BATTLE ROYAL IN OFFING AT SOLDIER FIELD

Trojans-Notre Dame Bout Really Means Championship.

NEW YORK, Nov. 13, (AP)—On the already well-established theory that they do come back, even if it takes a trip of 2,000 miles for the purpose, Southern California's Trojans figure to be the team to stop Notre Dame's rush Saturday before 120,000 spectators at Soldier Field, Chicago.

On the also well-established fact that Notre Dame, even with Knute Rockne able to direct them only on a part time basis, has turned out the greatest Hoosier array since the "Four Horsemen," the unshaken South Bend cyclone figures to sweep over the Trojans and on toward a national championship.

Battle Of Season

It is an argument that depends on the point of view. It won't be settled probably until the dusk settles along the shore of Lake Michigan but if this intersectional battle doesn't turn out to be one of the greatest of the season, it will not be for the lack of spectacular elements.

Those who like the chances of Southern California see the Trojans bounding across the country to atone for their unexpected setback at the hands of California. U. S. C. has finished its big-game schedule on the coast and can "shoot the works" against Notre Dame, whereas the Hoosiers still have Northwester and the Army to worry about.

"In Stride"

Notre Dame, on the other hand, has taken its last two games "in stride" to be at the peak of Southern California. For the first time since beating Carnegie, Rockne himself will be on the sidelines, even though his ailing leg will keep him in a wheelchair. The psychology of this alone will be a big stimulant to the Hoosiers.

Though it may be argued most of Notre Dame's victims so far have also been manhandled by other teams, the fact remains that Rockne's Ramblers have convincingly disposed of one of the severest schedules tackled by any team. The workmanlike play of the team, directed on the field by Frank Carido, one of the best quarterbacks of the

Smooth Backfield

Notre Dame has a smoother working backfield array, with Carideo Martin Will, Jack Elder and either Savoldi or Mullins at fullback, but Southern California has a wealth of fast runners, including Duffield, Saunders, Musick, Hill and Moses. Don Moses is tabbed by coast experts as "the man to watch at Chicago."

Both Lines Strong

The part that the two strong hard-charging lines will play in this drama may be the decisive factor, however much the spotlight may be on Carideo or Elder, Duffield or Moses. Flanked by such fine ends as Tapan and Arbelbide, Southern California's line has a massive center trio, featuring George Dye at the pivotal position and Capt. Nate Barrager, a guard of all-American calibre. Notre Dame also is well equipped on the ends with a fine pass receiver in Colerick and such other stalwarts as Capt. Law, Moynihan and Cannon.

Strangler Seeks To Regain Title

LOS ANGELES, Nov. 13, (AP)—Ed "Strangler" Lewis, former heavyweight wrestling champion, again will seek to regain his lost laurels in the ring here tonight in a finish bout with Gus Sonnenberg, titleholder.

The match, with the championship going to the winner of two out of three falls, follows closely on the heels of one staged here several weeks ago when Sonnenberg won the deciding fall after the seconds for both grapplers had jumped into the ring. The dispute which followed brought about the rematch.

Gus Took Count When Ladjone Hit Him Unexpectedly

LOS ANGELES, Nov. 13, (AP)—Fate Ladjone, promoter, today is at liberty under \$1,000 bond pending his appeal from a conviction and sentence of thirty days in jail on charges of battery brought by Gus Sonnenberg, heavyweight wrestling champion.

Sonnenberg appeared in municipal court yesterday and testified that Ladjone called him on the telephone October 22, and made an appointment to talk over some proposed wrestling matches.

"I met him on a downtown corner, and we stopped to talk," the wrestling champion testified. "Then, quick as lightning, something struck me in the face, and I went out. When I came to, a second later, Ladjone was standing over me saying he had licked the champion, and that I was a cheesy champion anyway."

It took the jury ten minutes to find Ladjone guilty.

Head-on Collision Fatal to Fireman

BUTTE, Mont., Nov. 13 (AP)—A fireman was fatally injured, an engineer was critically hurt and ten passengers were injured, a few of them severely, in a collision between Great Northern passenger train No. 237 and a helper locomotive, 20 miles north of Butte last night.

Cecil Hastie, 29, of Butte, fireman on the lone locomotive, died shortly after he was taken to a Butte hospital. Charles Powell, also of Butte, engineer, suffered a fractured skull and possible internal injuries.

Early today no cause for the collision had been determined.

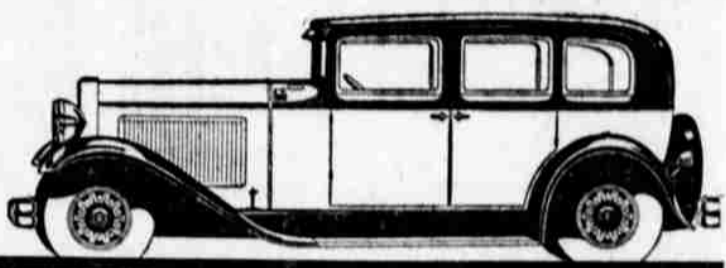
Thursday night the Baboons will play their second game with the undefeated Apes.
