BEARS POINT FOR CONFLICT WITH HUSKIES

Coast Conference Flag At Stake This Week End

SAN FRANCISCO, Nov. 11. (AP)—F. A. T. western football teams took up practice grind today for the closing weeks of a campaign already bulging with spectacular victories or reversals but still promising some mighty hand to hand encounters before a championship is decided.

Bears Chances Good
Two jumps away from the throne, California's Bears mapped out their battle plans in the hope of overcoming Washington's Huskies next Saturday and Stanford's Cardinals a week later.

The Bears are the last of the undefeated in the ranks of the Pacific coast conference in turn, they have vanquished Washington State, Southern California and Montana, the latter bowing to 53-18 defeat last Saturday. Favored by right of record, California is expected to add Washington to its list of victims and bid for the conference title against its traditional foe Stanford.

State Battle Looms
Two other conference clashes next week end will pit Washington State against Montana and Oregon against Oregon State.

Loss of but one conference game, Washington State figures to brush aside Montana which has lost twice and tied one contest. Oregon like wise has been defeated but once and will take the field a pre-game favorite over its state rival.

Stanford, conqueror of Washington 6-0, in a hard fought game last Saturday will take on Santa Clara, meanwhile "pointing" for California on the following week end. St. Mary's Gaels, undefeated and unscathed upon so far this season, will invade the home grounds of the University of California at Los Angeles Bruins. The U. C. L. A. eleven has lost three conference games and failed to score a point in any of them so supporters of the independent St. Mary's team look for it to add a conference scalp to its collection. Earlier in the season, St. Mary's and California's Bears played to a scoreless tie.

Idaho Meets Gonzaga
In another non-conference game Idaho meets Gonzaga. The Idaho delegation took at 41-7 trouncing from Washington State last Saturday.

Southern California's Trojans will journey to Chicago to test the power of Notre Dame, one of the few undefeated, united teams in the country.

St. Mary's Win From Santa Clara

SAN FRANCISCO, Nov. 11. (AP)—A crowd of 42,000 spectators saw St. Mary's Gaels take a hard-earned 6-0 victory from their old-time rivals, Santa Clara, in their annual gridiron struggle in Kesar Stadium here yesterday. Victory came to St. Mary's in the last quarter on a long pass, after they had been held on the line for three quarters. Mack Bennett, left half-back heaved a 22-yard pass to Toccaul, right half, who ran 50 yards to score. The try for extra point failed.

Klamathite Fifth In Point Making

OREGON STATE COLLEGE, Corvallis, Nov. 11 (Special)—Despite the fact that Roger Montgomery has been out of the Oregon State lineup a good part of the season, the Klamath Falls speed merchant ranks fifth in the scoring column of the Beaver institute for the games played so far this season. BOLD HOLDUP NETS ROBBERS FINE JEWELRY

CHICAGO, Nov. 11 (AP)—Mrs. Arthur W. Cutten and Mrs. Alfred T. Martin, wives of multimillionaire stock and grain operators, were robbed of money and jewelry in a bold gold coast hold-up late Friday night.

Police were told Mrs. Cutten lost a "very valuable" necklace of matched pearls, but its worth was not given. Mrs. Martin, whose husband is vice president of Bartlett Frasier company, brokers, lost a necklace of unreported value.

A Blonde Involved
The robbery evidently was plotted and executed by five bandits, assisted by a blonde young woman.

Mrs. Cutten had been hostess to Mrs. Martin and Mrs. Joy Morton, wife of the head of the Morton Salt company, at dinner and a theater party. Mrs. Morton had been left at a loop hotel after the theater and the other two women were on the way to Mrs. Martin's gold coast home when the robbery took place.

Girl Watched Women
Mrs. Martin told police that during the theater performance she had noticed an attractive blonde sitting nearby and watching them closely. After the theater and while waiting for the Cutten limousine, Mrs. Martin said she again saw the young woman, standing near them and talking to two well dressed men.

Use Limousine
After leaving Mrs. Morton, who was wearing much valuable jewelry, Mrs. Cutten and Mrs. Martin proceeded north toward Mrs. Martin's home. About a block from their destination, another limousine drew alongside, one of the five passengers shouting that they were police officers and directing the Cutten chauffeur to stop at the curb.

The chauffeur was ordered from the car and taken under guard a block away. Two of the robbers entered the Cutten car and warned the women to remain quiet.

After taking the women's jewelry, the men got into their own limousine and drove away.

Men Identified
Mrs. Martin identified two of the robbers as the same men who had been in front of the theater.

Mrs. Cutten was hysterical, but Cutten said she had lost considerable jewelry. He would not estimate its value until insurance appraisers had been given a schedule of the loss.

Several years ago the Cuttens were robbery victims in their Downers Grove, Ill., home where they and a butler were left bound and gagged by robbers who had cut the telephone wires and forced entry into the house. The robbers later were captured.

Few Scars of France Recall War Tragedies of 1914-1918

PARIS, Nov. 11 (UP)—Eleven years ago today the world's greatest war came to an end.

Except for a few scars on the facades of such buildings as the Ministry of War, the Credit Lyonnais, and sundry churches and houses of the capital, there is little to recall those four years of horror which were lifted with the signing of the armistice in the bleak spot of the Forest of Compiègne at dawn on November 11, 1918.

The actual armistice was started on November 7, when a deputation of Germans in automobiles carrying strong head-lights crossed the lines during the night and were stopped by Captain L'Hullier, of the Alpine Chasseurs.

The men occupied a forest road, and when they saw the cars advancing, white flags of truce waving in the light of the strong lamps, the captain commanded the men to cover the road with machine guns and stand in readiness to fire. They did not fire. Captain L'Hullier learned that the delegation wanted to speak with Marshal Foch. It was about peace.

Details of First Meeting.
Some mysterious telegrams shot back and forth from Foch's headquarters which then happened to be in a sleeping car on a siding in the Forest of Compiègne at Bethondes. The outposts were warned to watch for a white flagged delegation the next day, which was to call on Foch. According to the late Marshal's story, the Germans arrived promptly, bearing credentials from Prince Max of Baden. It was at this meeting on the following day, that Foch made known the Allies' terms. Foch gave Germany 72 hours to think it over.

The German delegation wanted immediate peace. "Our armies are in a desperate situation," began Herr Erzberger, who headed the delegation. "We want the fighting to stop right now, this minute." Foch replied that the Allied army could not be stopped so abruptly, but that the Germans had the Allied terms, and that if they were acceptable, they could so inform the Allies within the stipulated three days. Foch's terms were unconditional surrender, immediate withdrawal from French and Belgian soil; surrender of thousands of guns, airplanes and tons of war material and the German fleet. The Germans succeeded in retaining 5000 machine guns, which they said were needed in case of mutiny or bolshevism, which then threatened the German forces.

The rest is well known to the world. Foch admitted he was in a nervous state on the night preceding Nov. 11. At 2 o'clock in the morning, he was awake in his private car, awaiting the Germans. They arrived early, being escorted as usual through the French lines wearing the white banner of parliamentary usage. At 5:15 a. m. when the sky was still dark, in the glare of electric lamps, the Act of Armistice was signed.

signed in bold letters. More mysterious telegrams shot back and forth along the front, and buglers throughout the long lines of dark trenches sounded the call to "Cease Fire." It does not take a vivid imagination to picture the state of troops, those going to the front and those being relieved, when the cease fire order arrived for 11 a. m., and the last salvo roared through the valleys of death.

Foch was already in a speedy motor racing for the War Ministry, where he deposited the Act of Armistice with Clemenceau, saying to the grizzled and still unsatisfied old veteran, "Monseigneur is President, my work is finished; your work begins."

LEGION AIDS WAR VETERANS

Many Services Performed Unselfishly for All Men of A. E. F.

Through the efforts of the American Legion many benefits have accrued to all veterans of the World war. The adjusted compensation law was enacted by congress only because the Legion fought persistently for it. The Legion made possible the legislation which gives veterans free government hospitalization when available and laws which permit veterans to take out government life insurance at low premium rates.

Ex-service men are given preference in civil service appointments because the Legion urged the passage of laws to provide this. The laws that have been passed have been for all ex-service men and not for Legionnaires alone.

Founded on Service
In the ranks of the American Legion the word "service" has come to have a clear and distinct meaning. The Legion was founded on a program of unselfish service and it has fully justified its existence through the performance of outstanding and worth-while deeds.

If a disabled comrade is in need the Legion sees that he is properly cared for. Relief is provided to the dependent children of those who made the supreme sacrifice or gave their health to their country. The community service program of the Legion has been far-reaching. Civic improvements have been brought about in many communities through Legion effort. The Legion has taken the lead in teaching the principles of Americanism and in furthering a nation-wide program of good citizenship.

Help Disabled
The rehabilitation of the men who were physically disabled in the World war has been and will continue to be the first concern of the Legion. Thousands of disabled men have been able to obtain government compensation for their war-incurred injuries by the aid of the Legion in prosecuting their claims.

Thousands of others have received government hospital care to which they were entitled. Justice for the disabled emergency army officers of the World war was obtained through the enactment of a Legion-backed law providing for their retirement with pay.

Child Welfare Work
The child welfare program is the second big activity of the Legion. While the Legion is interested primarily in the children of veterans, the program seeks to benefit all underprivileged children. A \$5,000,000 endowment fund has been raised to finance this work, the interest being used for both child welfare and rehabilitation. Much progress has been made in this activity by the enactment of improved child welfare laws in the various states. The Legion is giving particular attention to providing World war orphans with educational opportunities.
