it. A program is planned and presents will be given to visitors.

Dairy authorities will be present to speak on the program, and many interesting features are planned.

Most modern equipment on the market today, costing over \$5,000 has been installed for the factory, which will open about November 15, and will manufacture the products of more than 100 dairymen of the county who have joined in the association.

The association's plant has taken the agency for the DeLaval cream separators and milking machines.

WILL DEDICATE NAVAL AIRSHIP

AKRON, O., Nov. 8. (AP)—Elaborate ceremonies were arranged lately to dedicate the master ring of the world's greatest fighting and largest dirigible, the ZRS-4 under construction here for the navy.

A golden rivet, completing the ring, was to be driven home by Rear Admiral William A. Moffett while the dirigible Los Angeles, a fleet of blimps and numerous airplanes circled overhead. The admiral, who as chief of the navy bureau of aeronautics is supervising the construction, other naval officers and officials of the Goodyear-Zeppelin corporation the builders, were scheduled to speak. A crowd of 50,000 was expected.

The ZRS-4 will be 785 feet long, 146 feet high and will have a capacity for helium gas of 6,500,000 cubic feet. The Los Angeles, with its 2,500,000 cubic feet and the Graf Zeppelin with its 2,700,000, are small in comparison. Its vulnerability has been reduced as low as possible with the present knowledge of engineering. Among other features, it will be equipped with five airplanes to maneuver about and ward off attack.

Vale Suspect Is Being Held Here

A. J. Hopkins was taken into custody yesterday by Deputy Sheriff Rosa H. Brown and Dale Mattoon and is being held for Vale, Ore., authorities, who are on their way to this city to return the prisoner.

According to a telegram received by Sheriff Lloyd Low, Hopkins is wanted on a charge of burglary not in a dwelling.

BEATEN TO DEATH

WENATCHEE, Wash., Nov. 8. (AP)—William R. Woodall, 55, who came here from Seattle in September with his wife and four children, was beaten to death in his wood shed between 5 and 6 o'clock this morning with an automobile jack. He went out after wood, his wife said. A son, Otis, works for the Puget Sound power and light company in Seattle. Identity of the slayer was unknown.

YOUNG SCRIPPS SAFE

DETROIT, Nov. 8. (AP)—William E. Scripps, publisher of the Detroit News, announced today that he had received word from his son William J. Scripps, 24, who has been missing since Oct. 23. He did not reveal his son's whereabouts.



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
